



from the punishment of his sins?" Answer: The blood of Jesus Christ. "In whom we have redemption through His blood, the forgiveness of sins, to the riches of His grace" (Eph. 1:7). Jesus was ".....the propitiation for our sins: and not for our's only, but for the sins of the whole world" (1 John 2:2). A propitiation is a substituting sacrifice that would satisfy the justice and holiness of God. Jesus was our propitiation. He took our place. He took what we deserved. God determined that His justice would be satisfied with the payment for our sin by the shedding of the blood of His perfect Son. Jesus' blood is that ransom that was paid (Matt. 20:28), and by Jesus' blood the way of salvation has been provided. Next

The following passage in Romans 8, verses 6-14, lists 6 reasons why we must have the Spirit of Christ residing in our hearts. Let's discuss them one at a time.

This week, we are discussing the third reason that we must have the Spirit of Christ residing in our hearts. according to the writing of Paul to the Church at Rome.

Romans 8:6-14

For to be carnally minded is death; but to be spiritually minded is life and peace. Because the carnal mind is enmity against God: for it is not subject to the law of God, neither indeed can be.

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
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
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
