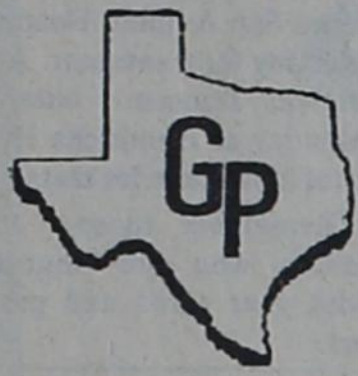

Art, for Oriental thought, does not stop at the work done. The work is brought to completion, the work exists, only when it is seen - as a meeting place where two minds (the artist's and the beholder's) join one another.

# PANTHERS DECLAW THE TIGERS 35-16; TRAVEL TO RISING STAR

The Panthers have assured themselves of a playoff berth with a 35 to 16 victory over the Blanket Tigers at Brogdon Field Friday night.

The Panthers will be the runner-up team in the playoffs no matter what the outcome of the game Friday night at Rising Star. Gorman will play the winner of the Midland Greenwood-Klondike game this Friday night at Sweetwater on Friday night, Nov. 18. The time has not been set as yet, but both teams have agreed that whoever wins they will play Gorman at Sweetwater.

In the game with Blanket Friday night the Panthers jumped to a 16 point lead at the end of the first period and extended their lead to 22 to 0 before the Tigers could muster a drive. The halftime score was 22 to 8. Then the Big Red insured the victory with 13 more points in the final period.

The Panthers showed the home crowd that they were ready to play as they took the ball on their first possession at their own 21 and went the distance in just 5 plays with Rhett Harrison breaking loose up the middle on a beautiful run that brought the crowd to their feet with 9:02 left in the period. The drive featured

a 16 yard run by Mark Swanner and a 14 yard run by Ricky Hunter. Swanner added the two pointer on a run and the Big Red were out in front 8-0.

Then the Panthers held the Tigers again and took the ball on their own 18 and scored in 8 plays with Swanner getting the final 9 yards on a run with 29 seconds left in the first period. The drive featured runs of 7, 13, 4 and 17 by Mark and runs of 31, 2 and 12 by Ricky Hunter. Mark added the two pointer on a run and Gorman led 16-0.

The Big Red again held the Tigers and took the pigskin on their own 8 yard line after a fumble recovery by Ricky and moved the distance in just 9 plays with Mark getting the final 2 yards on a run with 4:06 left in the half. The drive featured runs of 57 yards by Mark, 8 by Mark, and 8 and 5 by Ricky, and 5 and 1 by Rhett. The pass try for two points failed and the Panthers led 22 to 0.

Just before the half the Tigers got a drive started from their 39 and scored in 5 plays with Oscar Soto getting free up the middle on a 31 yard run with 2:07 left in the half. Carey Darden added the two pointer on a run and the score read 22-8.

The teams played on even terms the rest of the half and through the third period before the Panthers started a drive in the fourth quarter on the Tiger 31 and scored in 5 plays with Mark getting the final 13 yards on a run with 9:20 left in the period. The drive featured runs of 9 and 12 by Mark, and 1 and 4 by Rhett before

Mark's 13 yard run. The kick for point failed and Gorman led 28 to 8.

The Panthers added another score with 2:09 left in the game with Ricky Hunter bringing the fans to their feet on a marvelous 70 yard run. Mark kicked the PAT and Gorman led 35 to 8.

The Tigers came back with a score with 22 seconds left in the game with a run of 1 yard by Carey Darden. The Tigers moved 65 in 10 plays. A pass to Roland Diaz added the two pointer and the final score read 35 to 16.

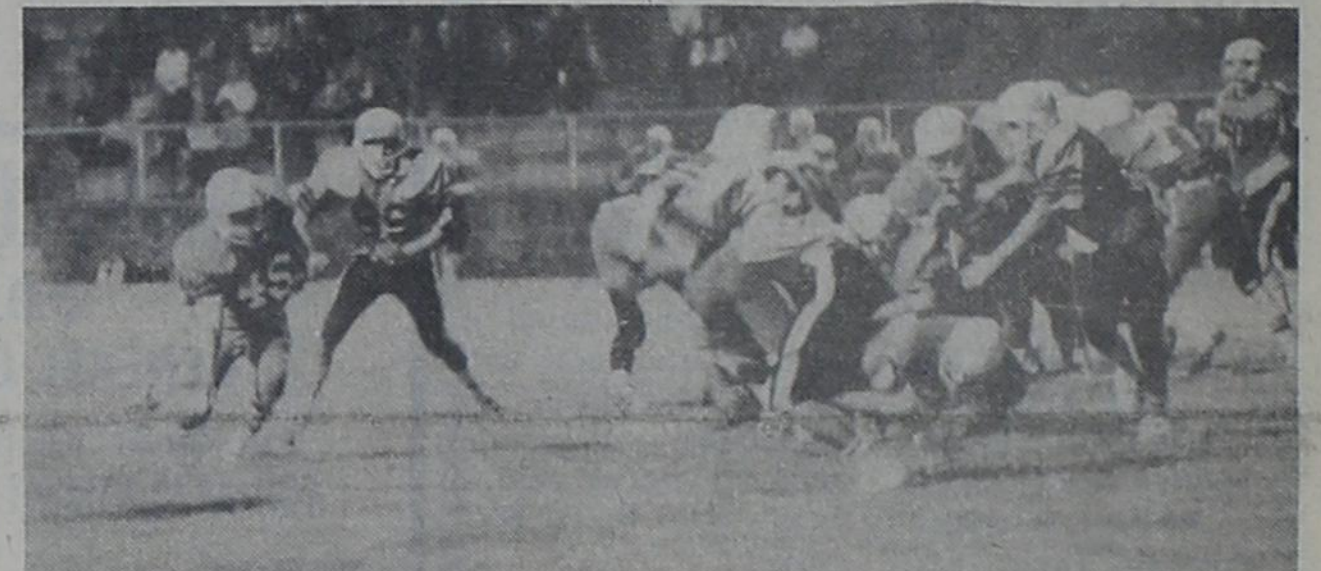
The Big Red defense did a fine job of stopping the Tigers most all evening or at least until the outcome was decided. Our defense has really come along this season and has shown real improvement from week to week.

Swanner led the Panthers on the ground with 193 yards on 27 carries. Hunter had 136 on 12 and Harrison got 112 on 10 tries. Seaton had 3 yards on 4 keepers or pass tries.

This Friday night the Panthers travel to Rising Star to take on the Wildcats in a game that will not affect the district race. The Panthers will need to continue their fine play, however, to keep up their momentum going into the playoffs. The Wildcats have a good team and the Big Red defense will be put to the test, but we feel they will come through again to make their season record 9 and 1.

Lets all follow the Big Red to Rising Star and back them to victory.

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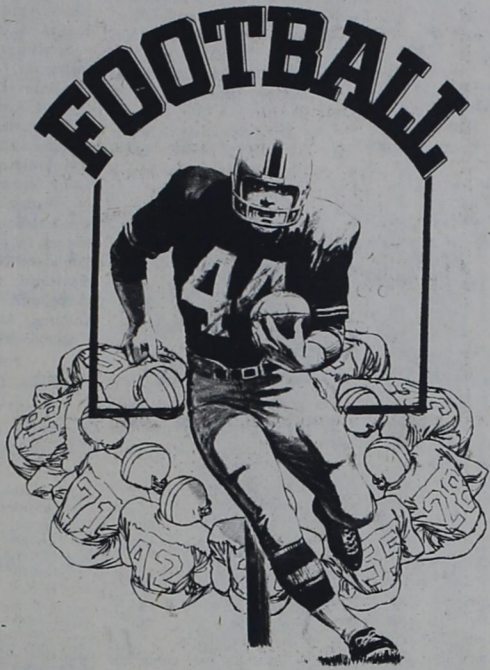

## CAPITOL UPDATE

by Jim Parker



A topic you may have heard about recently and which I believe will be another of the major issues next session is health care for indigents. This is a major problem for both small counties which cannot afford major hospital and medical care for their indigents as well as for large counties with county hospitals which cannot afford the costs incurred serving the indigents from another county.

While Texas does spend state dollars for preventive health costs such as immunizations, well-baby clinics, etc., the state does not provide services for people who are already sick and might need surgery and hospital care. The people who qualify for AFDC (Aid to Families with Dependent Children) are also eligible for Medicaid which provides federal dollars for medical care for indigents; however, there are many indigents in Texas who do not qualify for AFDC because they do not have dependent children who are in dire need of medical care but go without because they cannot pay.

I know of no one who believes the poor should be denied medical care; yet, by the same token, I know of no one who has suggested an acceptable plan for paying for indigent health care costs. Small counties with just a few thousand people do not begin to have a county budget which could pay several thousand dollars or more for an indigent with a serious injury or accident; however, it hardly seems fair for the taxpayers of the county in which the hospital is located to be responsible for the medical costs of indigents from surrounding counties as well as their own.

Some believe the problem could be solved easier if there were one statewide definition of "pauper" or indigent rather than a different one for every county, city and hospital district. That seems like a logical suggestion and certainly

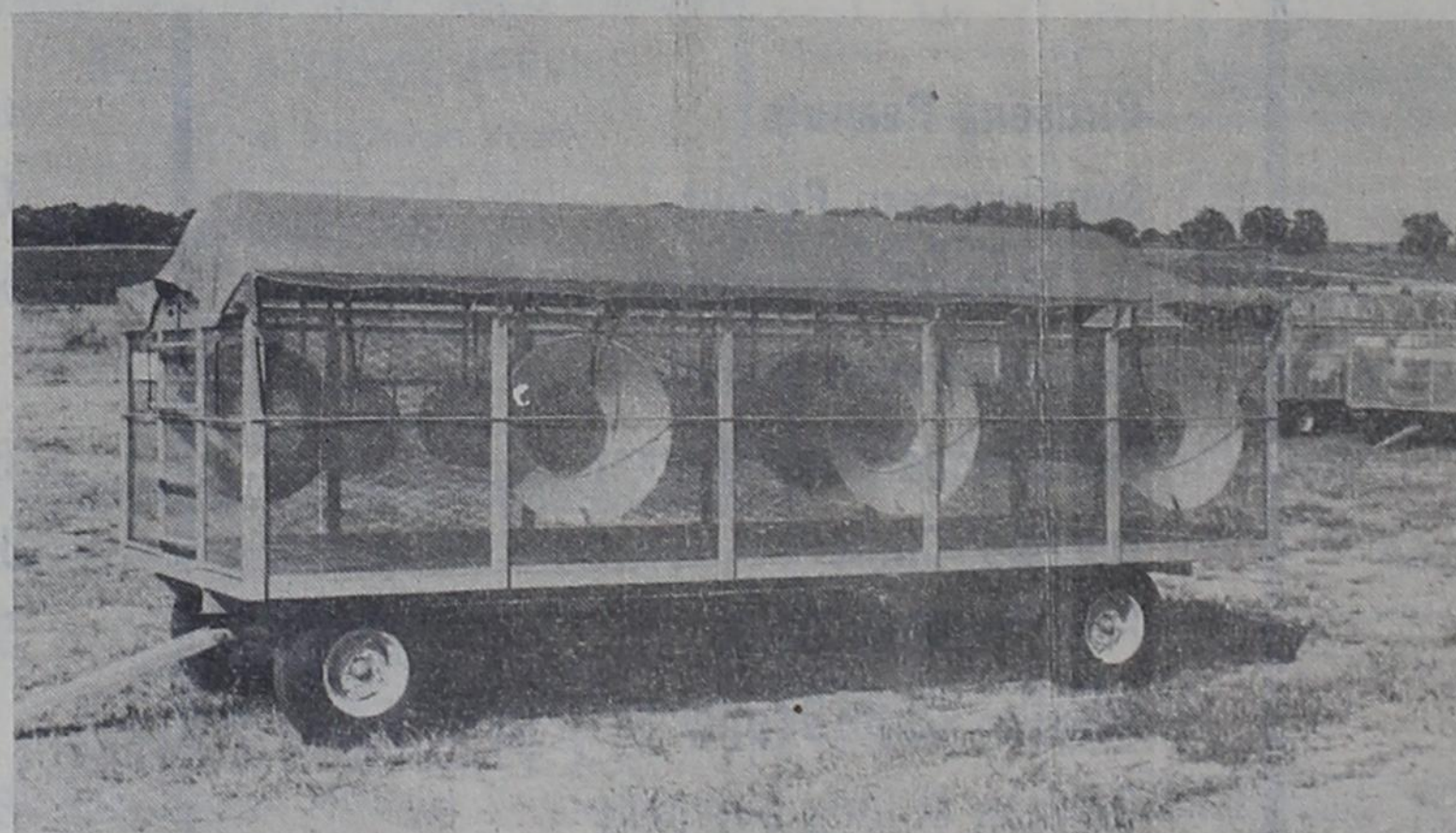

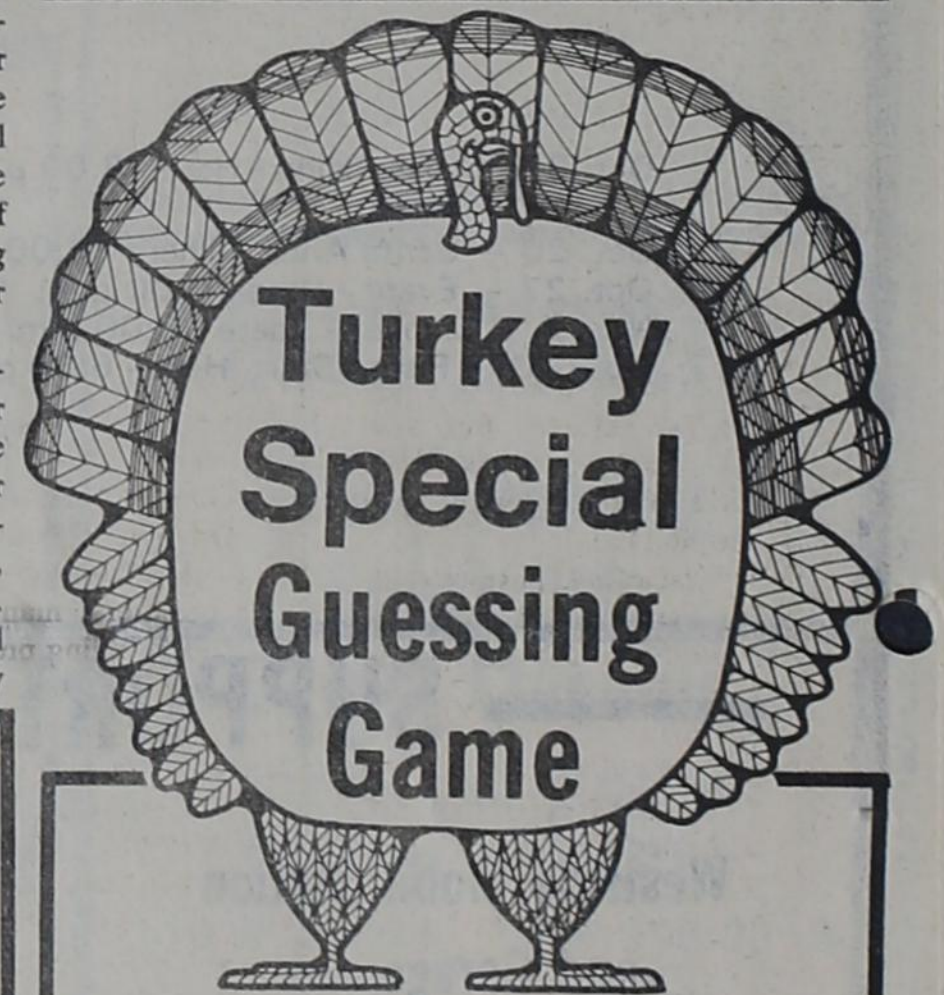

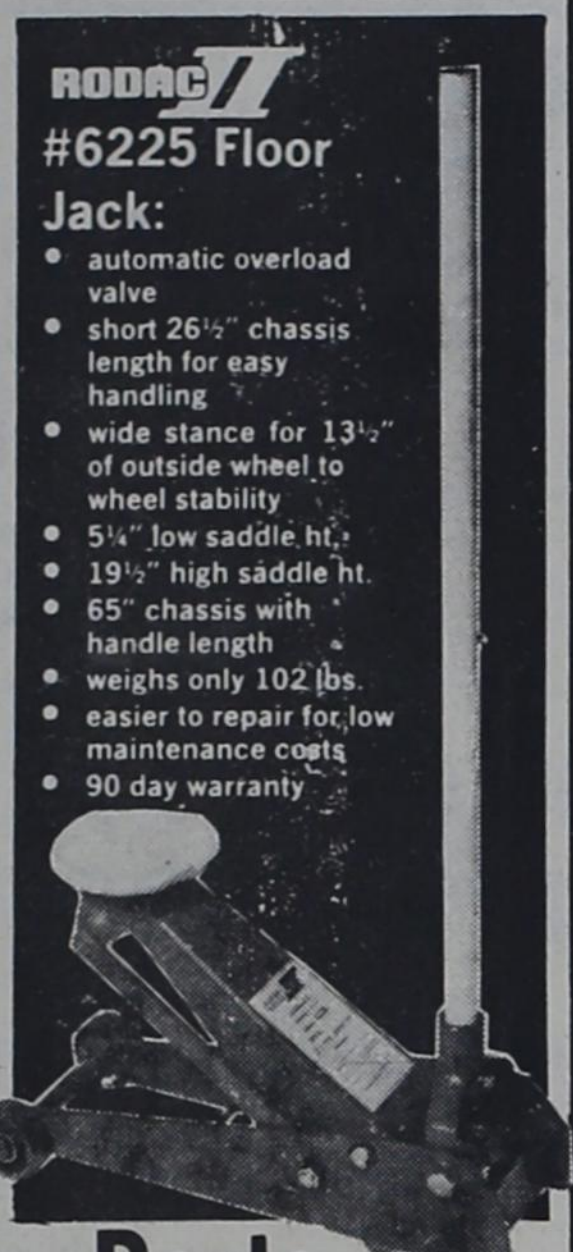

**More News and Views From Blackwell Hospital**

(This is a weekly column provided as a public service to this community on behalf of the physicians, staff, and management of Blackwell Hospital).

It's tough enough to put up with the high cost of inflation especially in medical bills. Then there are all those billing problem; Yeah...you know, the ones that just "stick in your craw" like the hospital bill that you get after you've already paid it or the one that takes the insurance company forever to pay its portion, and so on. Well...here's something you really ought to know!

**YOUR HOSPITAL BILL: ITEMIZING THE FACTS**

Most of the difficulty folks have with hospital bills is the amount they've got to pay for their health. In later issues, we will get into this subject very deeply so you'll know exactly about every dollar you pay for medical care. But, now let's discover why you may have problems with your hospital bill.

First of all, hospital billing systems and collection procedures are very little different from what you're used to with most other businesses (ie., J.C. Penneys, Sears, etc.). You buy a product or service, then you must pay for it. You usually have to pay immediately unless you're buying on credit; or, as with hospitals, insurance claims must be filed first.

Since this is the computer age, most businesses have automatic billing systems. For example, when you open a charge account at Sears by buying something on credit, your name, address, and balance due are entered into a computer master file. The computer will send you a bill every month for a specified amount. If you fail to pay this amount, the computer is programmed to continue sending you bills until eventually your account is taken over by a collection agency.

By the way, if you think that hospital collection procedures are unfair, see

what happens when you stop making payments on your car, or your house, or your utilities and telephone. See if your car doesn't get repossessed, your home mortgage foreclosed and auctioned by the bank, your utilities and phone cut off. But, what can a hospital do, repossess your health? Nonsense!

Anyway, going back to computers, many of a patient's billing problems are a result of computer timing. When a patient is discharged from the hospital, all charges are compiled or batched and then keyed into a computer. The computer goes through a specific time cycle regardless of when a patient pays the bill. This is why many patients in some cases will receive a computer generated statement of balance due even after they have already paid it...timing! Patients with insurance may get a computer generated statement before the insured amount has been paid. This is because insurance companies must have time to process the claim...again timing! By the way, many insurance claims are delayed because all the information needed to process the claim is not available. This is especially true of patients who come to the hospital too ill to provide information, or be-reaved relatives are too preoccupied to provide the

correct information. Some patients even forget to carry an insurance card, give the wrong policy number, or simply do not know their policy number. All these factors cause delays in insurance claims. But meanwhile the billing system continues its computerized sequence and former patients will continue to get statements, bills, and letters until the entire bill, according to the computer, has been paid and the account cleared off the system. Even if the patient has already paid the deductible (that is, the specific amount that a patient must pay before any benefits are assigned), the billing system will continue to send statements and letters until the insurance company pays its portion and the patient pays the coinsurance (that which the insurance company will not pay, usually 20% of the balance after the deductible has been paid). In other words, all debts must be cleared off the patient's account before the billing cycle stops.

By the way, patients will usually get two bills, one from the hospital for its charges and one from the doctors. Hospitals are not responsible nor do they have any control over what the doctor charges a patient. We'll continue with more about your bill next week.
