## PANTHERS BLANK HORNETS 40-0; TRAVEL TO CROSS PLAINS FRIDAY

The Panthers showed the fans that they were ready to play Friday night when they hosted the Rochelle Hornets in an 8-A district tilt, as they hit for a quick touchdown and then coasted to a 40-0 win.

The Big Red took over the ball after allowing the Hornets only two plays as Ricky Hunter intercepted a second down pass by the Hornets on the Rochelle 44. Following a 3 yard run, Mark Swanner broke loose for 15 and a first down. Another running play got 6. Then Rhett Harrison took the ball up the middle for 12 and a first down at the 13. Then after the Panthers were penalized 5 yards, Swanner got loose again and raced the 13 yards to score with 9:28 left in the period. The kick failed and Gorman led 6-0.

The Panthers held the Hornets after the kick and they punted to the Big Red. The punt came out to the 35 where Swanner caught it and brought the fans to their feet on a fine return for the touchdown with 8:07

left. Again the kick failed and Gorman led 12-0.

Then history repeated itself as the Big Red defense again held the Hornets and forced a punt. Then the whole stands came alive as Swanner took the punt on his own 17 and with beautiful open field running, he went all the way for the score with 4:25 left in the first. This time the PAT was good and the Panthers had a 19-0 first quarter lead.

The Panthers scored again with 10:31 left in the half, going 68 yards in 6 plays, overcoming two penalties for 20 yards. Eddie Pettit raced the final 16 yards on a great run for the TD. The drive featured a 29 yard pass to Ricky Hunter for a crucial first down following a 15 yard penalty. Again the kick failed and the score rose to 25-0.

Then the reserves took over for the Panthers. The Panthers scored again with 4:18 left in the half when Swanner kicked an 18 yard field goal to make the score 28-0. The field goal was set up by a blocked punt by Jimmy Woodall on the Rochelle 11.

Following the intermission the Panthers took the ball on their own 40 and the reserve Panthers took it all the way on just 4 plays and a 15 yard penalty on the Big Red. Eddie Pettit, running from the quarterback position, rolled out, hit the secondary and raced for 60

yards before being overtaken on the Hornet 3. From there Jimmy Woodall scored on a run with 10:03 left in the third. The kick failed and the score read 34-0.

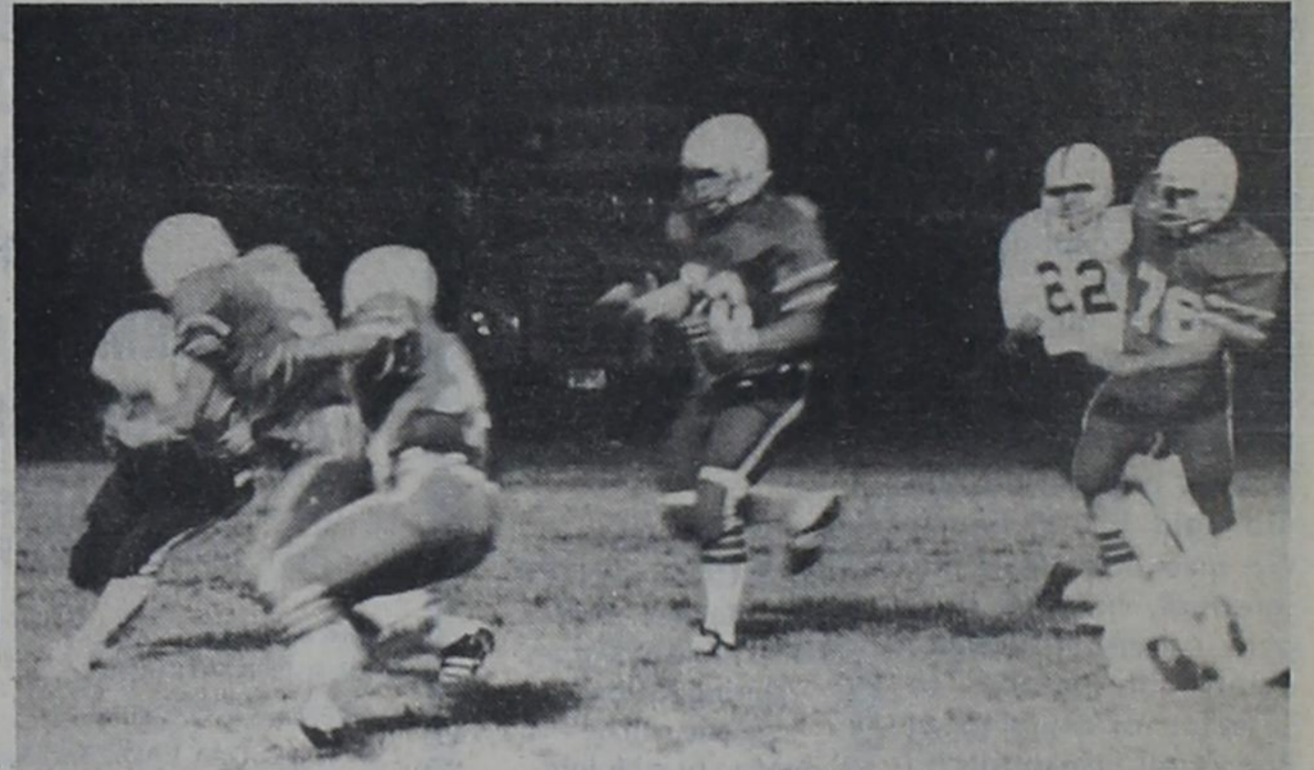
The final Panther score came with 20 seconds left in the third with Jacky Johnson going the final 12 yards. The drive featured runs of 12, 7, 7 and 12 by Johnson. The kick failed and the final score read 40 to 0.

The Panther defense had little trouble stopping the Hornet offense and the Panther offense just proved too much for the Hornets, what little the Panther regulars got to play. Pettit led the Panthers with 78 yards on just 3 tries. Swanner had 53 yards on just 6 carries. Jacky Johnson got 38 on 4. Woodall had 31 on 4. Zachary Wilcox ran for 24 on 6 tries. Harrison had 19 just carrying the ball 4 times. Hunter got 15 on 2 totes. All the Panther reserves saw action in the game.

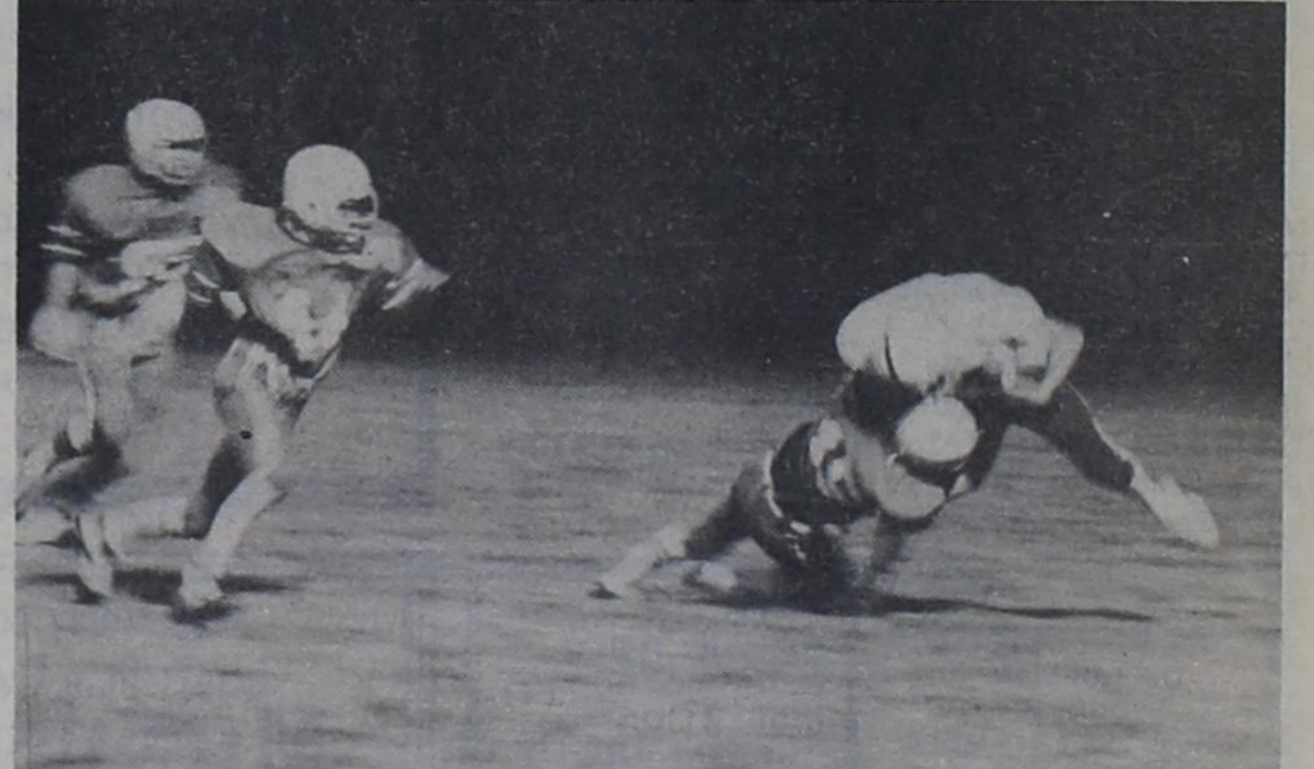

## Green Thumbers Attend Training Clinic

For the hundreds of older workers in the Green Thumb senior employment program, responsibility has been a way of life, an essential part of the traditional work ethic that most older persons accept. But as 125 Green Thumb workers meeting at the Miels County Senior Center in Goldthwaite learned recently, responsibility goes beyond caring for jobs and

families; it also means being responsible for your own health. "Working hard is the most important thing in many people's lives," said Green Thumb state director Diane Parrish of Waco. "Yet what most of us don't think about is that we can't work if we aren't healthy, and to be healthy we have to take care of ourselves." Green Thumb provides part time work in public service agencies for low-income persons 55 and over. Texas Farmers Union sponsors the program, which operates in 108 counties

across the state. Parish emphasized that it is far better to prevent a disease than to deal with it after it has attacked the body, and in a film produced by the American Occupational Medical Association, the Green Thumbers learned how diet, exercise, and good habits can forestall the onset of disease. Another way to maintain good health is to avoid accidents, and in recognition of this fact, Mrs. Parrish presented safety awards to all Green Thumbers with no job accidents in the past five years.

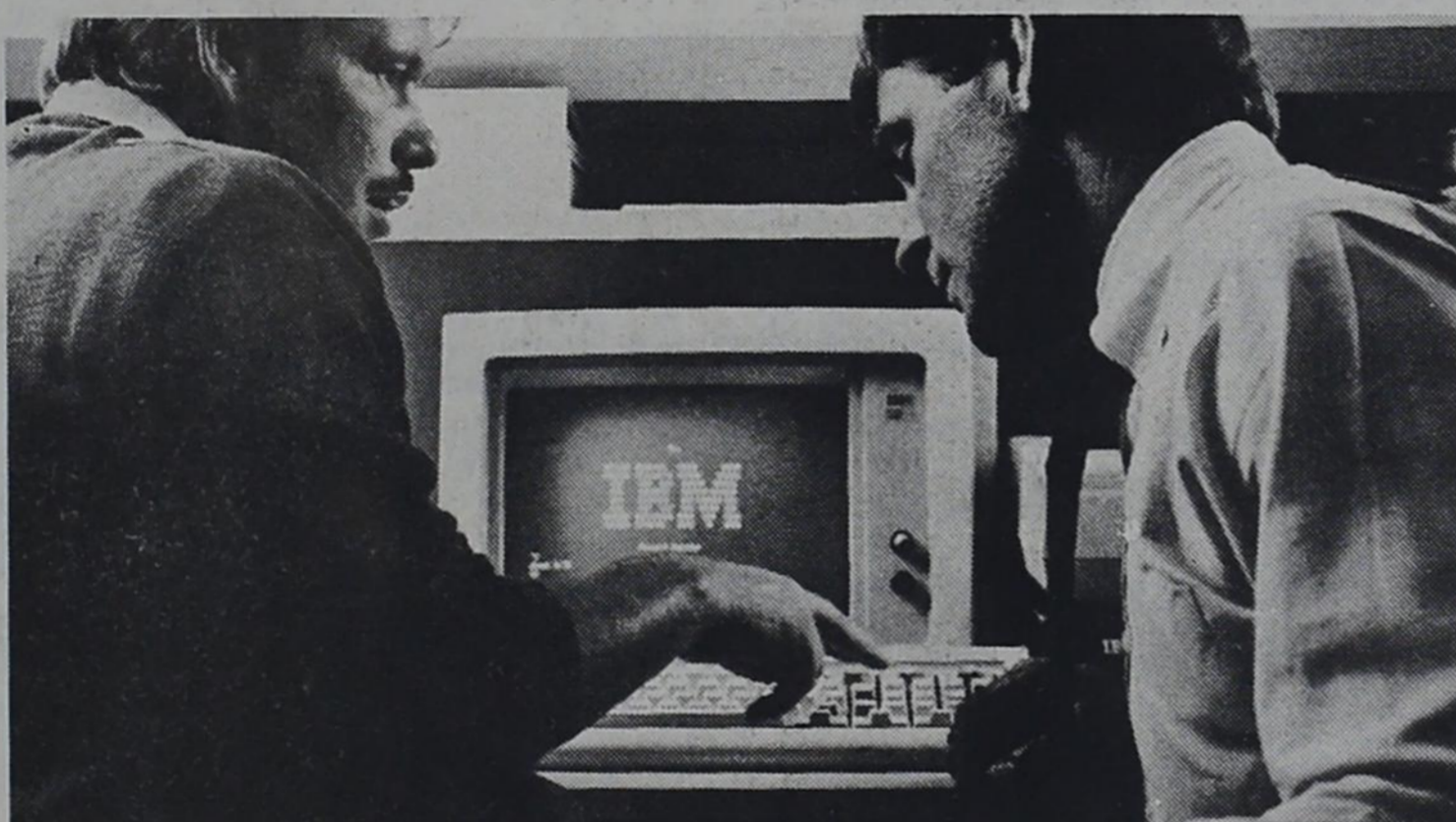

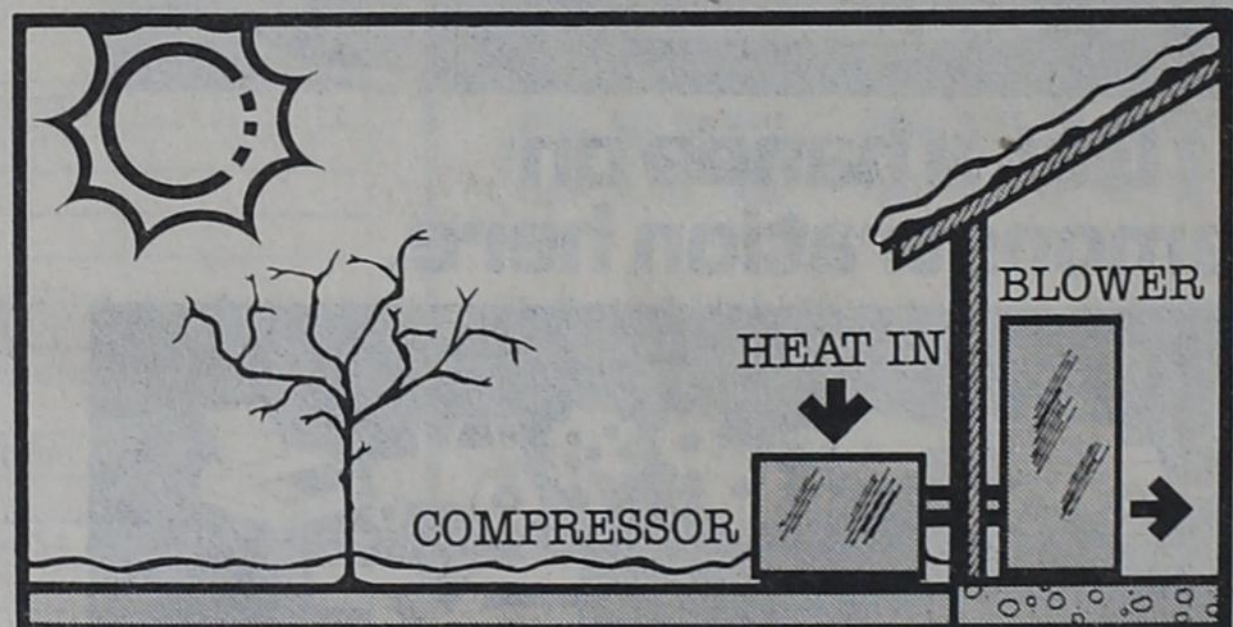
