The acquisition of the Farmers Gin and Warehouse Company represents the first shelling facility for Birdsong in the Southeast area.



Tom Birdsong further stated that Birdsong Peanuts has been looking for several years for an acquisition in the Southeast area and that Farmers Gin and Warehouse Company offered an opportunity to enter the Southeast peanut area with excellent facilities in an excellent growing area and with a fully staffed organization. 




