"Speedy" Clark Funeral Services Held Sunday

Audie Othell "Speedy" Clark, 64, of Gorman passed away Saturday, July 14, 1984, at 6:10 p.m. at Blackwell Hospital. Services were at 4 p.m. Sunday in the First United Methodist Church, Gorman, with John Goble, Church of Christ minister of Ft. Worth officiating, assisted by Rawlyn Richter minister. First United Methodist Church, Gorman and Payne Hattox, Church of Christ minister De Leon.

He was born May 31, 1920, in Eastland County and was a life long resident of Gorman. He was married to Louise Huddlestone on September 3, 1948 in Coleman. He was a retired U.S. Postal Service employee, retiring March 30, 1984 after 47 years service.

He was active in civic and church organizations. He was a certified lay leader of the First United Methodist Church where he had taught Sunday School, and was an active member for 42 years. At the time of his death he was Chairman of the Official Board and Choir director.

He was a charter member of the Quarterback Club and was president during the building of Frank A. Gray Memorial Park in Gorman. He served as President of the Gorman Independent School Board for 4 years. He served 10 years on the Upper Leon Water District and ten years on the South Eastland County Hospital Board of Directors.

He served from Sept. 1942 until Jan. 1946 in the military with the 8th Air Force in Europe.

He had been a member of Gorman's Masonic Lodge for 37 years.

Survivors include his wife Louise, a daughter, Carolyn George, of De Leon, a son, Bill Clark, of Gorman, a son-in-law Roger George, of De Leon, two grandchildren, Greg and Ginger George of De Leon, two sisters, Estelle Craddock and Lorena Clark of Gorman and one brother Elvy Clark of Corpus Christi.

Thirty small school basketball all-stars and thirty-four six man football all-stars will report to Tarleton for workouts on July 16. The All-Star Basketball Game is scheduled for 3 p.m. on July 21 in Tarleton's Wisdom Gymnasium. The Six Man All-Star Football Game will kickoff at 8 p.m. at Tarleton's Memorial Stadium.

Over 100 small school coaches are expected to register on July 18 for a three day series of clinics and activities at the coaching school.

Also highlighting the week's activities will be a Queen's contest. A

representative from each school with a player in the all-star games will vie for the title. The participants will be presented at halftime of the basketball game and the winner will be crowned at halftime of the football game.

The West football squad, coached by Don Story of Newcastle and Bob Campbell of Divide, features players from twelve different high schools. The East football squad, coached by Ray Martin of Oglesby and Willie Schoen of Blackwell, also has players from twelve different schools.

The East basketball all-stars come from thirteen different schools and are coached by George Posey of Abbott. The West basketball all-stars come from fifteen different schools and are coached by Joe Bond of Carbon.

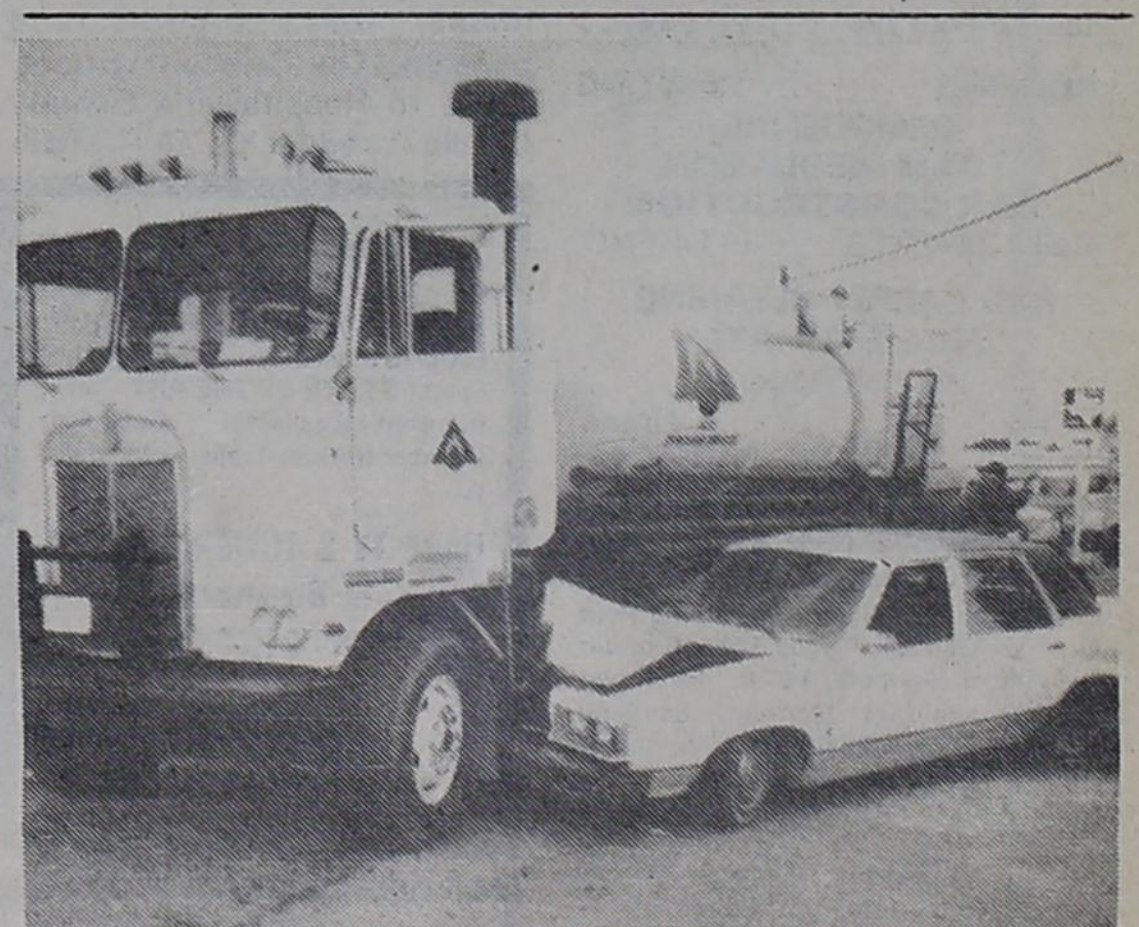
