



I have attended a twenty hour course each year since as required by law. I have served as First Vice President of Eastland County Law Enforcement Association. I am presently serving as secretary and treasury of that organization. I am a member of the Justice of the Peace and Constables Association of Texas.

As a Justice of the Peace you are also a magistrate and ex officio notary public. Some of the duties of Justice of the Peace are to preside over administrative hearings. To perform marriages. To pronounce persons dead that my die of unnatural causes or are not being attended by a physician. To hold inquest. To act as counselor. To conduct hearings on civil cases such as Small Claims Court. The most heard of function of the Justice of the Peace is to act as Judge in minor traffic offences. These duties include trials by jury or appearances before the Judge

The Justice of the Peace is an elected official and is completely separate from the City Government. They have absolutely no power to hire, fire or make any policy for the city.

The Justice of the Peace takes an oath to be fair, honest, impartial and to uphold the Constitution of the United States and the laws of the State of Texas. I feel that to be a Judge, a person must respect the law, set an example and abide by the laws he or she is to enforce. I think that my platform is a very simple one, TO AD-MINISTER JUSTICE.

If this is the kind of Justice of the Peace you want I would appreciate your vote in the May 1st. Democratic Primary.





SOCIAL SECURITY? ME? I'M STILL WORKING!

It is true that you may apply for and be eligible to receive some social security retirement benefits even though you continue to work. If you are age 72 or older, you may receive full social security benefits even

though you continue to work. In 1982, social security beneficiaries under age 65 will be allowed to earn \$4,440 (\$370 a month) and still receive full social security benefits. Beneficiaries who are over age 65, up to age 72 will be allowed to earn \$6000 (\$500 a month) and still receive full social security benefits. Beneficiaries who are age 72 and older may earn any amount of money and receive full social security benefits. The 1978 Amendments to

the Social Security Act contained a provision whereby, beginning with 1982, beneficiaries age 70 and older would be allowed to earn any amount of money and receive full social security, benefits. However, the 1981 Amendments to the Social Security Act have delayed the effective date of this provision for one year. Therefore, for 1982 we will continue, under the old law, to pay full social security benefits to beneficiaries age 72 and older regardless of the amount of their earnings.
