We received the following from the Environmental Resources and Environmental Council and thought it was a most newsworthy article for our readers.

### THE ONE THING THE FORCED DEPOSIT LAW IS SURE TO CLEAN OUT..... IS YOU POCKETBOOK

A legislative bill has been introduced that will have a great impact on the consumers of Texas. It will require you pay a deposit on returnable containers. We urge you to let your Texas legislator know how you feel about this costly legislation by letter of phone call. If you need further information the Texas Resource and Environmental Council who oppose this type of legislation will be happy to work with you.

An active group in Texas are working for passage of forced deposit law which they state will end Texas' litter problem. We want you to know that the only thing this law will really clean is your pocketbook.

HERE'S WHY... with the forced deposit law, YOU'LL HAVE TO PAY AT LEAST 5c IN DEPOSIT FOR EVERY BEER OR SOFT DRINK you buy in glass, plastic or aluminum containers.

To get your deposit back, YOU'LL HAVE TO SPEND MORE GAS AND MORE TIME. Because the forced deposit law requires you to return your empty containers to the store where you bought them or to another store that sells THE PARTICULAR BRAND OF BEVERAGE YOU BOUGHT. And before you get your deposit back, chances are YOU'LL HAVE TO WAIT IN LINE TO GET ALL YOUR CANS AND BOTTLES COUNTEd.

But that's just the beginning. THE GROCER'S HANDLING COST OF CANS AND BOTTLES WILL VIRTUALLY EXPLODE. First, the store needs someone to count and refund all deposits. Then, all those containers must be sorted by brand name for collection. While the piles of unwashed containers are waiting for pick-up, THEY COULD ATTRACT Hordes OF RODENTS AND PESTS, when the trucks from each distributor arrive, the containers must be recounted and checked for brand consistency.

It's cumbersome process. And costly. Because unlike our voluntary recycling system that pays for itself, and PAYS TEXAS CONSUMERS OVER \$20 MILLION A YEAR, the forced deposit law will result in higher prices. In fact, PRICES IN FORCED DEPOSIT STATES PROVE THAT ALL THE COSTS GET PASSED ALONG TO THE CONSUMER.

### 4-H Club News

The Eastland County 4-H Round-Up was held April the 7th at several different locations across the county and involved 20 Eastland County 4-Hers.

Method demonstrations were conducted at the Texas Electric Reddy Room in Eastland. This event involved four 4-Hers in three demonstrations and they were Warren Parson in Safety, Travis Parson in Companion Animals and Karmen and Jay Hall in Sheep Production. Dr. Bill Jackson, the 4-H & Youth Specialist for the Texas A&M Extension Service, was the judge.

She will join the Study-Abroad Program sponsored by the Texas A&M University. This group of approximately 25 students and 6 professors will be led by Dean Candida Luzes, Dean of the College of Liberal Arts. The accredited courses being offered are History of Art, Classical Archaeology, English, Management and others. The group will fly to Amsterdam, Holland where they will stay overnight to tour this city. Then they will fly to Milan, Italy. From here they will travel to La Poggerina, where they will live in a converted monastery for 7 weeks. Classes will be held on Monday through Wednesday, then there will be planned tours on Thursday and Friday. ### Hopkins County Youth Receive Rural Heroism Award

Eleven-year-old Chris Wilhite and his ten-year-old sister Amy of Sallitlo (Hopkins County) received the 1983 Rural Heroism Award here today for their role in saving the life of their father who severely mangled his right arm in a farm accident last June.

The presentation was made by Millard Shivers, awards chairman of the Texas farm and Ranch Safety Council, during the annual meeting of the Texas/Southwestern Safety Conference and Exposition. Ben Bullard, assistant director of the Texas Farm Bureau Safety Department, is the council president.

Two other nominees, Mrs. Paul Fox of Desdemona (Eastland County) and John Henshall of Beeville (Bee County), received honorable mention.

Mrs. Fox probably saved the life of her husband when she jumped on a runaway tractor and stopped it, after the man had been knocked unconscious by a tree he was pulling down with the tractor. Henshall used a front-end loader to lift a tractor which had overturned on a co-worker, Leroy Robbins, as the two were excavating dirt to build some terraces.

Last June 23, Steve Wilhite, 30, was working with a hay baler on his 160-acre dairy farm near Sallitlo in northeast Texas when he slipped, pinning his right arm in the rollers of the baler.

Responding to Wilhite's cry for help, Chris and Amy came running from a nearby

lake. Chris shut off the tractor's power takeoff and then lifted the tailgate of the baler, allowing the elder Wilhite to remove his severely mangled arm.

Accustomed to pasture driving but never highway traffic, Chris started the family pickup and Amy kept their ailing father awake so he could shift gears as Chris sped 75 miles per hour the eight-mile distance from their farm to Franking County Hospital at Mount Vernon.

Emergency treatment was given to Wilhite, but hospital officials determined that the only chance Wilhite had of keeping his right arm would be to take him to a Dallas hospital.

J.W. McKay, who lives near Mount Vernon, has an agreement with the hospital there to use his helicopter to fly patients in need of more specialized care.

McKay flew Wilhite with his injured arm packed an ice to Parkland Hospital in 38 minutes. However, surgeons at Parkland could not save the badly mangled arm, because they said the bone had been twisted beyond repair.

Nevertheless, the quick action of the Wilhite youths has been attributed to possibly saving his life.

Playing hero was not the main concern of the two children at the time of the accident. Chris said his primary concern was "Getting daddy to the hospital."

Amy said her main interest was "keeping daddy alive."

Chris and Amy attend school at Mount Vernon, Chris being in the fifth grade and Amy in the fourth grade.

Both children help their parents with the farm chores. Chris helps with cleaning the milking parlor and raking the hay for baling. Amy helps feed the baby calves.

**TDH Requires Students To Have Immunizations**

The Texas Department of Public Health requires that all students enrolled in Texas schools have the following immunizations before entering school:

3 DPT shots, plus one booster shot given after the child's 4th birthday.

3 Oral Polio immunizations, plus a booster after the child's 4th birthday.

Measles immunization given after the child's 1st

birthday.

Mumps immunization after the 1st birthday, and up to 12 years.

Rubella immunization given after the child's 1st birthday, and up to 17 years of age.

A Physician's Verification of Measles/Mumps Illness must be on record with their school.

A Tetanus/Diphtheria booster shot is required

every 10 years.

The TDH will not accept the year that the immunization was given, the month, day and year are required on the child's record.

With the influx of out-of-state students coming into Texas, our schools are getting so large that the school officials are within their rights not to enroll a student until his/her immunization record is up to date.

All parents with children in school are urged to contact their school principal or school nurse to determine the immunization needs of

their child or children before the 1983-84 school year.
