

bargaining power for political parties. With all the new educational programs they are made to feel inadequate, dumb, stupid, and failures. They say, "Why this isn't true." "It's for their own good." I say "you are wrong". Anything that causes children to commit suicide and suffer mental depression is not good for them.

There is far too much pressure put on our children with this new unworkable educational system. They are not allowed to use their natural creative ability, their minds are not allowed the time to grow. They are not allowed the time alone to work out their problems of day to day living.

This seems to have become necessary because of some problems that we have had out there lately. I want you to still be thinking about the idea of contracting this service out to a company. Let me know what you think about this.



Despite reduced inflation, the nation's health bill is still rising three times faster than the Consumer Price Index, and health care analysts expect the 1984 bill to be more than \$380 billion. That works out to more than \$1500 per capita that Americans spent on health care in 1983, ten times more than they spent in 1960.

The response by heakth care professionals, corporations and individuals has been a stronger embrace of the "wellness" concept, a slogan for the old-fashioned idea of prevention and protection. From employee fitness programs and health screen-

ings to emergency medical identification services and new eating habits, individuals and organizations are looking at inexpensive ways to maintain health.

The outcry over the seemingly unstoppable health cost spiral has come from government, the health care industry, insurance companies and consumers — groups that frequently have disagreed with one another. However, all agree that 1983 federal legislation mandating price levels for health care services is the most significant health care reform since Medicare was established in 1967.

They also agree that new rules concerning how much hospitals can charge for their services provide the health care industry and consumers with incentives to keep costs down.

For instance, this means paying a greater share of their health care costs with higher health insurance deductibles. Individuals now only pay 31 percent of the country's total health costs with private insurance plans accounting for 26 percent and government paying 43 percent.

Higher health care deductibles are one reason why indioviduals are looking at ways to "insure" their health. Some new private insurance plans have what are called "health incentives", where the customer is refunded part of his annual premiums if he remains healthy and makes only a specified amount of health claims for that year. Health care observers expect that several versions of this idea will become more prevalent as insurance companies compete for customers.

Corporations and other employers, who now pay the health insurance premiums for three-quarters of the nation's workforce, are also taking steps to reduce health benefits costs. American businesses pay \$80 billion a year in health insurance premiums for their employees.

Companies traditionally paid 100 percent of an employee's health

centage of major corporations requiring employees to pay a portion of health benefits nearly doubled in

Increasingly, companies are instituting "wellness" programs, offering such things as fitness counseling, exercise facilities and health screening as a means of preventing major problems. These programs are designed to reduce the millions of workdays lost to illness and keep insurance premiums from rising.

Many companies have adopted programs designed to identify health risks and improve employee fitness.

Columbia Pictures is one example of a corporation that has developed an employee health program to keep its 2200 employees and the bottom line healthy. The company says its preventative health program is designed to make people aware of what they can do to stay healthy.

"We also think this program demonstrates to employees that the company is committed to them", says Jane Steiner, R.N., Columbia's

director of health. "Companies are becoming more competitive in recruiting people and the benefits package is part of it."

Part of Columbia's health package is a Medic Alert membership program. Medic Alert Foundation is the world's largest emergency medical identification service. It is designed for the millions of Americans who have a special medical condition, such as diabetes or an allergy, that could affect how a person is treated during an emergency. Frequent travelers and those in hazardous jobs can also benefit from the service.

Our health programs are designed to prevent major health problems from occurring," says Steiner.

"Medic Alert is a natural part of the whole package". Columbia pays the \$15 lifetime membership fee for employees who join Medic Alert.


