



While Texas does spend state dollars for preventive health costs such as immunizations, well-baby clinics, etc., the state does not provide services for people who are already sick and might need surgery and hospital care. The people who qualify for AFDC (Aid to Families with Dependent Children) are also eligible for Medicaid which provides federal dollars for medical care for indigents; however, there are many indigents in Texas who do not qualify for AFDC because they do not have dependent children who are in dire need of medical care but go without because they cannto pay.

I know of no one who believes the poor should be denied medical care; yet, by the same token, I know of no one who has suggested an acceptable plan for paying for indigent health care costs. Small counties with just a few thousand people do not begin to have a county budget which could pay several thousand dollars or more for an indigent with a serious injury or accident; however, it hardly seems fair for the taxpayers of the county in which the hospital is located to be responsible for the medical costs of indigents from surrounding counties as well as their

Some believe the problem could be solved easier if there were one statewide definition of "pauper" or indigent rather than a different one for every county, city and hospital distirct. That seems like a logical suggestion and certainly



More News and Views From Blackwell Hospital

Gorman, Texas

(This is a weekly column provided as a public service to this community on behalf of the physicians, staff, and management of Blackwell Hospital).

It's tough enough to put up with the high cost of inflation especially in medical bills. Then there are all those billing problem; Yeah...you know, the ones that just "stick in your craw" like the hospital bill that you get after you've already paid it or the one that takes the insurance company forever to pay its portion, and so on. Well...here's something you really ought to know!

YOUR HOSPITAL BILL: ITEMIZING THE FACTS

Most of the difficulty folks have with hospital bills is the amount they've got to pay for their health. In later issues, we will get into this subject very deeply so you'll know exactly about every dollar you pay for medical care. But, now let's discover why you may have problems with your

hospital bill. First of all, hospital billing systems and collection procedures are very little different from what you're used to with most other businesses (ie., J.C. Penneys, Sears, etc.). You buy a product or service, then you must pay for it. You usually have to pay immediately unless you're buying on credit; or, as with hospitals, insurance claims

must be filed first. Since this is the computer age, most businesses have automatic billing systems. For example, when you open a charge account at Sears by buying something on credit, your name, address, and balance due are entered into a computer master file. The computer will send you a bill every month for a specified amount. If you fail to pay this amount, the computer is programmed to continue sending you bills until eventually your account is taken over by a collection

By the way, if you think that hospital collection procedures are unfair, see

what happens when you stop making payments on your car, or your house, or your utilities and telephone. See if your car doesn't get repossessed, your home mortgage foreclosed and auctioned by the bank, your utilities and phone cut off. But, what can a hospital do, repossess you health? Nonsense!

Anyway, going back to computers, many of a patient's billing problems are a result of computer timing. When a patient is discharged from the hospital, all charges are compiled or batched and then keyed into a computer. The computer goes through a specific time cycle regardless of when a patient pays the bill. This is why many patients in some cases will receive a computer generated statement of balance due even after they have already paid it....timing! Patients with insurance may get a computer generated statement before the insured amount has been paid. This is because insurance companies must have time to process the claim ... again timing! By the way, many insurance claims are delayed because all the information needed to process the claim is not available. This is especially true of patients who come to the hospital too ill to provide information, or bereaved relatives are too preoccupied to provide the patients even forget to carry an insurance card, give the wrong policy number, or simply do not know their policy number. All these factors cause delays in insurance claims. But meanwhile the billing system continues its computerized sequence and former patients will continue to get statements, bills, and letters until the entire bill, according to the computer, has been paid and the account cleared off the system. Even if the patient has already paid the deductible (that is, the specific amount that a patient must pay before any benefits are assigned), the billing system will continue to send statements and letters until the insurance company pays its portion and the patient pays the coinsurance (that which the insurance company will not pay, usually 20% of the balance after the deductible has been paid). In other words, all debts must be cleared off the patient's account before the billing cycle

By the way, patients will usually get two bills, one from the hospital for its charges and one from the doctors. Hospitals are not responsible nor do they have any control over what the doctor charges a patient. We'll continue with more about your bill next




