SOUTHWEST PEANUT **GROWERS TO NOMINATE** COMMITTEE MEMBER

Peanut growers of the Southwest -- primarily Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Arkansas and Louisiana -will meet at College Station, Texas, on March 25 to elect a grower member and alternate to the Peanut Administration Committee, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA).

The meeting is scheduled for 10:00 a.m., in the Soil and Crop Science Building, Texas A&M University, College Station, Texas, in conjunction with a combined meeting of the Texas Peanut Producers Board and the Texas Peanut Growers Association.

Lane Campbell, Peanut Administrative Committee Field Representative, will conduct the nomination. Campbell explains that the Peanut Committee administers the Peanut Marketing Agreement. The committee is made up of growers, shellers, and the area association managers, and recommends peanut marketing regulations to be issued by the Secretary of Agriculture under the Agreement. These regulations apply generally to the entire industry.
