The South Eastland County Hospital District has been thru some very bad times in the past, but fortunately most of the difficult times are in the past. We know that all problems have not been resolved, nor will all problems ever be completed or solved.

True there are problems that need to be worked out, but these are minor compared to the reality that the Hospital would have closed on April 30, 1980 if the Board had not responded with a positive attitude.

We think the future looks very bright for the District in 1982. The Hospital Note, and the Bank Note should be paid in full by the end of 1982. Mr. Pond, Board Comptroller, has informed the Board that the District finances are in good, solid shape, and if we do not have

some unexpected expense the District should be solvent by the end of this year.

The present Board welcomes the three newly elected members to the Hospital Board, Graydon Baze, Tommy Clark, and Lane Campbell. These men will be given the oath of office Monday Nite at 7:00 p.m. at the regular meeting of the South Eastland County Hospital District Board Meeting. Other members of the Board that will continue thru this next year are; O.W. Pond, Woodie Beene, Jerry Yates, and James Miears, and we welcome the opportunity of working with all members of the board.

The Board would like to cordially invite anyone to the third Monday nite meetings, especially if you have something on your mind that concerns the District.

## CITY CHIT CHAT

All of you who pay taxes to the City of Gorman should be receiving appraisals of your property within the next three weeks. These will be 100% market values put on your property by the Eastland County Appraisal Board. I am sure that these figures will be the highest that you have seen on your property, but this does not mean that your taxes will increase at the same rate that your values did over last year. A rate will be set on these values to provide money to operate your city. We do not know what the rate will be and won't know until we get the tax roll from the Appraisal Board. You recall that the rate was lowered from \$2.50 per \$100.00 of assessed value in 1980 to \$0.90 per \$100.00 of so called market value that was arrived at by converting the assessment ration to the 100%. After you get your notice you will have a chance to go before a County Review Board if you feel that the figure is too high. The City will have nothing to do in determining values, these will be determined by the Appraisal Board, then the Review Board and then you may appear before the Equalization Board.

We have been notified that the water rates from the Water District will increase by 20% on July 1, 1982. This increase to the city will mean an increase in local water rates. We have not discussed the amount of increase, but for all purposes, it will be a bottom line 20% increase. We hate to have to do this, but we have no choice since we have no other source of water.

**DEADLINE APPROACHES TO APPLY FOR ALL-RISK INSURANCE**

The deadline is rapidly approaching for Eastland County Farmers who want to carry insurance against the possible loss of their peanut crops. All-Risk Crop Insurance District Director, Ardell M. Kalmbach points out applications to insure spring planted crops must be received by April 30th.

A new peanut policy will give better investment protection to farmers who chose All-Risk Insurance this year.

Major policy changes include a guarantee in pounds, coverage on all acres of Quota and non-quota peanuts, lower guarantee reductions for unharvested acreage and a replanting payment provision, according to F. W. Crouch, Jr., Field Operations Director for Federal Crop Insurance.

"In addition, peanut farmers will also benefit from government subsidies on premiums and three coverage level options that have been added to all crops," Crouch said.

The All-Risk Insurance program is designed to provide farmers an economical way to protect against a loss of the record high sums of money they will have to invest in their crops this spring.

To participate in the government backed program, farmers must contact any local agent authorized to sell and service All-Risk Insurance policies.
