Melinda Harrington Approved By Foreign Mission Board



INDIANAPOLIS, Indiana -The Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board approved 131 young adults for training as missionary journeymen during its April meeting in Indianapolis.

The group is the second largest to be approved for journeyman training. In 1980 the foreign board approved a record 142 candidates and later commissioned 130 for service.

All college graduates (or graduating this spring) age 26 and under, the journeyman candidates expect to work for two years alongside Southern Baptist career missignaries in 52 nations.

The candidates come from 29 states. Texas claims the largest group with 16. Twelve come from Tennessee, 11 from Georgia and 10 each from Alabama and North Carolina. The group includes four married couples, 42 single men and 81 single women.

Those who receive medical clearance and successfully complete the five-week trainperiod beginning June 8 at Meredith College, Raleigh, N.C., will be commissioned for service July 15.

Melinda Harrington of Gorman has been assigned an MK teacher in Oaxaca, Mexico. Most recently employed as a secretary at Texas A&M University, where she will be an 1983 graduate. In BSU she was hostess and council member. She also made mission trips in Texas and Mexico.

She is a member of First Baptist Church, College Station. Melinda is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. C. Harrington of Gorman. She was born in Weatherford and has also lived in Bluff Dale. She considers Gorman her hometown.


J. T. Morris **Laid To Rest** Saturday

WET, WET RAPIDS — Getting wet is the order of the day on Six Flags Over Texas' new river rafting adventure, Roaring Rapids. The \$4.2 million dollar attraction recently opened at the Arlington theme park. It features more than a quarter mile of thundering rapids and wave-swept lagoons.

ARLINGTON, TEXAS — The biggest ride in the history of Six Flags Over Texas, the Roaring Rapids river adventure, opened Friday, April 1, at the Arlington theme park.

The \$4.2 million dollar attraction simulates the excitement of rafting down a wilderness river complete with white-capped rapids, rippling lagoons, threatening boulders and waterfalls which tower above the

Circular fiberglass rafts, encircled by huge flotation tubes, carry twelve passengers each along the thundering waterway

Six Flags General Manager Ray Williams said the concept for the ride came from a Six Flags executive who was intrigued by the man-made river which was used for kayaking competition in the 1972 Munich Olympics.

He said Six Flags asked Intamin, AG, of Zurich, Switzerland, to create a similar river which would be totally safe for the average person to ride. Roaring Rapids is the result.

Intamin is the same firm which designed such thrill rides as the Shock Wave double loop roller coaster and the Texas Cliffhanger freefall ride.

Williams commented, "Roaring Rapids is as close as the average person is going to come to the thrill of a ride down a stretch of rapids. Up until now," he said, "the experience has been limited to those folks who could travel to wilderness areas and join in guided raf-

He cautioned that, "like the real thing, people can just about count on getting very, very wet."

'As each raft plunges down the final set of rapids, a wave about three high breaks over the leading edge of the raft. At that point, it really gets wet," he explained.

Williams said Roaring Rapids holds nearly two million gallons of water in a "riverbed" formed by 11,100 tons of concrete. The river is more than a quarter of a mile long.

Two 400 horsepower pumps force 167,000 gallons of water per minute into the river. The rapids effect is created as tons of water are forced over specially-designed contours on the river's sloping floor.

There are four sets of rapids on the ride, connected by four lakes, two of which are equipped with wave machines. In addition, two of the lakes feature waterfalls, the largest of which towers 36 feet above the river. It produces some 10,000 gallons of water per minute.

Roaring Rapids can carry up to 2,000 riders per hour, making it the largest capacity ride in the Six Flags lineup.

Final Date For Planting Corn In **Eastland County**

April 30 is the final planting date for insured corn in Eastland County, Texas, according to Ardell M. Kalmbach, Director for the District 09 of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC). "Acres of corn planted by April 30, insured by FCIC (or by a private company reinsured by FCIC), must be reported by May 15 to receive full crop insurance coverage," says Kalmbach.

Acreage planted after April 30 must also be reported on the May 15 acreage report as being planted too late for insurance.

"Farmers unable to plant prior to April 30 because of excess moisture conditions may sign a 20-day late planting agreement, which permits insurance coverage, but provides for a lower bushel-per-acre guarantee due to the late planting," Kalmbach explained.

Farmers wishing additional information about the new late planting agreement should contact thier local, authorized crop insurance agent.

Legal Notice

The Eastland County Appraisal District wishes to remind property owners that Monday, May 2, 1983, is the deadline for filing property exemption applications and business personal property renditions.

State law requires that all business personal property be rendered each year. Renditions were sent or delivered to county business earlier this year. If you have not yet returned your business rendition; you should do so before the May 2nd deadline.

If you did not receive a rendition or have lost it; you should check with the appraisal district office.

The deadline for filing open space land exemption applications and residential homestead applications is also May 2nd.

The open space or agricultural use exemptions allows the property owner to pay on an Ag-use value rather than the higher market value. If your land was granted an exemption land is still the same as previously reported, a new application does not need to be made. Only those whose land may qualify for the first time need to apply.

The residential homestead application needs to be filed by those homeowners who were not signed up in 1982 or who have since changed their place of residence.

Those homeowners who have recently turned 65 years of age should check to see if they are not eligible for an additional exemption for those over-65 granted by many of the taxing jurisdic-

If you have changed your residence between January 1, 1982 and January 1, 1983; a new application will have to be filed on the new residence in order for the exemption to be granted.

The exemptions and renditions must be filed with the Eastland County Appraisal District by May 2, 1983 in order to be accepted for the 1983 year.

If you have a question concerning the filing of your applications or renditions, please contact the Eastland County Appraisal District prior to the May 2, 1983



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
