Gordon was instrumental in organizing the Eastland County Pecan Show which is one of the largest in the state. He also has taught more than 2,000 individuals to bud and graft pecan trees at annual propagation workshops.

He also organized the county's first hay show and was instrumental in establishing the Eastland County Fair.

Gordon also has conducted indepth educational programs in farm and ranch management that have helped producers improve their decision-making.

He has given strong leadership to the 4-H program in Eastland County. – Through his efforts 4-H'ers with livestock projects have fared well at the major stock shows in Texas.

The City Commission met in regular session on July 17, 1984 with the Mayor and all Commissioners present, except Commissioner Guthery. Others present at the meeting were Chief Funderburgh and Mr. La Bleu.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The commission completed the process of adjusting the water rates. This had been worked on at the last meeting and a figure of \$0.09 per one thousand gallons had been decided upon to cover the increase to the City. We voted to leave the minimum at \$7.50 for the first 2000 and apply the increase to usage above 2000. This change will increase your water bill by \$0.09 for each 1000 gallon you use above the minimum, which will amount to only \$0.09 on 12,000 gallons. This amount will figure below a 5% increase on your bills. We hope that we can live with the increase we voted. If we find later that we can not, we might have to make another adjustment.

At this time we did not change the sewer or trash charge. These services are costing more each year, but we felt that we would try to survive on the current rates. I hope that we can continue to do so.

The first producing well was brought in on the Joe Duke Property in September (Labor Day), 1918. The Desdemona Gas Plant, the only one of several plants remaining, was built in 1919 by Magnolia.


