# **More News and Views From Blackwell Hospital**

**YIELD:** 4 portions

(This is a weekly column provided as a public service to this community on behalf of the physicians, staff, and management of Blackwell Hospital).

Many people not connected with hospital operations, and some people who are, have only limited, if any, real knowledge of what it costs to keep a hospital going. In fact, hospital costs seem to be among the biggest mysteries in this country.

### **Mystery Revealed**

(2nd in a series by Dieter Carlton)

Last week I opened up a "can of worms" and gave you some food for thought about hospital costs. Well...do you really want to know what happens to every dollar you spend for health care? If not, you've really no room to gripe. If so, please read on.

The biggest chunk of your dollar, about 49°, or 49% of hospital revenue goes toward paying salaries and benefits to attract and keep quality employees. Now, you may think this is absurd; but, one woman, as she left the hospital, said, "You know, at what they charge, I should have had a fulltime attendant just to wait on me!" That's pretty selfish when little did she know that she did have a full-time attendant. In fact, she had nearly three full-time attendants. That's right! The average hospital must staff at least three fulltime employees per patient to provide proper health care. This doesn't just include nursing personnel. There are also other, apparently invisible people who make the hospital run smoothly. These include pharmacists, x-ray and lab technicians, maintenance and housekeeping people, not to mention business and management personnell who, working together, take care of every patient admitted to the hospital.

simply shut down if they had a hospital's labor costs. So, when you hear about hospitals cutting staff, they are making substantial sacrifices to keep health care costs down.

Then there are other costs, including more than 5<sup>¢</sup> out of every dollar for bad debts by people who won't pay their bills and charity for people who can't pay their bills. Yes, charity! You see, when a person comes to the hospital bleeding badly or suffering a heart attack, it's not important whether or not this person has the ability to pay. A human life is in danger. If this person is "broke" and has no insurance...well, it just cost the hospital hundreds, perhaps thousands of dollars in equipment and manpower to do everything possible to save that life.

Somebody, somewhere has to pay the bill. That's part of the reason health care costs are rising.

The rest of your dollar is committed to...well, 14° for maintenance and equipment, 7° for lease or mortgage, another 17° for utilities and supplies; then there are taxes, depreciation, and insurance. In short, there isn't much left to get rich on or, more realistically, to expand services.

The federal government isn't helping either. Government says that putting a cap on hospital reimbursements (ie., Medicare) is a major key to controlling inflation for the whole nation. Well, that's absurd because all hospital payments represent only about 4.2% of our gross national product (GNP), a pretty small chunk. But, will controls on 4.2% really slow down inflation? NO! In fact, it will worsen inflation. If you are a patient, not on Medicare or Medicaid, the government has already inflated your hospital bill. How? That's easy! The government pays only about 71% of a federally sponsored patient's bill. That means the rest of us must make up to 29% defecit. With mandatory controls, this deficit will get even larger. Hardly a cure for inflation! (to be continued next issue)





The County Judge sits in the dual capacity of law judge and head of the Commissioner's Court, which is really not a court at all in the usual sense of the word, but is, in fact, the governing body of the county. The most dangerous time as far as the grazing of these plants is concerned is following frost when the plant material begins to wilt. Livestock should not be allowed access to the wilted material until it has dried completely. This usually takes three or four days of good sunlight. New plant growth usually bemortality in livestock when comes nontoxic and can be grazed within 10 days to two weeks following a rain. As far as prussic acid

poisoning is concerned, the poison acts rapidly and can kill animals within minutes. In most acute cases, animals become affected within 10 - 15 minutes after eating toxic material and can die in two to three minutes. Symptoms may include a brief period of stimulation followed by depression and paralysis. Signs of colic may be present. Stupor (loss of sensibility), difficult breathing and frequent convulsions may result. Death is caused by suffocation since oxygen remains in the blood and is not exchanged to the tissues. This also causes the blood to appear bright red.

To prevent prussic acid poisoning in livestock we suggest these steps:

Page Six

1. Allow plant material affected by frost to dry thoroughly before grazing. This may require a week or more of good sunlight.

2. Feed animals hay or a supplement before turning them in on plants that may contain prussic acid. Animals that are not hungry will not be affected as seriously by toxic material since their intake will be limited.

3. Remove all animals from the pasture if one in the herd shows any sings of poisoning.

4. Call a veterinarian immediately if an animal appears to be poisoned. An antidote to treat affected animals is highly efficient if given early. This product is available from veterinarians.

5. Have suspect plant material checked by the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratories at College Station or Amarillo. Local veterinarians will happy to submit samples for you.

The overall key to prevent prussic acid poisoning in livestock is to be aware of plant materials that may cause poisoning and then to keep cattle from grazing such plants until a safe


'Right now, our system of bases and yields is a mess," Stenholm said.

"It's not fair to many farmers; it's unpredictable for the rest; and it leaves too much discretion to USDA's bureaucratic whims. It needs to be changed and put into permanent law."

Bases and yields are now set by four-year farm bills, Stenholm said, which makes them subject to the political winds every four years. If the base and yield formulas were in permanthere unless repealed, and farmers would have a better idea how many acres they can plant.
