The Wood Basket Of America

Do you know where our wood comes from? If you're like most Americans, you, might have guessed the Pacific Northwest.

In fact, that area is declining as a tree producer. Roughly equal shares of the 1976 softwood supply, used mostly in building houses, came from the Pacific Coast and the South, with smaller amounts from the North and the Rocky Mountains.

A rise of nearly 50 percent is predicted in softwoods from the South in the next 50 years-an estimated six billion cubic feet per year. In contrast, supplies from the Pacific will drop to around three and a half billion by the turn of the century.

The major cause of this decline is the inability of the forest industry lands in the West to maintain ourrent cut levels. The inventory

depleted and new growth will not be adequate to offset the loss in the short future.






