Eula Sims Services Held Saturday

Eula Blanche Sims, 90, of Ranger, formerly of Olden, died at 9:25 a.m. Thursday May 10, 1984 at Ranger General Hospital. Services were at 2 p.m. Saturday at Edwards Funeral Home. Burial was at Desdemona Cemetery in Desdemona. Born Dec. 16, 1893, in Refugio, she married James L. Sims in 1915 in Refugio. He preceded her

in death. She was a homemaker and a member of Olden Baptist Church. She had lived in Olden for 28 years before moving to Ranger, where she was a resident at Western Manor Nursing Home.

A son, James L. Sims Jr., died in 1925. Survivors include four daughters, Luzelle Blackwell, Iris Noska and Veda Adams, all of Olden and Alice Niles of Ranger; 10 grandchildren; and 14 great-grandchildren. Grandsons were pallbearers.

PROCTOR WATER SUPPLY MORE THAN ADQUATE

As you are well aware, the current extremely dry conditions are resulting in a continuing depletion of the water stored in Lake Proctor. Although hydrologic studies have indicated that the dependable yield of Proctor is more than enough to supply anticipated uses under all existing water supply contracts through the most severe drought for which records exist, prudence requires the formulation of a management plan to be put into effect in the event of an even more severe drought than has yet been recorded.

As a basis for such a plan, we have identified the lake levels at which enough water will remain in storage to meet the needs of various categories of water users plus evaporation losses for an entire year with no inflow to the lake at all. This would represent more severe drought conditions than any previously known, and is, we believe, as conservative a basis as can be justified for use.

Utilizing this basis, we have developed the following drought management plan to be applied in con-

nection with use of water from Lake Proctor:

1. For contracts dated subsequent to April 30, 1984, use of water for any purposes other than municipal and domestic use shall be discontinued at any time the water level in the Lake is below elevation 1154 feet above mean sea level.

2. When the water level in the Lake drops to elevation 1146 feet, all contractual water users with contracts dated prior to April 30, 1984 will be notified that water will not be available for other than domestic and municipal uses when the Lake level drops another foot.

3. When the water level in the Lake drops to an elevation of 1145 feet, all water uses other than domestic and municipal uses will be stopped.

As of today (Wednesday, May 9, 1984), the water level in Lake Proctor is 1154.71 feet. Please contact Mr. Jim Board or Mr. Pete Pullen at this office if you have any questions about the drought management plan for Lake Proctor.

RAILROAD COMMISSION ASKS ICC FOR STAY IN RAIL REGULATION

The Railroad Commission has asked the Interstate Commerce Commission to stay its April 20 order which removed RRC authority to regulate Texas rail rates, classifications, rules and practices, powers the RRC has exercised since its creation in 1891.

The ICC action denied the Railroad Commission's application for certification to exercise rail regulatory powers in Texas under the

Staggars Rail Act of 1980. The ICC will now exercise those powers.

In its stay application, the Railroad Commission said it would file an appeal of the ICC order with the U.S. Court of Appeals and asked to continue its rail regulation until the court has reviewed the case.

Under the ICC's decision, the Railroad Commission will lose jurisdiction over Texas rail rates on

May 20. According to the RRC, rail carriers and rail shippers will suffer "irreparable harm" if it has to stop regulation May 20 and then prevails in its court challenge later on. The Commission noted to stay would simply maintain the status quo until the court has time to act.

The Railroad Commission also charged the ICC with violating the federal Sunshine Act which requires public notice of meetings where an agency conducts official business. In fact, the ICC said its decision was done by "notation voting," without any meeting of the commissioners at all. The Railroad Commission contended any major decision rendered in such a manner would be invalid.

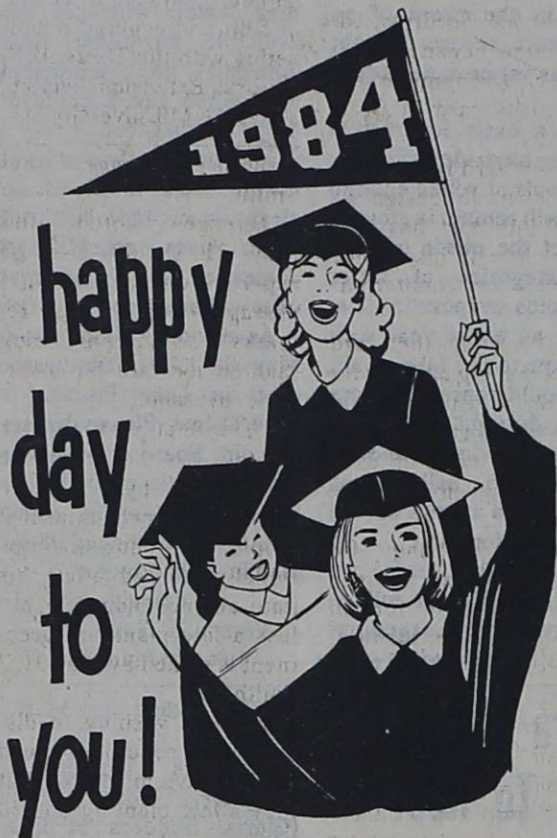



**MAY 31 DEADLINE
FOR COTTON
PLANTING**

May 31 is the final planting date for insured Cotton in Eastland County, Texas, according to Ross Smith, District Director for the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC).

"Acres of Cotton planted by May 31, insured by FCIC (or by a private company reinsured by FCIC), must be reported by June 15 to receive full crop

**Lamination of
SSN Cards**

The Social Security Administration began issuing version of the familiar Social Security card in October 1983.

The new card is the same size and basic design as before, but now has features that will discourage tampering or counterfeiting.

The back of the card shows a mailing address for returning a lost card, and also warns that that card will not be valid if it is laminated (given a plastic coating.)

Anyone applying for their first Social Security card will need to furnish proof of their age, identity, and citizenship or legal residence, and applicants age 18 or older must apply in person. To replace a lost card, only identification is needed, and for a name change, the marriage certificate or other evidence of the change is required.

DIRECT MARKETING
CONSIDERATIONS--**Direct marketing by fruit and vegetable growers, in the form of roadside stands or "pick-your-own" operations, reduces packaging and labor costs and gives the grower personal contact with the buyer. Ingredients of a successful direct marketing operation include location near a major highway, soda facilities, restrooms, a separate entrance and exit, adequate parking and a good advertising program. Growers should offer different varieties and sell only high quality produce. Staggering plantings provides for continuous supplies, says an economist in fruit and vegetable marketing with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Acreage planted after May 31 should also be reported on the June 15 acreage report (in the "remarks" section) as being planted too late for insurance coverage.

"The final planting date of May 31 is the latest date established by FCIC to plant and expect a normal crop to be produced. Crops initially planted after this date are not insurable unless a late planting agreement is signed by May 31," Smith said.


Farmers wishing to discuss local conditions, such as excessive moisture, that may affect planting should contact their local, authorized crop insurance agent as soon as possible.

tem. **BEEF IMPORT LEVELS UNPREDICTABLE--**U.S. beef producers will have to adopt a "wait and see" attitude about import levels for 1984 because of several unpredictable factors, notes a marketing economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. The question at issue is what effect expected increases in cow slaughter resulting from the new dairy program will have on the 1984 import trigger level. Each year the USDA establishes import quotas by adjusting the base level of 1.205 billion pounds. Quotas are imposed if quarterly estimates of annual imports exceed a trigger level designated as 110 percent of the quota level. A trigger level of 1.228 billion pounds was announced last Dec. 30 due to expected impacts of the new dairy program.

SPRING INSECT DANGERS--Spring weather can mean danger for Texans who get bitten or

stung by insects. To reduce contacts with venomous insects, avoid walking around in the yard barefooted; avoid wearing sweet smelling colognes or perfumes; keep ripened fruits, watermelons, soft drink cans or other sweet smelling materials covered when outdoors; and avoid mowing lawns or working in flower beds when bees or wasps are active, usually later in the day.



HOMEMAKING HINTS

More and more Texas families have only one or two members. Meal planning, food buying and meal preparation pose unique problems for singles and couples. These problems prompt many small families to settle for convenience foods and snacks, leading to monotonous meals and poor nutrition.

Lack of variety and leftovers are real problems for many persons who fix, food for a few. Here are some suggestions to help you have variety with a mini-

mum of leftovers.

- *First of all, you might like to mix up your favorite meat loaf recipe, pack it in foil-lined cups of a muffin tin. Leave enough foil to fold over the tops of each individual meat loaf. Freeze. After freezing, remove individual meat loaves from the muffin tin and stack in the freezer.
- *Make up a pound of hamburger into individual patties. Wrap separately and freeze.
- *Save and freeze small leftover bits of meat until

you have enough to make a meat pie. Save and freeze leftover vegetables for stews, soups, or casseroles.

- *Always bake twice as many potatoes as you need. Leftover baked potatoes make delicious creamed or au gratin potatoes the next day. Think of the time and fuel you save!
- *You can save space and equipment by freezing a casserole in a foil-lined dish. After freezing, lift the food from the dish and wrap for freezing. This leaves your casserole dish free for other uses.
- *A small double boiler will allow you to heat one food in the top section while cooking another in the bottom section.
- *Purchase a bag sealer for easy storage of leftovers in the freezer. Boil-in-the-bag foods are easy to reheat in a pan of boiling water in microwave.
- *Prepare your own "T.V. dinners" by cooking enough food for four to six and freezing extra portions to use on days when you are in a hurry or do not feel like cooking.
- *Prepare only part of the package of a dry mix. To divide a mix, stir the mix and measure it, then divide into equal portions. When you prepare only a portion of a recipe - be sure you mark the package to show how many servings are left.

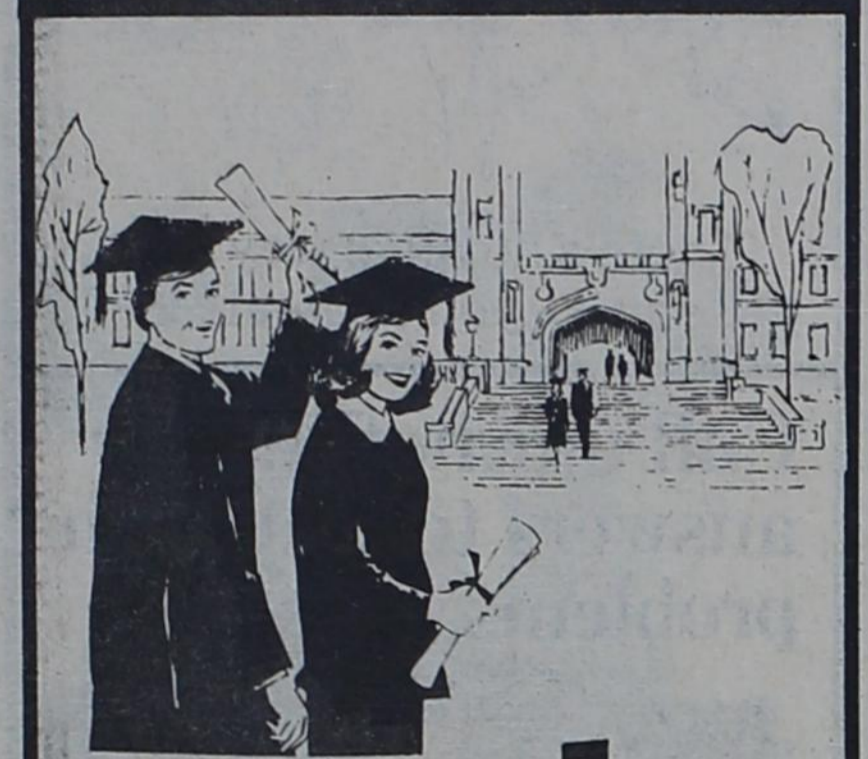

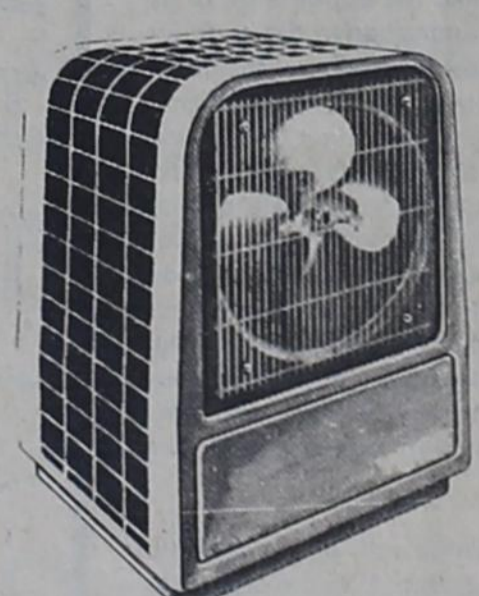

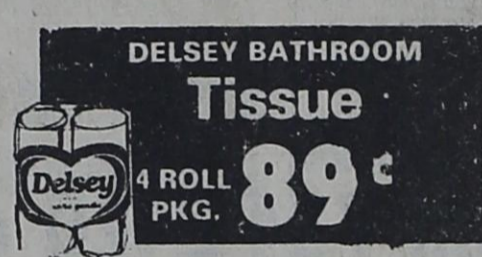
