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



Although poor pollination is suspected to be a major dontributing factor to physiological drop, there is evidence to suggest that the tree itself if helping to make the determination of which nuts will fall independent of the pollination factor. Maintenance of tree helath throughout the year with special emphasis on nitrogen fertilization, zinc nutrition and water management will help reduce physiological nut drop.

Pecan aphids are causing more damage in June than normal. Usually the aphids which cause honeydew on the leaves are worse in July and August. Both the yellow aphid and the black aphid can be found on pecan trees now. Recommended insecticides for aphid control include Diazinon, Zolone, and malathion.

This applies to all crops except wheat which is already approved for haying and grazing. Only livestock owned by the appli-

cant 30 days prior to May, 1984 are allowed to utilize the hay or grazing.

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
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
