



ARMY PRIVATE THOMAS W. ISBELL NOW AT FORT ORD

FT. ORD, CALIF. (AHTNC) — Army Private Thomas W. Isbell, 19, son of Mr. and Mrs. Dewey W. Isbell, Gorman, Texas, is assigned to Fort Ord, California where he is training under the modern volunteer Army field experiment.

The new concept, called Volar, combines basic and advanced individual training into a single 16-week program. Decentralized instruction at the unit level and a reduction of formations and inspections gives the soldier more time to train and increased off-duty time. Fewer restrictions on off-duty travel and improved living facilities are other benefits of the Volar concept.

Pvt. Isbell began his training on September 13 and is scheduled to complete the first phase on November 5th.

His wife, Ollie, lives at 2716 Parrott, Waco, Texas.
