Don Underwood stated this week that he wants to be your sheriff for the next four years. Don believes that he can show the people of Eastland County a great change in the number of crimes committed, by carrying out the duties of Sheriff of Eastland County as he has been trained. By using qualified help, by good investigation, by presenting accurate and factual cases to the Grand Jury, and by being experienced in court procedure and capable of testifying to facts in court.

Don believes it is unimportant who makes an actual arrest which department gets the credit as long as the case is solved in a legal manner. Meaning, no loop holes for a guilty person to crawl through and be free on a technicality.

Don has proven that he is capable of this by his record as Sheriff of Nolan County. During Don's first year in office there, 13 murders occurred, not from his failure to protect, but because of growth of the county and former convictions. All 13 murders were solved and found guilty in court. The last year Don served as

## 'Something For Our Children' Project Underway Here

A joint project which we will dub "Something For Our Children" was made a reality on Tuesday evening at a called meeting of the City Commission, the Gorman Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors and Gorman youth and their sponsors at the Senior Center.

The Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors came up with the idea of a joint project at their last meeting when the idea of what the proceeds from the Miss Gorman and Little Miss Gorman Contest could be directed at this year. The Board of Directors were contacted by a representative of the youth in an attempt to seek their help and input on the problem of finding a building for their Teen Center.

The City Commission in an attempt to improve the Fire Hall Building, had contacted a contractor to seek a bid on an exterior project for the Fire Hall. The building was to be

scrapped and the bad wood to be replaced prior to two coats of paint being put on the building. At the request of the Chamber Directors a meeting was set up for the group to get together and make some definite plans for renovation of the fire hall so that a portion of the building could be made into the Teen Center which is so desperately needed by the youth of our community. At the meeting the Chamber Board stated their idea to go into a joint project by all parties so that the building could be converted into a Teen Center in the front of the building where the fire trucks are now parked, as they will be housed in a new fire station building as soon as construction can be completed, and the back portion could be renovated and used for elections, community meetings, reunions, and other gatherings.

The City Commission, in a unanimous vote agreed to enter into the project and

put at least the portion of funds to be used for the painting project into the fund. The Chamber Board stated that the proceeds from the upcoming Miss Gorman and Little Miss contest would be put into the fund at least this year and possibly the following year or two if necessary to get the project completed. The Teen Center officers and representatives present for the meeting were overjoyed and stated that all their available funds would be put into the fund. So now the Teen Center finally looks as though it will be a reality - - that is if all the citizens, both old and young, will join in a project to raise the funds to make sure the dream turns into a reality.

A committee composed of two members each of the City Commission, Chamber Board and the president and vice president of the youth group was formed to set up a schedule of what repairs would be done and the order in which the project would be completed in different phases as funds become available.

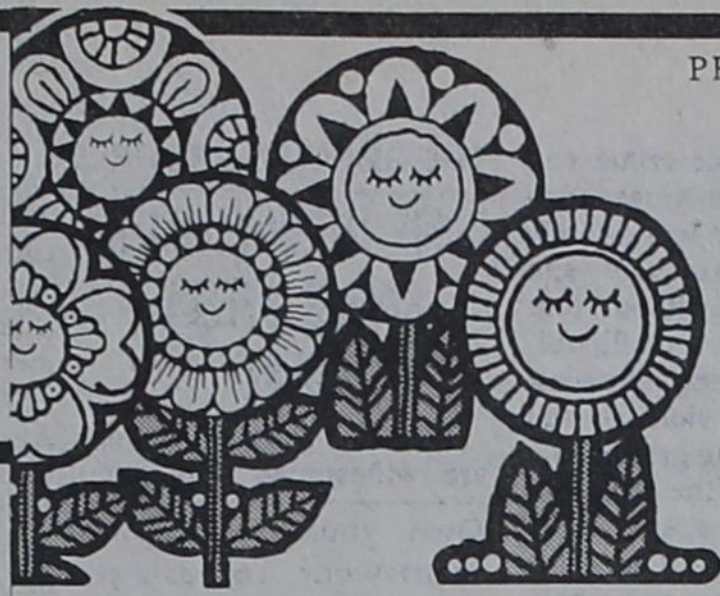

vasive, the elderly are special targets for these abuses, says Nancy Granovsky, a family resource management specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service. According to research conducted by the U.S. Senate Special Committee on Aging, home repair and improvement frauds were the most frequent type of frauds committed against the elderly, she explains. Nationwide, 71% of the elderly own their own homes. The majority of these homes were built before 1940. This combination of the number of elderly who own homes and the age of the dwellings is especially attractive to phony repairmen, notes the specialist.
