The Gorman Panthers played host to the Baird Bears in a 12-A District ballgame on Friday night and Everyone is cordially in- really got a lesson in offensive and defensive football as the Bears jumped to a 14-0 first period lead and then added 14 more in the second quarter for a 28-0 halftime lead and then cruised to a 48 to 6 victory in the second half with a lot of reserves seeing action.

> The Big Red defense held the Bears on the first possession of the game and forced a punt. The Panthers moved the ball 17 yards on 6 plays before getting a five yard penalty and then lost 7 yards on a pass try. The Panthers got another break after the Bears took over when the Big Red defense forced a fumble and got the ball on the Bear 40. However, the Panther offense again failed to move the ball and punted to the Bears who took the punt at their own 20 and then scored their first touchdown going 80 yards in 9 plays with Curtis Lehew getting the final 6 yards with 3:10 left in the first period. Baird had big runs of 10, 12, 16 and 16. Jack Pruet kicked the point after and the score was 7-0. The Bears again held the Panthers and got the ball on the Gorman 23 and scored in just 2 plays with Josh Curtis catching a 23 yard pass for the second Bear score with 13 seconds left in the first. Pruet added the point after and the Bears were up 14-0. Following another Panther possession for only 3 yards on 3 carries the Bears got the punt on the Gorman 49 and scored in 6 plays with Bucky Rivera getting the final 12 on a run for the score with 8:28 left in the second. Pruet add the point after and Baird led 21-0. After holding the Panthers on their next possession covering only 7 yards the Bears got the ball on their own 21 and scored in just 3 plays with Curtis catching a tipped pass of the Gorman 42 and racing in for a 61 yard scoring play with 4:41 left in the half. 

Pause To Think

The following passage in Romans 8, verses 6-14, lists 6 reasons why we must have the Spirit of Christ residing in our hearts. Let's discuss them one at a time.

This week, we are discussing the fourth reason that we must have the Spirit of Christ residing in our hearts, according to the writing of Paul to the Church at Rome.

Romans 8:6-14 For to be carnally minded is death;

but to be spiritually minded is life and peace. Because the carnal mind is enmity against God: for it is not subject to the law of God, neither indeed can be.

1. So then they that are in the flesh cannot please God. But ye are not in the flesh, but in the Spirit, if so be that the Spirit of God dwell in you. 2. Now if any man have not the Spirit of Christ, he is none of his. 3. And if Christ be in you, the body

is dead because of sin; but the Spirit is life because of righteousness. 5. But if the Spirit of him that raised

up Jesus from the dead dwell in you, he that raised up Christ from the dead shall also quicken your mortal bodies by his Spirit that dwelleth in you.

Therefore, brethren, we are debtors, not to the flesh, to live after the flesh. For if ye live after the flesh, ye shall die:

But if ye through the Spirit do 6. mortify the deeds of the body, ye shall live.

7. For as many as are led by the Spirit of God, they are the sons of God.

Verse 11 of this chapter makes a very powerful statement. Paul declares that it is the indwelling of the same spirit that raised Christ from the dead that gives spiritual life to our mortality. This cannot be accomplished in any other way. Believing, repenting, and to after hearing, believing, and obeying the Gospel of Jesus Christ. However, stopping here causes us to come up short of the fullness of what God desires to do in us.

We liken repentance to death or a crucifying of the flesh, and baptism to burial. It is the infilling or receiving of the Spirit of Christ however, that quickens us to the spiritual life that Christ desires for us. If we refuse to receive this gift from God, we are still in the tomb.


Therefore, not only do we go

through life void of the fullness of life in the spirit, we also face disappointment in the first resurrection. How can we expect to be resurrected if we don't have the same spirit that raised Christ dwelling within us?

The expectation of resurrection is too important to not fully surrender to all of God's plan for salvation.
