John Block Refuses To Implement The Emergency Feedgrain Program

Texas Farmers Union President Mike Moeller returned to Texas, Friday, frustrated with the United States Department of Agriculture and their "stonewalling" of drought aid for parched West Texas.

Accompanying Texas Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower to Washington, D.C., Moeller and two West Texas ranchers appealed in vain to Secretary of Agriculture John Block's department to institute an emergency feedgrain program, using government-owned corn that even now sets decomposing

in Texas Panhandle grain elevators.

"Top USDA officials agree fully that a severe crisis exists here in Texas, and Congress has given them the authority to respond to this type situation, but for reasons unclear to us, efforts to help solve the crisis are being stonewalled," said Moeller. "This drought will not go away. The ranchers in Texas need the stored grain to feed dying livestock. The government already owns it; the public is paying to store it, and the grain is not suitable for use as human

foodstuff," Moeller added. "What Texans want to know," continued Moeller, "is why won't John Block implement the emergency feedgrain program?"

"The problems our ranchers are facing out there are mounting daily, and the implementation of the emergency program could be the difference between survival and annihilation of these ranchers. Hopefully, the Administration will wake up before they disable another portion of an already stricken agricultural economy."

DEADLINE NEARS FOR WHEAT INSURANCE

The final application date for Federal Crop Insurance on 1984-crop wheat in EASTLAND County is August 31st, according to Ardell M. Kalmbach, district director of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation. Kalmbach adds, however, that wheat growers interested in participating in the special Individual Yield Coverage Program should apply for the necessary yield certification at least 15 days prior to that date.

Farmers who can qualify for the IYC plan are offered higher yield guarantees at no additional cost. To be eligible, Kalmbach explains, producers must have records to show that average wheat yields during the three most recent crop years have been above the average for the area.

Yield records should be submitted to the ASCS Office in EASTLAND County for certification. Kalmbach suggests that interested producers may want to contact the ASCS Office in Abilene in advance to determine the kinds of acreage and production records that are needed.

Once a certification of above-average yields has been obtained, it should be given to the insurance agent who is writing the policy. The additional coverage will be added automatically. For each bushel that an IYC participant's yields are above the local average, Kalmbach explains, up to \$3.00 per acre of additional protection can be obtained with no increase in the premium.

Federal Crop Insurance policies, which provide coverage against most avoidable causes of crop loss, are sold by independent insurance agents and private insurance companies. A list of those authorized to sell insurance in EASTLAND County is available from the ASCS office.
