PANTHERS TO SCRIMMAGE CROSS PLAINS BUFFALOES FRIDAY NIGHT

The Panthers of 1986 will hold their second controlled scrimmage of the season on Friday night when they play host to the Cross Plains Buffaloes at Brogdon Field. The Panthers and Buffaloes played each other in regular season play last season. Cross Plains was moved up to Class AA this season and will be a tough opponent for the Big Red. Scrimmage time Friday night will be at 7 p. m.

The Panthers looked pretty good in last weeks scrimmage with the Tolar Rattlers in the annual Towel and Soap Night scrimmage. The Panthers scored four times during the scrimmage and the Rattlers

scored only one time against the tough Panther defense, and that one was called back due to a penalty.

The Panther scores came on a beautiful 60 yard scamper by Randall Gibbs; Glenn Burgess scored on a 12 yard sweep to the right; then Scott Gressett tossed a pass to Joe Rodgers for 8 yards for another score. The other score came on a wide pitchout to the left to Burgess who raced 15 yards to score.

The Panther defense looked improved from last year as they held the Rattlers fairly close all night, allowing only one scoring drive, which was called back. The Big Red seems to be a more close-knit bunch

this season and everyone is showing team effort and team spirit so far. If this squad continues to pull together they could do well this season despite the heavy loss due to graduation. There have been some changes in positions, and if all this works out the Panthers could be much improved from last years team which failed to make the playoffs for the first time in several years.

So be sure and come out for the scrimmage on Friday night and show the Big Red that we are behind them all the way.

The first game of the regular season will be on Friday night, September 5 when the Panthers travel to Hico to take on the Tigers.
