## Lady Panthers Softball Team Win District 7-A

The Lady Panthers came away with a big 22-10 win over Santo Lady. Cats on Friday April 6, thus clinching a playoff spot. The Lady Panthers were led at the plate by Rachel Rainey, who goes 5/ or 5 with 2 triples, a double, and two singles. Emerald Guthery gets her 3rd homerun for the year in going 2 for 5 with 4 RBI's.

Mandy Warren and Eva Rodriquez lead off the game with consecutive walks followed by Rainey's triple who later scores on a wild pitch. The Lady Panthers are up 3 to 1 after the 1st inning. Lydia Royster tallies one in the second as she walks and zips around the bases on passed balls. The Lady Cats score 2 runs in their 1/2 of the inning to make it a 4-3 game. Guthery leads off the 3rd with a homerun, Rainey follows with her 2nd triple, Christina Mauney walks, Jamie Maupin singles. Then with 2 outs, Emma Marin walks, Mandy Warren singles in a run, Rodriquez walks, Guthery drives in 2 with a double, Rainey doubles and drives in Guthery, Melinda Leal singles and Mauney singles driving in both of them. 


#### **Eastland County Beef Field Day**



## Agricultural Viewpoint

#### Farm Income Projected Due to Increases in Fuel, Fertilizer Costs

Net incomes for farmers are expected to continue declining this year with low commodity prices and high fuel and fertilizer costs. According to a report from the Agricultural and Food Policy Center at Texas A&M, cotton farmers who rely heavily on irrigation will see those costs continue to rise even through 2005. Economist James Richardson says producers are finding innovative ways to make their operations more efficient. Many producers are reducing chemical use, labor hours, and machine hours while improving their marketing skills. The study indicates that most operations need to increase net income 10 to 20 percent to prevent the loss of real net worth.

#### **Texas Crop and Weather Report**

Lush forage is causing bloat and some death in Texas cattle. Bloating has been a problem in the South Plains and has been increasing as weather improves and the forage becomes lush. Bloat occurs when forage begins to grow after being dormant all winter. High soil moisture will cause increased growth and add to bloating problems. The only way to completely prevent bloat is to take the cattle off pasture. If producers do that, then they will have to spend money maintaining cattle in a different program. The incidence of these problems lessens as forage matures and protein content decreases. It is always wise not to turn hungry cattle into a fresh pasture, because there is more of a chance of bloat.

#### Pause To Think

Matthew 13:54-58

And when he was come into his own country, he taught them in their synagogue, insomuch that they were astonished, and said, Whence hath this man this wisdom, and these mighty works? Is not this the carpenter's son? is not his mother called Mary? and his brethren, James, and Joses, and Simon, and Judas? And his sisters, are they not all with us? Whence then hath this man all these things? And they were offended in him. But Jesus said unto them, A prophet is not without honour, save in his own country, and in his own house. And he did not many mighty works there because of their unbelief.

No doubt, the Lord Jesus had a great desire to do mighty works and wonders in his own country, among his own kin. However, his wisdom, power, and authority offended them. They were offended because of their 'knowledge' of him, but the truth is they really didn't know who he was. They just thought they did. They refused to believe that he was more than just a carpenter's son; the son of Mary, and the brother of James, Joses, Simon, and Judas.

In this passage we learn that it was those closest to him that put the most restraint upon him. They limited him in their minds and hearts. They did so because their knowledge of him could not be expounded upon. The felt that they knew all there was to know about him. They could have accepted him just fine, had he not manifested spiritual prowess. It was his phenomenol wisdom and mighty works that did not compute with what they knew about him.

When we thoroughly examine God's Word, there is of course a multitude of things presented to us. However, I would like to discuss one in particular that has concerned me every since I surrendered to the call of Ministry, thus dedicating more time to the study of the Bible.

Throughout Biblical History, there were those who were supposed to be in the know as far as Spiritual matters are concerned, yet we find these folk missing God's plan. We see this time after time. Let's examine a couple of incidents.

Moses struck the rock. Perhaps he did so, because that was what worked the last time they had needed water. The scholars of the law and prophecy were blind to the birth of a child in Bethlehem. They resisted the ministry prophesied about in Isaiah 61:1. The Spirit of the Lord GOD is upon me; because the LORD hath anointed me to preach good tidings unto the meek; he hath sent me to bind up the brokenhearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, and the opening of the prison to them that are bound.

In Luke 4:18-29, Jesus declared to the religious leaders of that day that he was the fulfillment of Isaiah 61:1, yet they were filled with wrath instead of joy. He was who they professed to be looking for, the Messiah. Yet, what they thought they knew about the Messiah did not agree with what they 'knew' of Jesus.

Jesus was trying to share the secret of eternal life to a group of Pharisees (the 'spiritual leaders' of that day) in John 8: 51-59. They became so angry with him that they took up stones to stone him, why? The answer is simple. Who he was and what he was saying, did not harmonize with what they 'knew' of spiritual things. Please understand that I am not discrediting them for their spiritual efforts, however, it is plain to see that somewhere along the way they began to trust in a carnal interpretation of God's Word and prophetic utterances.

Are we hindering revival, spiritual maturity, separation to God from the world, and the full magnitude of God's power in our lives because of what we 'know' about God?






