Texas USDA - Farm Service Agency Report Reflects Widespread Impact of 2000 Drought

A Drought Report developed from a statewide survey of Farm Service Agency (FSA) County Offices reveals extensive row crop, pasture/hayland and livestock losses in each of Texas' 254 counties. Extended periods of extreme heat compounded losses in 223 counties. Crop year 2000 marks the fourth consecutive drought years for much of Texas. The report reflects areas of the state hit harder than others, but no single region was unaffected by or immune to the effects of the drought.

"Although recent rain has been received throughout the state, the damage done by the drought is irreversible. Predicted above average rainfall for fall 2000 will not alleviate the current precipitation deficit," according to State Executive Director, Wayland Shurley of the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Farm Service Agency.

Crop condition data received by FSA indicated 53% of the states wheat acres, 42% of cotton, 35% of sorghum, 4.9% of corn and 81% of peanuts failed. Statewide, corn was the only exception to the widespread losses. Texas' corn acres were either harvested or matured to the extent that the dry conditions did not adversely impact the crop. Additionally, livestock and pasture losses were recorded in 207 counties, with many counties indicating higher than normal culling and in some cases, liquidation of entire operations.

"The resulting economic hardship felt by Texas farmers and ranchers has been devastating," said Shurley. "FSA's report showed approximately 136,000 producers with 30 percent or greater losses and 15,000 producers who will have difficulty meeting their financial needs through commercial lenders. USDA and FSA are doing all we can do to provide programs and lending opportunities to producers in an attempt to lift some of the financial strain inflicted by the drought," he said.

To date, 24 counties have received primary disaster declarations for the 2000 drought and additional 39 counties have received contiguous declarations. "Although these numbers are substantial, I do not feel the list is complete or adequately mirrors the needs of counties that have not yet received disaster declarations," said Shurley. Damage Assessment Reports have been requested from 44 additional counties and are pending review for eligibility for Secretarial Disaster Designations.

Disaster declarations provide farmers and ranchers with low interest emergency loan assistance. This year, the declarations will be a key factor for providing assistance to livestock producers who suffered grazing losses.

FSA's survey also indicated 39 counties where agricultural businesses are feeling the effects of the lack of production and depressed commodity prices, a statistic that is vital considering Agriculture is the second largest industry in Texas. Losses suffered by the state's farmers and ranchers have a severe impact on Texas' entire economy.

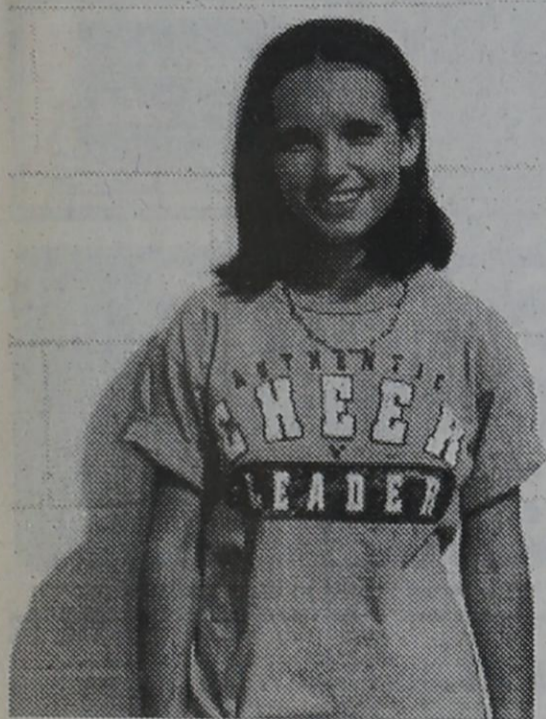
Fortunately, President Clinton recently signed the farm-spending bill for 2001, which provides for approximately \$3.5 billion in disaster aid for agriculture losses nationwide. Texas farmers and ranchers will benefit from provisions that specifically allocate monies for crop loss payments, dairy market loss payments and livestock assistance. Think Texas

When Vicente Fox was elected Mexico's president on July 2, many Mexicans rejoiced. In the United States, for many people the feeling was mutual. In a country that is three times the size of Texas, has a population approaching 100 million, a strong peso and a close proximity to Texas, the United States sees an opportunity for partnership.

Beyond his initiatives to improve the lives of Mexicans, Fox sees trade with the United States as the necessary and profitable opportunity that it is. In Texas agriculture, we share that vision.

Mexico is our largest trading partner, and the passage of the North American Free Trade Agreement in 1993 has worked to refine that relationship. Overall, Texas exported \$41.4 billion to Mexico in 1999, up 14 percent over 1998. A large chunk of that was agricultural products - some \$2.6 billion. From crops, livestock, processed food to computers, Texas is already capitalizing on good relationships and a good trading environment with our friends south of the border.

More is being done, however, to open doors for Texas agricultural producers. Tackling transportation challenges is already happening. For example, Texans are conducting feasibility studies for a rail loading facility in Robstown and examining export capability by sea from Point Comfort and by truck from Rio Grande City.

Beyond transportation, the Texas Department of Agriculture has taken trade development missions to Mexico on behalf of commodity producers, helped producers find ways to protect their investments when trading with Mexico and applied for grant dollars for grain sorghum marketing there.

As a promising country right in our own backyard, Mexico offers endless opportunity for partnerships and expanding markets. With new leadership and renewed vision, Mexico is a friend of Texas.

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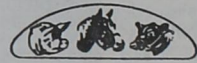

Pause To Think

The following passage in Romans 8, verses 6-14, lists 6 reasons why we must have the Spirit of Christ residing in our hearts. Let's discuss them one at a time.

This week, we are discussing the fifth reason why we need the Spirit of Christ residing in our lives, according to the writing of Paul to the Church at Rome.

Romans 8:6-14

For to be carnally minded is death; but to be spiritually minded is life and peace. Because the carnal mind is enmity against God: for it is not subject to the law of God, neither indeed can be.

1. So then they that are in the flesh cannot please God. But ye are not in the flesh, but in the Spirit, if so be that the Spirit of God dwell in you.

2. Now if any man have not the Spirit of Christ, he is none of his.

3. And if Christ be in you, the body is dead because of sin; but the Spirit is life because of righteousness.

4. But if the Spirit of him that raised up Jesus from the dead dwell in you, he that raised up Christ from the dead shall also quicken your mortal bodies by his Spirit that dwelleth in you.

Therefore, brethren, we are debtors, not to the flesh, to live after the flesh. For if ye live after the flesh, ye shall die:

5. But if ye through the Spirit do mortify the deeds of the body, ye shall live.

6. For as many as are led by the Spirit of God, they are the sons of God.

In verse 13 of chapter 8, Paul instructs that we should mortify the deeds of the body, if we desire to live eternally. Other wise, we will die a spiritual death. The thing most frightening about spiritual death is that it is an eternal dying.

The word mortify in verse 13 comes from the Greek word thanatoo. Thantoo defined is to kill (literally or figuratively): The instruction given here is to kill (cause to become dead) the deeds of the body/flesh, through the Spirit. In doing so, we will live eternally. This is not something that can be accomplished with your own strength, wisdom, disciplines, or learning. It is impossible for us to mortify the sinfulness of our flesh using our own sinful flesh to do so. We must have and allow the Holy Spirit of God in our hearts, in order to do so.

This is not the only verse in the Bible that deals with this, look at Colossians 3:5-7. *Mortify therefore your members which are upon the earth; fornication, uncleanness, inordinate affection, evil concupiscence, and covetousness, which is idolatry: For which things' sake the wrath of God cometh on the children of disobedience:*

The Lady Panthers finished the season with 10 wins and 20 losses and district with 2 wins and 4 losses.

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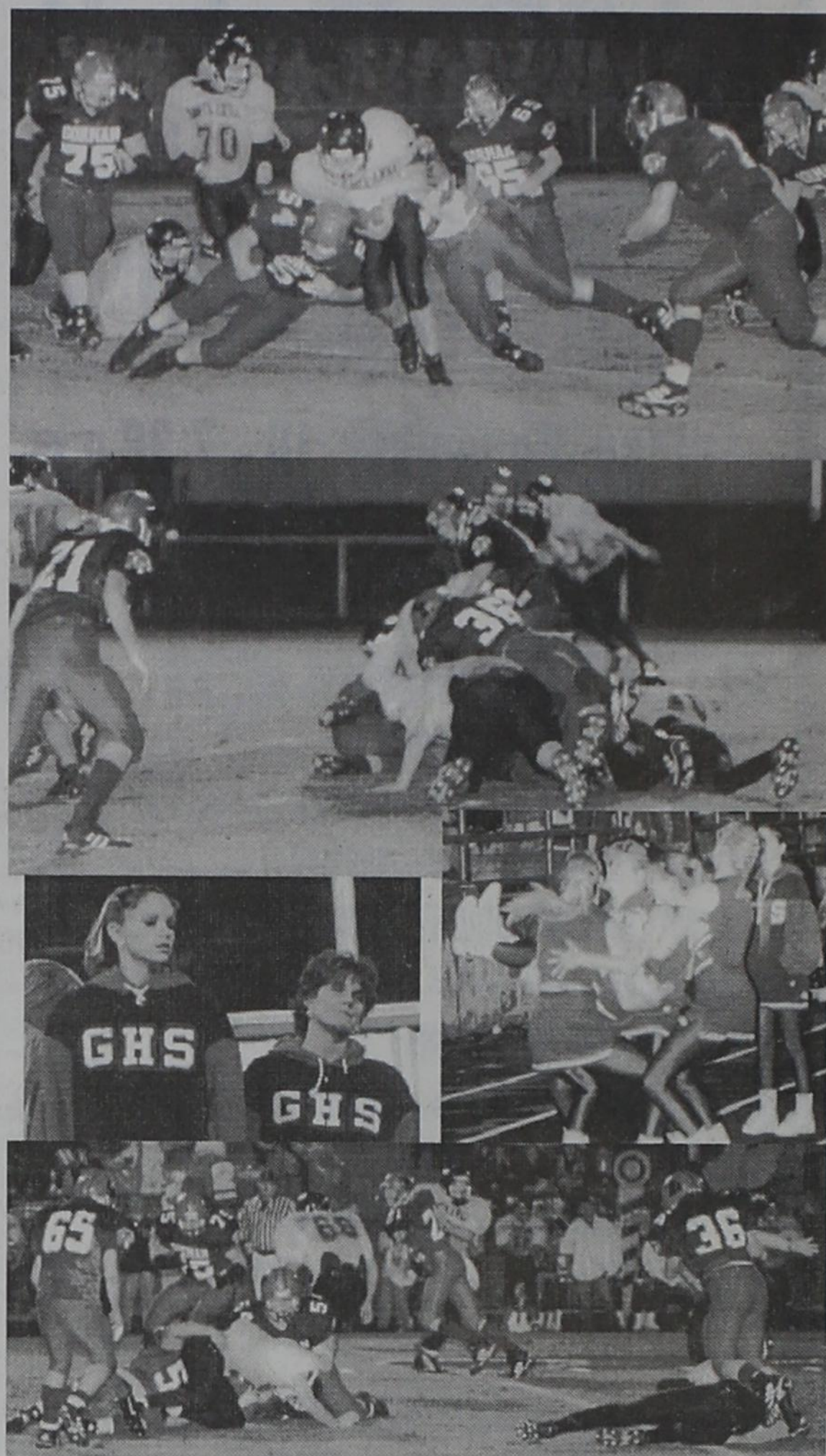
