Frona Chamber Raising \$100,000 For New Plant

Securing the title to the land was the step being taken, and the only thing which stands be-

tween Missouri Beef Packers and beginning construction in Frona, it was reported this

week by a member of the chamber of Commerce's industrial committee.

Dr. Lloyd Shackelford stated that as of the present, the people at Missouri Beef were "waiting on us" to get the land properly purchased and deeded.

A fund drive to finance purchasing the land has occupied the committee's time for the past two weeks, but it appeared early this week that the drive was nearing its goal of near \$100,000. An announcement to this effect was expected in the next few days.

Meanwhile, Shackelford stated that officials of Missouri Beef Packers have been in the process of buying new equipment for the beef packing facility to be built near here.

"In a telephone conversation with Gene Frye, president of Missouri Beef, he states that due to some technical advancements, the plant which will be built at Frona will be even better equipped than was expected when the plant was announced," Shackelford said.

Construction on the \$3,000,000 beef-packing facility is expected to begin soon after the legal work on the property is completed. Officials announced that they would have the plant open by April 1, 1968.

The plant bids to slaughter up to 10,000 cattle per week on a single shift, and later could expand to 20,000 cattle on a double-shift basis. Either way would make it the largest volume slaughtering plant in the nation.

This is probably an impossible question to answer precisely. No two manufacturers have exactly the same things in mind in looking for a location, with one exception - all are looking for a place where they can operate profitably. But, what conditions are necessary for profitable operations?

All manufacturers require certain things. All must market their products and so good transportation must be available. All must have access to raw materials, which again is largely a matter of transportation. A few may require some form of financial assistance.

All but a few towns can meet these standard requirements so there must be other conditions which guide a manufacturer in deciding on a particular town. What are they and how can they be described and evaluated?

As pointed out earlier, the manufacturer's prime concern is in potential profit, inasmuch as most towns are quite similar with respect to the standard industrial requirements, it makes little difference where the plant is located. In one respect only, do towns differ materially and that is in the type of people who live there. There is much difference in the cooperative attitude people in different towns, in their attitude toward industry, toward their community, toward each other. Here is frequently the deciding factor in the choice of location.

City Water Department Employees Get Citation

An official State Health Department citation for work proficiency has been awarded to Duane Ham, assistant water superintendent for the Muleshoe water system, and Rey Del Toro, plant operations specialist for the city. The citation reflects the men's standing among state water officials.

Signed by the State Health Commissioner and authorities of the Texas Water and Sewerage Workers Association, the certificate of competency is awarded only to those utility plant operators who have successfully demonstrated their skill and knowledge in modern principles of plant management.

To qualify for certification, a plant operator must have accumulated a prescribed amount of actual work experience. He must also have attended both regional and statewide short schools at which the techniques of water treatment and waste water disposal are taught, and must have passed an examination given by State Health Department sanitary engineers.

AGRICULTURE OCCUPATIONS FOR CHILDREN BELOW 16

You will recall that the amendments to the Fair Labor Standards Act of 1966 included a revision in the Child Labor which directed the Secretary of the Department of Labor to establish and publish occupations in agriculture which were hazardous for children below the age of 16.

The following release from the Department of Labor establishes those agricultural jobs which are considered hazardous, since the date for hearings to consider data, views, and arguments with respect to this proposal and sets the date of expiration for June 1, 1969, unless first replaced as a result of the hearings or other administrative actions.

The occupations released by secretary of Labor Willard Wirtz are as follows: OCCUPATIONS IN AGRICULTURE PARTICULARLY HAZARDOUS FOR EMPLOYMENT

Pursuant to authority in section 13 (c) of the Fair Labor Standards Act of 1938 (63 Stat. 918, as amended; 29 U.S.C. 213) and Reorganization Plan No. 2 of 1946 (3 CFR, 1943-48 Comp., p. 1064), and in accordance with 29 CFR Part 1500 Subpart D, I hereby propose to issue an interim finding and order in the form set forth below.

Accordingly, notice is hereby given of proceedings to be held on May 18, 1967, commencing at 10:00 a.m. in Conference Room 102 (ABCD), United States Department of Labor Building, 14th Street and Constitution Avenue, N. W., Washington, D. C., to be conducted in accordance with the procedure prescribed in 29 CFR 1500.45. Interested persons are invited to see OCCUPATIONS Page 3

Bowers, Hunt Injured In Wreck

An 18 year-old Morton youth, Joe Bowers, is listed in fair condition in Lubbock Methodist Hospital following a one-car accident last Tuesday west of Levelland.

Bowers is the nephew of Earl Bowers who lives near Goodland.

Bowers and Hackie Ilen Hunt were in a 1966 Ford Ranchero, traveling east when the accident occurred after Hunt, identified as the driver was apparently blinded by lights from an oncoming car.

The youths had lain near the scene of the accident for approximately an hour after being thrown clear of the vehicle before they were spotted by an unidentified truck driver.

Bowers, more seriously injured is reported to have suffered compound fractures of both legs and a collar bone and other injuries, while Hunt sustained a fractured shoulder, lacerations and bruises.

to appear and submit data, views, and argument with respect to this proposal. Persons desiring to appear are requested to appear at the office of the Director of the Bureau of Labor Standards no later than two days prior to the date provided above. Written data, views, and argument with regard to this proposal may also be submitted to the Director of the Bureau of Labor Standards on or prior to the date provided above, and will be made part of the record. The proposed order reads as follows:

1500.70 Occupations in Agriculture.

(a) Finding and declaration of fact. The following occupations in agriculture are particularly hazardous for the employment of children below the age of 16:

1. Handling or applying anhydrous ammonia, any organic arsenic herbicide, organic phosphate pesticide, halogenated hydrocarbon pesticide, or heavy-metal fungicide, including cleaning or decontaminating equipment used in application or mixing of any such chemical.

2. Handling or using a blasting agent.

3. Working as--

a. Driver of a truck, bus, or automobile;

b. Helper on a truck when such work involves riding outside the cab on a public road or highway, or riding on a running board, fender, hood, or

bumper on the farm proper;

c. Flagman for aircraft.

4. Operating, driving, or riding on a tractor (track or wheel over 10 horsepower), or attaching or detaching an implement or power take-off unit to or from such tractor.

5. Operating or riding on a self-unloading tank feeder wagon, a self-unloading forage box trailer, a self-unloading auger wagon, or a self-unloading auger trailer.

6. Operating or riding on a dump wagon or hoist wagon, fork lift, rotary tiller (except walking type), or earthmoving equipment or trenching equipment.

7. Operating or unloading a combine, field baler, header, windrower, swather, mower, hay conditioner, corn picker or cotton picker, or forage harvester or vegetable harvester.

8. Operating, feeding, or unloading any of the following machines when power-driven: stationary baler, thresher, huller, feed grinder, chopper, silo filler, sheller, crop dryer.

9. Feeding material into or unloading a roughage blower or auger conveyer.

10. Operating a power-driven post-hole digger or power driven post driver.

11. Operating, adjusting, or cleaning a power-driven saw.

12. Felling, bucking, skidding, loading, or unloading timber with a butt diameter of more than 4 inches.

13. Working from a ladder or scaffold at a height over 20 feet.

14. Working inside a gas-tight type fruit enclosure, gas-tight type grain enclosure or gas-tight type forage enclosure, or inside a silo when a top unloading device is in operating position.

15. Handling or caring for a dairy bull, boar, stud horse, cow with new-born young, sow with new-born young, mare with new-born young, except cleaning unoccupied pens or stalls, or feeding and watering when done from outside the pen or stall.

(b) Definition. As used in this order, the term "agriculture" shall mean farming in all its branches, including among other things the cultivation and tillage of the soil, dairying, the production, cultivation, growing, and harvesting of any agricultural or horticultural commodities (including commodities defined as agricultural commodities in section 15 (g) of the Agricultural Marketing Act, as amended), the raising of livestock, bees, fur-bearing animals, or poultry, and any practices (including any forestry or lumbering operations) performed by a farmer or on a farm as an incident to or in conjunction with such farming operations, including preparation for market, delivery to storage or to market or to carriers for transportation to market.

(c) Exception. This order shall not apply to the employment of a child below the age of 16 by his parent or by a person standing in the place of his parent on a farm owned or operated by such parent or person.

(d) This order is issued on an interim basis pending a study in greater depth of the occupations in agriculture particularly hazardous for employment of children below the age of 16. It shall expire June 1, 1969 unless first replaced by further proceedings pursuant to 29 CFR Part 1500, Subpart D.

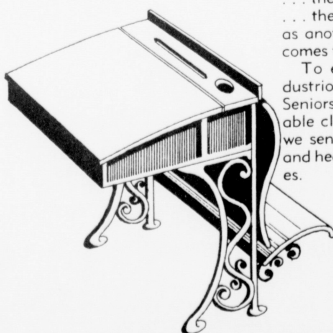

David Davis Selected For Science Training

David Davis, a Muleshoe High school junior, has been selected as a participant in the fourth annual Science Training Program sponsored by the National Science Foundation.

This will be held at West Georgia College at Carrollton, Ga. June 12 to July 21.

Participants were selected from application throughout the nation on the basis of academic achievement, mental maturity test, and a chemistry achievement test.

On the basis of these tests, high school grades and teacher recommendations, the 24 applicants who appeared to have the greatest promise of becoming career scientists were selected.

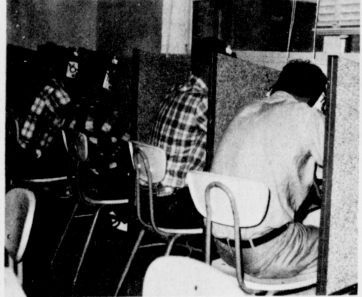
The study course will be based on a widely acclaimed new chemistry course, the Chemical Education, Material Study known as CHEMEU.

The classes will be held Mondays through Fridays. The morning and afternoon sessions will include both classroom and laboratory work. During an independent study hour programmed learning sequences in chemistry, mathematics, physics and computer programming will be available.

During the later weeks of the program, participants with demonstrated research capabilities will be permitted to learn advanced instrumentation techniques, including infrared and ultraviolet spectroscopy, gas chromatography, and radioisotope techniques.

The director and teacher for the program is Dr. William D. Jacobs, associate professor of chemistry at West Georgia College.

New Language Lab Installed At School

A new language laboratory has been recently installed in the Foreign Language Department of the Muleshoe High School. This Language Lab enables the student to speak the language without interrupting the other students. He can hear himself through the audio-activated earphones, thus giving him the opportunity to criticize his own pronunciation.

The private booths augment the students continuity of concentration, which is essential in the learning of a spoken foreign language.

The teacher can spend more time with the students who need help without disturbing the progress of the class. Also the teacher can evaluate the student objectively without the student knowing it.

The console (master control) has three channels on which

three different lessons can be given at the same time plus two more outside channels which can be included through tape recorders or phonographs. There are six student channels on which as many as four students may hold private conversations, thus twenty-four students may be holding six different conversations without being detected by each other.

A student can be recorded with or without his knowledge. Then this can be played back. The student is able to hear his errors and compare his pronunciation with that of the teacher or native speaker.

This Language Lab will be used in Latin I, II, Spanish I, II and German Classes next year.

Burel Block is the foreign language instructor. He has taught four years in Muleshoe.
