## RECOUNT REQUESTED IN CONSTABLE ELECTION

The May Primary Election on Saturday showed a fair amount of interest and some very closely contested races.

In the election for Constable of Precinct 5 incumbent Dewey Keesee edged out challenger Brent Foster by a margin of only 6 votes. Keesee polled a total of 371 votes and Foster had 365. The count was so close that Brent has asked for a recount.

IN the first returns it appeared that the margin was 41 votes. However, after all the absentee votes had been added, the count dropped to a margin of 6 votes.

The recount will be held at the Courthouse in Eastland on Saturday morning

at 9. Following the recount the election can be declared official. It will be up in the morning before the results of the recount will be known.

In the election for Commissioner of Precinct 3, the incumbent L. T. Owens out-poled the challenger Albert Lawrence by a margin of only 41 votes.

In the Sheriff's race Don Underwood received a sufficient majority of the votes to win over two candidates and eliminate a possible runoff.

Underwood won out over second place vote getter, incumbent Johnnie Morren and third place man, Albert Biggs.

We will have the results of the recount in next week's paper.

**RECEPTION TO HONOR RETIRING R.O. BAZE**

There was a reception honoring R.O. Baze principal of Siebert Elementary School, Eastland, Sunday, May 6, at the Women's Club in Eastland. Baze is retiring after 19 years as the head of the school having come to Eastland in August, 1965.

Hosts for the reception were the faculty and staff of Siebert Elementary School, and Siebert Elementary P.T.O. They invited the public to come out and

participate in this special occasion.

R.O. Baze was born in Lamesa, but moved to Gorman when quite young, in August 1939. He finished High School there, and went right into the Navy in World War II. He was a Gunner's Mate, Seaman First Class, and served on a Destroyer, D.D. 367, U.S.S. Lamson. This ship went to various places in the South Pacific, patrolling and directing planes.

After the war, Baze enrolled in Hardin-Simmons, and earned his first Degree

there in 1952, and B.S. in Social Studies. He then taught at Olden for two years and Carbon for two, but studied each summer for a Master's Degree in Education at North Texas State University, Denton. He was awarded this degree in 1956, and was then hired for the Ranger School System.

For the next nine years he remained in Ranger, teaching for seven years, and serving as Elementary Principal for two years. He was then hired by Eastland Independent School Dis-

trict, and came to Siebert Elementary.

At the time he began as Principal, the Siebert Elementary building was only a year old. There were 404 pupils and 15 teachers at the school. Now there are 540 students and 28 teachers, with 10 part-time or full-time aides. Among these are resource teachers, speech and a reading teacher, a "Migrant teacher", who works with children of seasonal workers, and a full time music teacher.

"My hope has been," Baze states, "to provide instruction which gives these children a good foundation for the upper grades and any University they wish to attend. Through the years I have stressed phonics-have put a lot of importance in reading."

Mr. Baze and his wife, Meredith have a home on South Seaman St. Meredith Baze works as an office aide in the Superintendent's office at the High School, and also as an office aide at Siebert Elementary. The couple have a son, David, who lives with his wife, Leisa, in Oklahoma City. David, a graduate of Texas A&M, sells, installs and services equipment for an Oil Field Supply Company.

Baze says a hammer and saw are waiting for him at his home on South Seaman, with enough work to keep him entertained for a long time. But he will always have a special feeling for the youngsters who have attended Siebert Elementary.

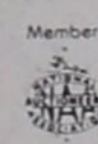

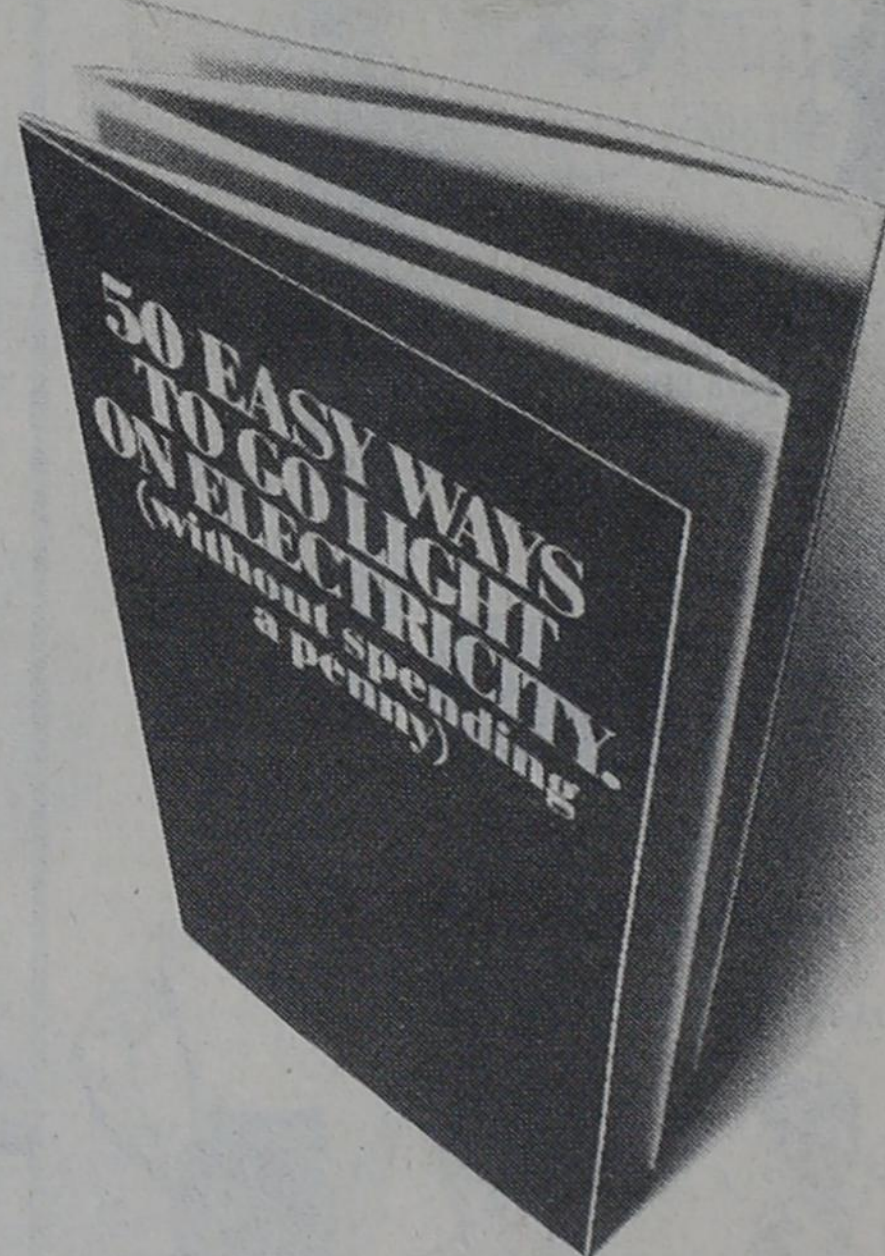
