I had significant problems this session with the fact that 29 people were able to make these most important decisions for the people of the state of Texas with little or no practical input from the other 120 members. While it may not be intent of this mechanism to creat inequity, it invariably does; a typical example being the fact that the Governor's Office received a 54.3% increase in spending ability for the coming biennium over last bienniem. On close scrutiny I discovered that a sizable portion of this increase was to fund and staff a Governor's Commission to study women's issues. I think we could virtually unanimously agree that, while the program might be good if sufficient funds were available, our state is faced with many issues and needs of significantly greater importance where funding is

desperately needed. I have guite probably told many of you more than you ever wanted to know about the appropriative process but I am convinced that the absolute key to the success of our system is an informed electorate that knows what the elected are doing so they can better judge their level of performance. 



■ Do not use air conditioning until absolutely necessary.

■ Keep your thermostat set as high as possible. We recommend 80° in the summer. For added comfort, use ceiling or portable fans to circulate the air.
