The Gorman Panthers continued their quest for the District 8-A Title on Friday night with a narrow 22 to 16 win over the Blanket Tigers at Blanket. The Panthers seemed to be looking forward to the Goldthwaite game as they were making mistakes that got them behind early and the Tigers had the Panthers down 9 to 0 before the Panthers really got started. The two Panther fumbles within the first minute of the game gave the Tigers the opportunity to jump out front, and that's exactly what they did. However, the Panthers settled down later in the game and played well enough to pull out another win, giving the Big Red a 5-0 record in district.

On the opening kickoff the Panthers fumbled the ball and the Tigers jumped on it at the Gorman 11. The Big Red defense did the job, however, and held the Tiers, forcing them to kick a field goal of 25 yards to make the score 3-0.

Then following the kickoff, the Panthers handed the Tigers another scoring opportunity, giving them a fumble on the Gorman 43. Lightning struck quick as the Tiger quarterback tossed a bomb to Billy Dellis who got free and caught the pass with three defenders around him about the 10 yard line and ran in for the score with 10:44 still left on the clock in the first period. The kick for point was blocked and the score was 9-0 and the Panthers had only snapped the ball 1 time.

Then with time about half gone in the first quarter (the field clock wasn't operating), Ricky Hunter backed up at his own 46 to receive a Tiger punt, caught the ball and broke into the open and raced all the way for a touchdown to get the Big Red started. The run for two points failed and the score rose to 9-6.

With tine running out in the first half the Panthers went ahead to stay when Ricky Hunter threw a quarterback eligible pass to Don Rodgers for 12 yards for the score. The drive started on the Gorman 20 and the Panthers scored in 14 plays on a time-consuming drive. Rhett harris-

on added the two pointer on a fine run and Gorman was out in front 14

Following the halftime intermis-

sion the Big Red defense held the Tiger and forced a fumble, which was recovered by Kelly Branch at the Tiger 15 yard line. After three running plays made 10 yards and a first down at the 5, the Panthers added another 4 yards on a run before Don Rodgers got the final yard on a quarterback sneak with about 9 minutes left in the third. Then Lucio Pacheco added the two pointer on a run and the Panthers were out front with a 22 to 9 score. The Gorman fans breathed a little easier with the 13 point margin. The two teams played fairly even the rest of the way until about the middle of the fourth period, when the Tigers started a drive on their own 9 yard line after holding the Panthers on downs, and moved the distance of 91 yards in 10 plays and scored on a 16 yard pass from Wilkens to Danny Thompson for the TD. The Panthers helped the Tigers on this drive with a 5 yard penalty on a fourth down play, then gave the Tigers 30 more yards on penalties, with the last penalty giving the Tigers a first down at the Gorman 16. Wilkens then added the point after to make the score 22 to 16, and really gave the Panthers a scare. However, the Big Red took the kickoff at their own 35, then following a 10 yard holding penalty which set them back to their 25, the Panthers started a drive that ran out the clock to preserve the win and keep their unblemished district record at 5-0.

The Panthers seemed too uptight for the game as they just couldn't


seem to get settled down in the early going and looked rather sluggish until Hunter got things going on the punt return for the first score. The Big Red defense did a great job of holding the Tigers on several occasions and recovered two Tiger fumbles. The Panther offense stopped themselves on two or three good drives with costly penalties at critical times. I guess the Big Red were looking forward to Friday night's battle with Goldthwaite, and the time has finally arrived, with the Panthers hosting the Eagles in a big battle in 8-A action. The Panthers must win the two remaining games with the Eagled and the Lometa Hornets for a clear title in the district race. The Eagles are riding high now after losing a hard fought battle with the Evant Elks in the Mud at Evant by a 2-0 score. Since then the Eagles have been playing real well and are -expected to give the Big Red their toughest test so far in district play. The Panthers will be seeking to avenge a loss to Goldthwaite last season. So it should be a real good

game. Ricky Hunter led the Panthers with 85 yards on 17 carries. Pacheco had 60 on 14 trips. Harrison got 23 on 6 tries. Jimmy Woodall made 17 on 5 tries. Rodgers made 16 on 7 keepers, and Zack Wilcox was 2 for



### CONSUMERS ALERTED TO DANGERS OF **PURCHASING CHILD SAFETY SEATS AT GARAGE SALES**

As Texas citizens prepare to comply with the new child safety seat law which becomes effective October 31, they should resist the option of getting seats from garage sales because of potential safety problems, according to George R. Gustafson, Executive Vice President of Texas Safety Association.

"Of course, recycling child safety seats in a systematic fashion such as in the hospital-based and other established loaner programs is a good use of resources. Buying a seat at a garage sale, however, can involve too many unknown factors about the condition of the seat", he

Missing information straps or other parts can be a significant safety concern.

"One of the safety concerns of buying used seats is not knowing whether the seat has been through a crash. In some cases it may be difficult for the layperson to determine whether a seat has sustained structural damage in an impact. The best practice is to retire with honor any child safety seat which has been through a crash. In fact many loaner programs, including the one operated by Texas Safety Association, require participants to return a seat that has been in a crash so that it can be exchanged. This practice just ensures added protection for these

young riders," said Gustafson. Federally approved child safety seats are required to show the date of manufacture and required to include manufacturer's instructions. The current crash standard was implemented in January, 1981, so the consumer should look for seats

manufactured on or after that date. "A person who is unfamiliar with child safety seat design and who does not have manufacturer's instructions available may not recognize when parts of a seat are missing," he said.

Mistaking a common household infant carrier or household booster seat for a safety seat device or booster device made for motor vehicles is another danger of buying an article at a garage sale.

People who plan to recycle child safety seats among friends and family members need to keep in mind the need to retain all stickers and manufactuer's instructions and to maintain a vigilance on the condition of the seat so that the next parent or other adult can use the seat with assurance, said Gustafson.

The new law requires Texas residents to transport children up to age 2 years in a federally approved child safety seat and children 2 up to 4 year in a child safety seat or safety belt. Fines of \$25 to \$50 for noncompliance will be assessed beginning January 1, though the law takes effect October 31. The law provides for dismissal of a fine if the person shows proof of acquisition by purchase, loan, or rental within 10 days after the offense. The law applies to passenger cars and light trucks. Exempted are persons transporting children for hire and persons transporting a child in a vehicle in which all seating positions equipped with child passenger safety seat systems or safety belts are occupied.

"Clearly, this is a lifesaving law that can, along with continued education, secure for our youngest passengers safer rides," said Gustafson.

#### **MATTOX, CONSUMERS SEEK PUC RULES ON SWB**

Attorney General Jim Mattox and consumer advocate Carol Barger have filed a complaint with the Public Utility Commission seeking to require Southwestern Bell to make available all information regarding the company's expenditures for financing and capitalization of its unregulated subsidiaries.

"Frankly, we suspect that Southwestern Bell is using revenues from its regulated services to finance its unregulated businesses, such as telephones, mobile phones and the Yellow Pages publications," Mattox said. "What we're seeking in this complaint is the information that would show us if our suspicion is correct.

"If we are correct, we are asking the PUC to reduce local telephone rates to consumers," he said. "Southwestern Bell should not be able to recover such expenditures from the public.

"Why should consumers have to pay for Southwestern Bell to create and support the company's competitive ventures?" Mattox

"That's simply not the way the competitive marketplace works."

The complaint against Southwestern Bell, filed Oct. 17 with the PUC, also seeks an accounting from Southwestern Bell of the costs incurred related to divestiture.

"Southwestern Bell keeps coming to the PUC and belly-aching about how much money they're losing because of divestiture," Mattox said. "Well, if that's true, they ought to back it up with facts and figures. If it's not true, then their huge rate hike request ought to be

"Just yesterday, there were news reports that Southwestern Bell's profits have increased by more than 14 percent," Mattox said. "We believe all of this should be considered by the PUC and that this state's consumers deserve protection from the apparent games that Bell is playing with all our pocketbooks."

Mattox, the Consumers Union, Public Citizen/Texas, Texas ACORN and Gray Panthers of Austin are listed as plaintiffs on the complaint.

Assistant Attorney General W. Scott McCollough is working on the case for Mattox.

### CHILD SAFETY SEATS LOANER PROGRAM

State Senator Bob Glasgow of Stephenville announced today that child passenger safety seats are available from certain organizations in District 22 through "loaner programs".

"A new State law that becomes effective October 31, 1984, mandates that children 2 years old and younger be placed in child passenger safety seats and that children 2 and 4 years of age be buckled into safety belts," Glasgow stated. This is an effort," he said, "to ensure that thousands of serious injuries to and deaths of children will be averted."

"Because the purchase of child safety seats can be an added expense, the Public Health Region 5 has arranged for these car seats to be available on a loan basis. Federal transportation funds are financing the allocation effort through an interagency agreement between the Texas Department of Health and the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation. ### TIME TO PLAN FOR RETIREMENT

People in the Big Country area who plan to retire at the end of the year should take some time soon to think about Social Security retirement benefits, Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene, said recently.

A person should apply for Social Security benefits 2 or 3 months before they plan to retire. This way, benefits can begin shortly after income from work stops.

Before applying, a person should get the necessary evidence together, Hammons said. This will save time when filing an application. The first item a person needs is his or her Social Security card or a record of the

Next, proof of age is required. Preferred proof is an official record of birth or baptism recorded before age 5. If this does not exist, other proofs can be submitted. The people at the Social Security office can tell you what kinds of evidence can be

Records that might be used include school, church, State or Federal census, insurance policies, marriage, passports, employment, military service, children's birth certificates, union, immigration or naturalization. This is not an exclusive list and other records may be acceptable.

Forms W-2 or self-employment tax returns for the past 2 years should be provided. These are needed because recent earnings reports may not yet be in Social Security records.

A husband or wife who also plans to apply should have about the same documents. A marriage certificate may be required, but is not needed in all cases. Information about any previous marriages is also needed.

Birth certificates of any young, unmarried children should be obtained as well. Additional documentation may be required depending on the particulars of certain cases. The people at the Social Security office will be glad to answer questions about retirement applications. The Abilene office is located at 142 S. Piooneer and the telephone number





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

The preventing of an overpayment is a lot less painful than the collection of an overpayment, so please report your earnings promptly and as accurately as possible.



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
