



Don't put the gardening tools
away for winter. November and winter months are a prime

the winter months are a prime gardening season. This season is an ideal time for planting and trans-planting trees and shrubs in the landscape. In late fall nurseries are restocking with new plants. You will have a good supply to choose from.

November and the Thanksgiving season is the time to look around us at our natural beauty, the beaty of the autumn color cloaked on blackjack, sweet gum, red oak, sumac, and maples, and thank God for a bountiful harvest in a land rich with beauty and goodness.

Examine closely any plants brought into the house for the winter as they may carry scale, an asortment of bugs, an occasiona cutworm, and other pests.

The cleaning operation should start with a yard bath for the plant. Sturdier plants can be sprayed with a garden hose and the more tender varieties may require a sink spray.

Dusting all surfaces of the plant with an all-purpose dust such as rose or tomato dust will aid in the control of the pest problem. Another method is to hold the soil in the flower pot and dip the plant head-first into malathion and water mixture. Then turn it over and dip in the entire pot. The malathion and water mixture should be the same ratio as you would mix if spraying the mixture onto the plant.

**Final Support Price** 1971-Crop Peanuts

A national average support price of \$266.50 per ton for 1971-crop pe a n ut s was announced by the U S. Department of Agriculture. This is \$1.50 more than the preliminary minimum announced on March 1 (Press Release USDA 697-71). The final figure represents 75 percent of the peanut parity price for Aug. 1, the beginning of the 1971-72 marketing year.
