

HOSPITAL TO HOLD STROKE PREVENTION CLINIC

Blackwell Hospital, Gorman strokes. Lions Club and First National Bank in conjunction with Ultra-Tex, Inc. will sponsor a Free Stroke Prevention Clinic, on Saturday the 13th of April.

The clinic is being held in an attempt to find those people who are unaware of the potential health hazard found in the vessels of the neck that supply the blood to the brain.

With the use of an ultrasound machine there is now the ability to see directly inside the carotid arteries. The ultra-sound immage shows any calcium build up and possible blockage of the vessels which is one of the possible causes of strokes.

People who are approximately 50 years of age and older, smoke, or may have high blood pressure are leading canidates for experiencing TIAs or

STROKES

Stroke is an interruption of the blood suppply to a group of brain cells, damaging those cells and causing malfunction or lack of function in those parts of the body that the damaged cels control. Generally speaking, each side of the brain controls the motor and sensory functions of the opposite side of the body, so damage to cells on the left side of brain, for instance, will impair function on the right side of the body. Strokes can have a wide range of consequences; it may, among other conditions, cause temporary or permanent loss of memory and difficulty in speaking, walking,


and controlling emotions. Strokes can be cause by several conditions. One is call cerebrovascular embolism. which occurs when a "wondering" blood clot formed elsewhere in the body (usually in the heart or in one or both carotid arteries in the neck that carry blood from the heart to the brain), lodges itself in an artery leding to or within the brain. Interruption of blood flow also occurs when a simular clot is formed in the arteries because of the presence of artherosclerosis (a narrowing and clogging of the arteries by various deposits).

People who have both hypertension atherosclerosis are the most likely to suffer a stroke, since both diseases weaken and damage the arteries. Hypertension probably encourages hemorrhage. Heredity may pay a role in stroke, since the tendencies to develope both hypertension and artherosclerosis appear to be inherited.

Smoking, diabetes, and high blood cholesterol may also contribute to stroke. Furthermore, stroke is more likely to victimize anyone with a history of mild stroke like episodes called TIAs (transient ischemic attacks). TIAs are essentially strokes that clear up within 24 hours, this is, an individual may develop total paralysis of one side of the body as in a classic stroke, by the symptoms clear within 24 hours, leaving no

residual effect. A stroke can present itself in many ways, but some of the more common symptoms are a sudden weakness or numbness in the face, arm, and/or leg on one side of the body; loss or slurring of speech or difficulty in understanding other speak, unexplained unsteadiness, and persistent falling to one side. It is possible, however, to suffer a mild stroke and experience minor degrees of these symp-

Treatment of strokes begins with immediate hospitalization. Blood pressure is normalized, and drug therapy is to prevent future seizures as well as to reduce swelling of the brain tissue is ofthen instituted. Also, depending on the cause of the stroke and other factors, anticoagulants (agents that inhibit the normal clotting of blood) are sometimes administered in the hope of limiting the progress of the stroke or preventing additional strokes. After the acute period, rehabilitation is begun by speech, physical, and occupational therapists who are specially trained in dealing with stroke victims. Prevention of stroke mainly involves control of high blood pressure and other risk factors such as smoking and high cholesterol intake.

The proration of payments is based on the filing date. Prior to October 1, 1983, when a person filed for SSI, the date used for eligibility was the first day of the month in which filed. Starting October 1, 1983, for example, if a person files on the 15th day of the month, the payment is prorated starting the 15th and paid from that day. Therefore, a

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

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

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

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WASHINGTON* D.C. — Afederal report concerning Medicare payments made to rural hospitals is long overdue, Congressman Charles W. Stemholm said last week in a speech in the House of Representatives.

Speaking on behalf of small hospitals, Congressman Stenholm called for "the prompt delivery" of a report being conducted by the Department

of Health and Human Services (HHS). The study, ahich was due to be released seven months ago, will determine how the Diagnosis Related Group (DRG) payments affect rural hospitals. Congressman Stenholm, and other rural area representatives, believe the current reimburse ment system favors urban area and is unfair to small town hospitals.

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"The payment system assunes that rural wages and other costs are lower than those in urban areas," Stenholm said. "Because of this theory, rural hospital reimbursements currently are 25 to 47 percent less than those to their urban counter parts for precisely the same services. I am convinced this is entirely

Congressman Stenholm, who presented President Ronald Reagab with a work paper on the same subject at a private meeting two weeks ago, said the report should have been released by Secretary Margaret Heckler's office in August, 1984. The delay is costly to rural hospitals, which have had to operate under the unfair system. The group of congressmen has asked that the system be modified as soon as possible.

When the study is released, the administration will have the option to

rectify the system. The Stamford Democrat cited several imbalances in the DRG program during his special order address. He said the DRG formula does not take into account that in order to provide quality care, rural hospitals must pay competitive salaries, and sometimes must pay even more than rural hospitals to draw employees to the sparsely-populated areas. Hospitals in small towns do not have the opportunity to buy goods in quantity, at discount prices, like larger hospitals do.

Rural areas, Stenholm continued, also have a disporportinately higher percentage of elderly residents than metropolitan areas. On the average, elderly patients require more care and a longer hospital recuperation period. The higher percentage of elderly citizens should be considered in the DRG formula, Stenholm said. Such a consideration would greatly aid the rural hospitals.

The congressman gave a brief sketch of the 17th District to make his point. According to the 1980 census figures, the median age in the country was 30.0. At the same time, the median age in 27 out of the 35 counties in the 17th District was higher than the national average. Coke County had the highest median age of 44.3. The median age for Eastland County was 39.2 in 1980.

Along with a high median age, the percentage of resident aged 65 and over is higher in the district than in the nation. The national rate of elderly citizens was 11.3, but in the district that percentage is \$15.6. Coleman County has a elderly population of 10,439, of which 25.6 percent is at least 65. Eastland County has an elderly population that makes up 23.2 percent of the residents here.

Local Green Thumb workers and sponsors attending the seminar included Opal Mauney and Site Director, Mozelle Rhymes of Gorman.


