Dear sirs;

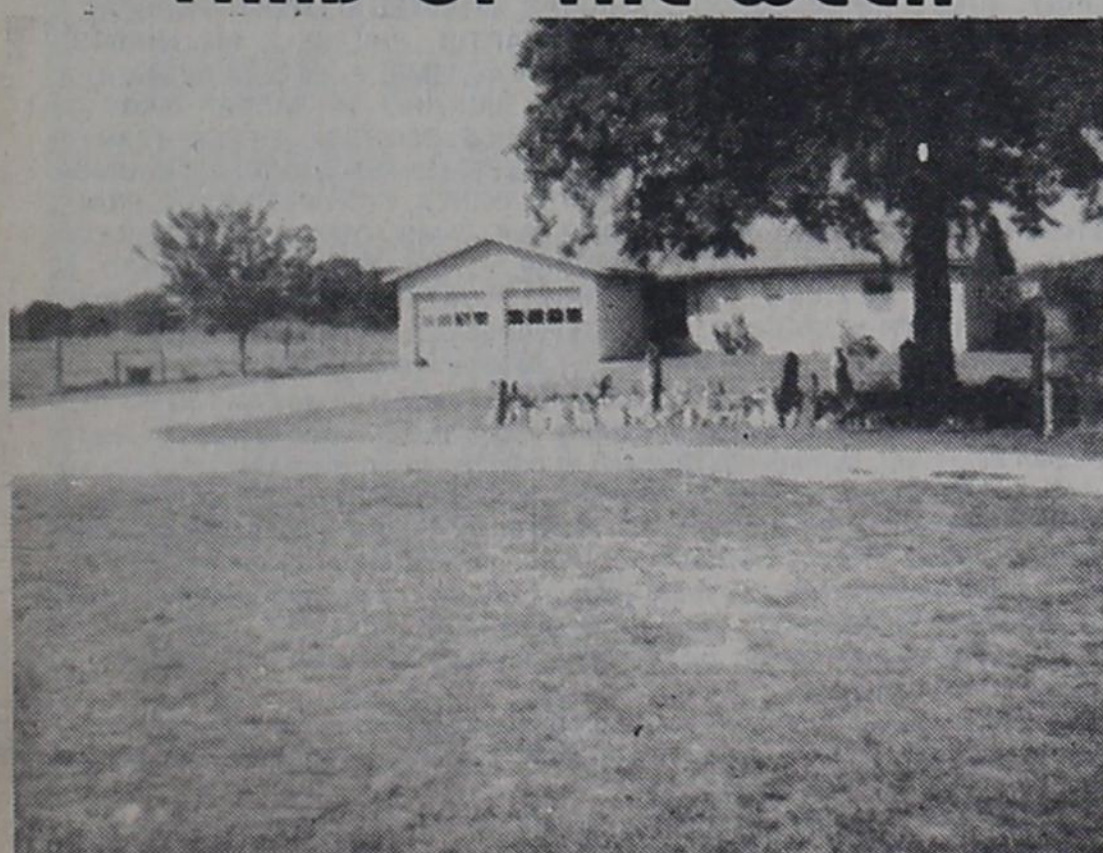
In 1934 I was elected to teach math in high school at Gorman and coach. My first football game was with Cisco, who beat us. Monday after I had worked with our team for three weeks, Mr. Ford, our superintendent told me six of my starting eleven were ineligible si I had to start over. We didn't have 100 boys and girls in high school during the depression. Our next two games were with Dublin and Stephenville, who beat us. The other five district games were with Strawn, Granbury, De Leon, Comanche and Hamilton, that we won or tied. We didn't have a gym, so we started track. We won the county in track and placed several in the district meet that year.

Fifty years ago I had most of the little boys that played for me in 1934, so we had a good season. Strawn, Granbury, De Leon, Hamilton, Comanche and Stephenville did not score on us.

I will never know how my little boys played that many quarters and no one scored on us till we played Dublin for the district championship. They went as far in state that year as you could go. We won the county meet in track that year and we also did well in the district track meet. I enjoyed my two years in Gorman.

I have written all the boys who played for me at Gorman to be at Homecoming October 25-26. Several should be there, but about one-half of my boys have died the past 50 years. We will meet about 5 p. m. at Ardith and Arline Pittmans before the game. I am looking forward to seeing several boys and girls I taught and seeinf friends.

## PANTHERS SLIP BY BUFFALOES 18-7; HOST BLANKET TIGERS FRIDAY

The Panthers traveled to Cross Plains on Friday night to take on the Buffaloes on a wet slippery field and slipped by the Buffaloes 18 to 7 to continue their quest for the District 8-A East title. The Big Red defense let the Buffaloes loose for 8 first downs in the first half to take a 7-6 lead into the locker room at half time on a fine offensive drive that stunned the Panthers a bit. But in the last half the tough Panthers allowed only 4 first downs in the last half while adding 12 points to the scoreboard for the 18 to 7 victory and a spotless district record. The Big Red defense was led by David Gibbs, Tommy Campbell, Shannon Caraway Rhett Harrison, and Randall Gibbs, and bolstered heavy by the rest of the Panther defensive group.

The Panthers hit the scoreboard first on their third possession, taking the ball on their own 46 and going the distance in 6 plays with Randall Gibbs rambling for the final 23 yards on a beautiful run up the middle that saw him break free in the secondary and racing the final 15 yards untouched for the score with 6:53 left in the period. The try for two points failed and Gorman led 6 to 0.

Then the Buffaloes started a drive of their own to tie the score on a 67 yard drive in 7 plays with a pass play of 5 yards scoring the touchdown with 2:52 left in the period. The kick for the extra point was good and the Buffs led 7 to 6.

The Buffs were inside the Panther 10 but couldn't score the go-ahead points as the Panthers held them on downs as time ran out.

The Panthers came out smoking in the second half and held the Buffs on their first possession. The Big Red took the ball on the buff 48 and went the distance in a strong 10 play drive that left only 5:29 on the clock. Rhett Harrison got the final 5 yards on a burst off tackle. The drive featured several nice runs by David Gibbs behind some good blocks. The try for two points again failed and the Panthers led 12 to 7.

The teams exchanged possessions the rest of the way until early in the fourth when the Panthers got the ball on the Buff 28 and scored in just three plays with David Gibbs tossing a pass to Jamie Espinoza who raced into the end zone with 10:50 left in the game. The Panthers overcame a 5 yard penalty and an 8 yard loss before getting the score. Again the try for two points failed and the Panthers felt a little more secure at 18 to 7.

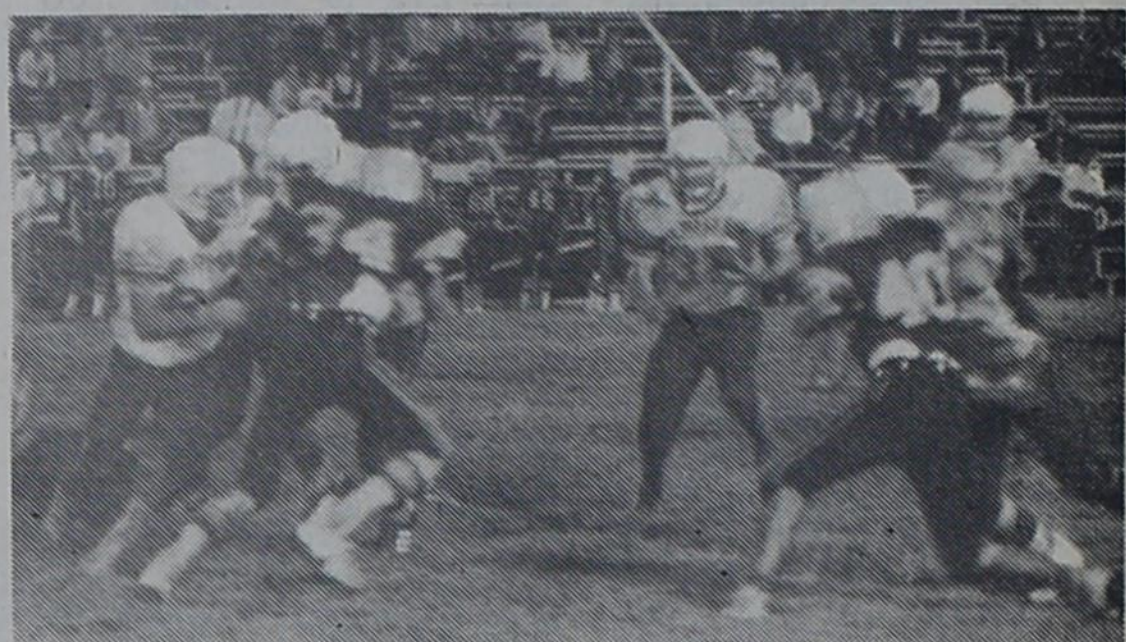
The Buffs came back with a drive late in the game that was stopped inside the Panther 1 yard line on a

marvelous defensive stand by the Big Red defense. The Panthers brought the ball out from the shadow of their own goal and punted to the Buffs and then held them the rest of the way for the victory. Great job defense!

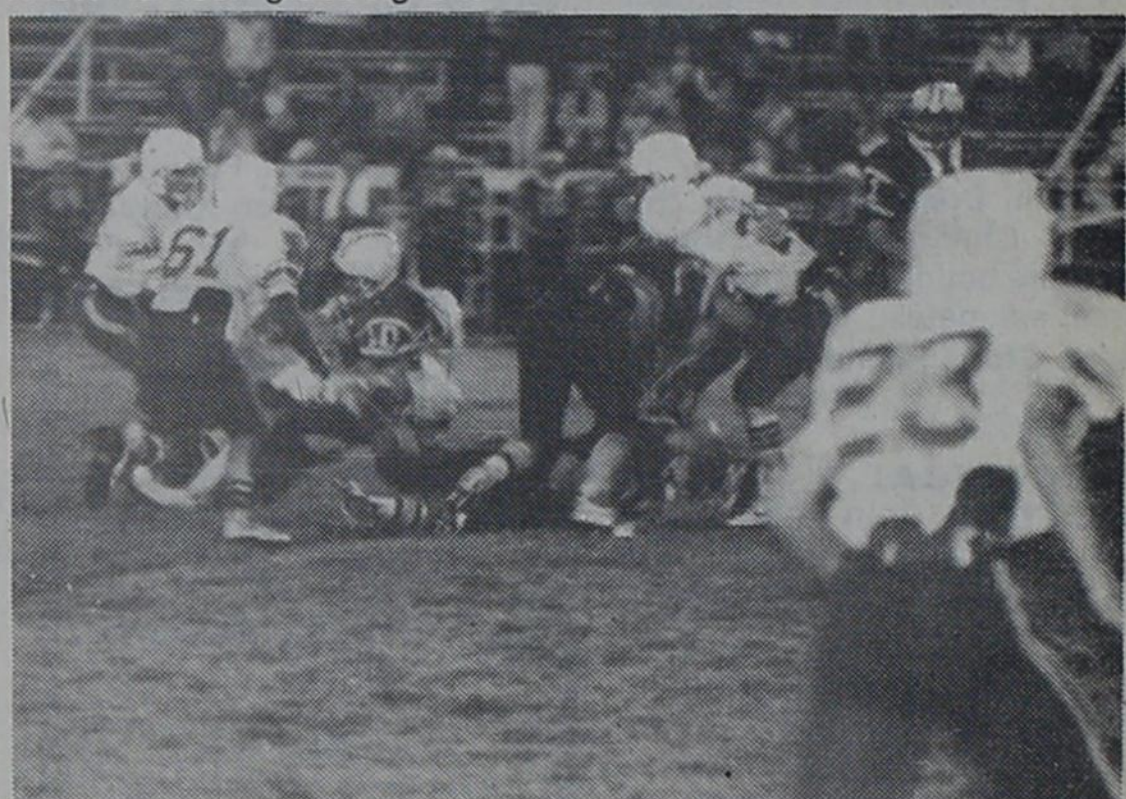
David Gibbs led the Panthers with 88 yards on 21 carries. Randall Gibbs had 29 yards on three tries. Rhett Harrison got 24 on 11 tips.

This Friday night the Panthers

play host to the Blanket Tigers in another 8-A contest before an anticipated big Homecoming crowd at Brogdon Field. The Panthers will be seeking to remain undefeated in district play but the game will be a tough one because the Tigers and Panthers always have a tough battle wherever they play.
