

Dear sirs;

In 1934 I was elected to teach math in high school at Gorman and coach. My first football game was with Cisco, who beat us. Monday after I had worked with our team for three weeks, Mr. Ford, our superintendent told me six of my starting eleven were ineligible si I had to start over. We didn't have 100 boys and girls in high school during the depression. Our next two games were with Dublin and Stephenville, who beat us. The other five district games were with Strawn, Granbury, De Leon, Comanche and Hamilton, that we won or tied. We didn't have a gym, so we started track. We won the county in track and placed

several in the district meet that year. Fifty years ago I had most of the little boys that played for me in 1934, so we had a good season. Strawn, Granbury, De Leon, Hamilton, Comanche and Stephenville did not score on us.

I will never know how my little boys played that many quarters and no one scored on us till we played Dublin for the district championship. They went as far in state that year as you could go. We won the county meet in track that year and we also did well in the district track meet. I enjoyed my two years in Gorman.

I have written all the boys who played for me at Gorman to be at Homecoming October 25-26. Several should be there, but about one-half of my boys have died the past 50 years. We will meet about 5 p. m. at Ardith and Arline Pittmans before the game. I am looking forward to seeing several boys and girls I taught and seeinf friends. Yours




This Friday night the Panthers
