The Panthers got a brief shock on Friday night when the Rochelle Hornets took the ball on their first possession, and on the first play from scrimmage, Shawn Cain broke free off tackle, hit the open spaces, and raced for a 76 yard touchdown with only 8:37 left in the first period. From there, however, the Big Red woke up and then came back with some fine scoring drives of their own to post 42 points on the scoreboard while holding the Hornets the rest of the way. The defense did a good job on the Hornet runners after the opening shock, allowing only 49 more yards on the ground and only a total of 6 yards in the air. It is difficult to try and name individual defensive players when all of them really did a great job. So we will just say "great job defense" and let you pick your own stars. And there were a lot of them.

Following the Hornet score and the PAT by Matt Clark which put the Hornets up 7-0, the Panthers moved down deep in Hornet territory but could not score. Then after holding the Hornets, the Panthers took the ball on their own 40 and moved the distance in 10 play with Glen Burgess going the final 18 yards on a beautiful run with 10:11

left in the second period. The drive featured runs of 10 and 9 by Randall Gibbs, intermingled with several short gainers by Jamie Espinoza and Lucio Pacheco. The run for points failed and Rochelle continued to lead 7-6.

But it didn't take the Big Red long to get the go-ahead score as Jamie Espinoza ran a punt back to set up the Panthers at the Hornet 26, with Jamie getting the honors from one yard out with 4:58 left in the half. The drive featured an outstanding pass play of 17 yards from Don Rodgers to Lucio Pacheco to set the Panthers up at the 2. Jamie also added the two pointer on a run and the Panthers were out front to stay at 14-7.

But the Panthers were not through as they held the Hornets on their next possession and took the ball on their own 20 and scored with 56 seconds left in the half when Randall Gibbs carried it in from 9 yards out. The drive featured a 30 yard run by Rodgers, a 16 yard pass to Espinoza and an 11 yard pass to Pacheco to set the Panthers up at the Hornet 9. Espinoza again added the two pointer and the Panthers held a 22 to 7 lead at intermission.

In the second half the Panthers scored on their first possession going 39 yards in 9 plays after a pass interception by Randall Gibbs set the Big Red up at the Hornet 39. The drive featured a beautiful 15 yard run by Randall and a pass of 11 yards to Espinoza. Pacheco got the honors

on a 1 yard dive with 6:37 left in the third. A pass to Rhett Harrison added the two points and Gorman was up 30 to 7.

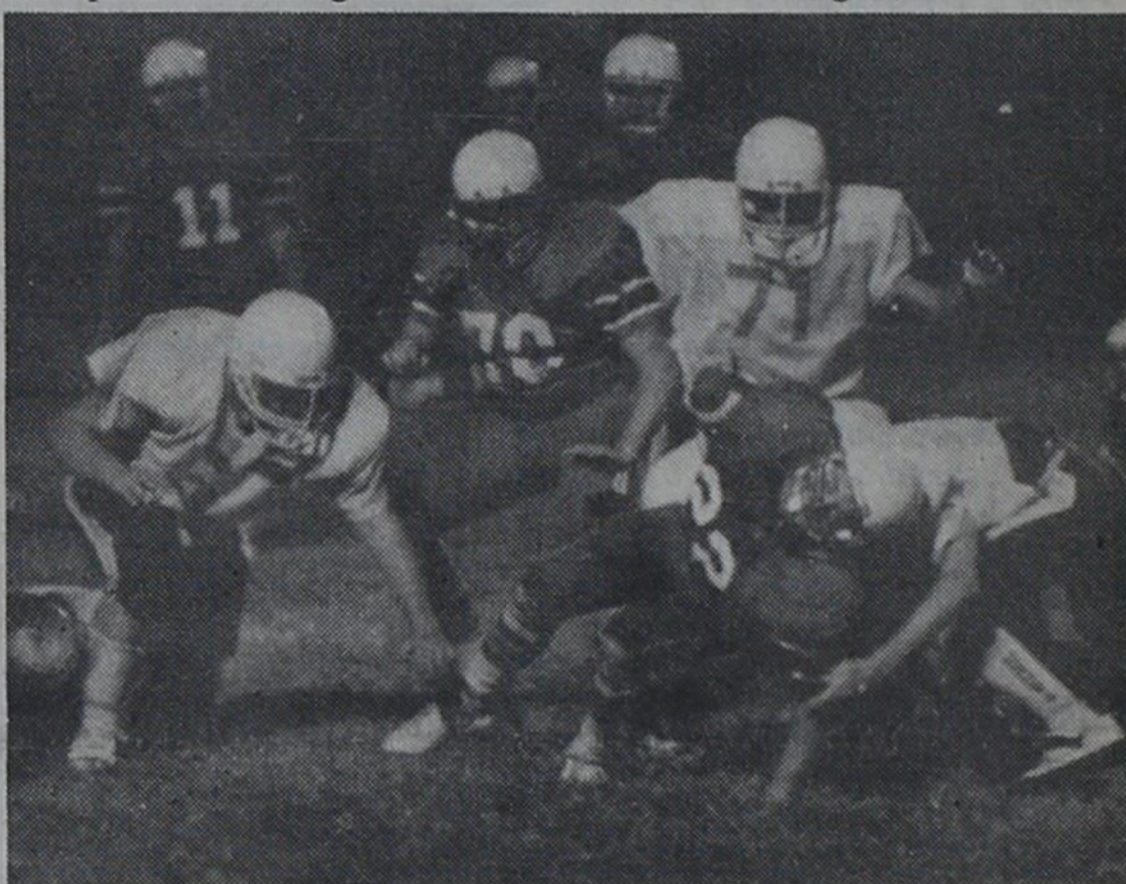
Gorman hit the scoreboard again with 10:21 left in the game when Lucio Pacheco caught a great pass covering 20 yards for the score. The 55 yard drive took 7 plays and featured two spectacular runs of 16 yards by Espinoza and 15 yards by Pacheco. The run for two points failed and the Panthers lead 36-7.

The final score for the Panthers came with 3:55 left in the game with Pacheco getting the final 8 yards on a run. The drive featured runs of 19 and 15 by Pacheco and 10 and 12 by Randall Gibbs. The run for two points failed and the final score read 42 to 7.

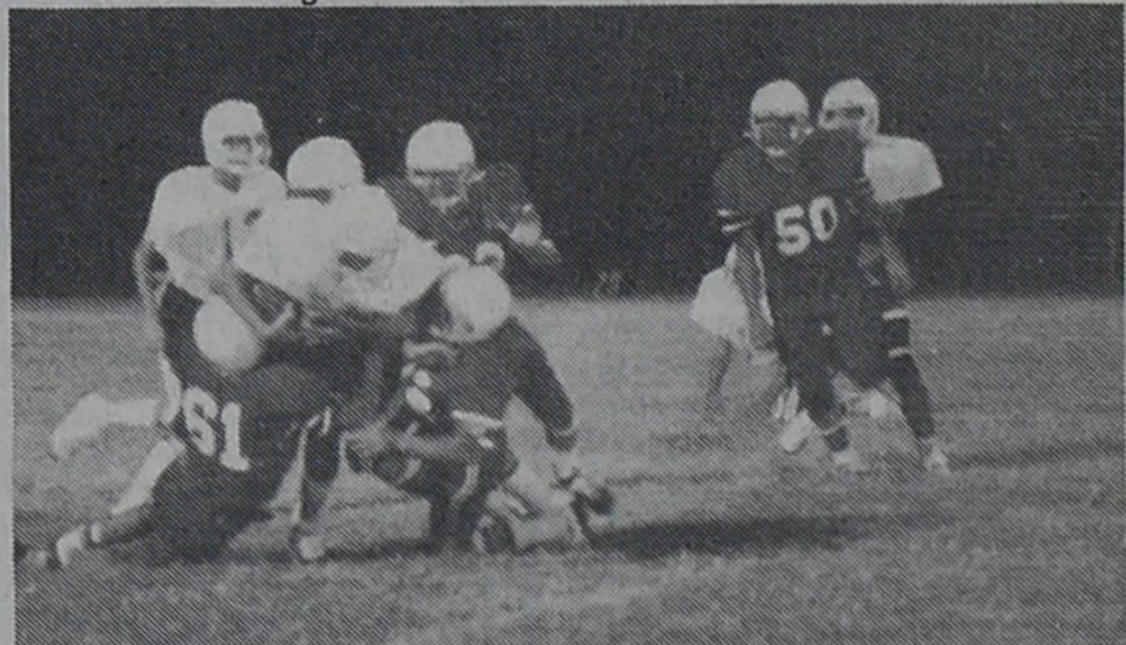
Randall Gibbs led the Panthers on the ground with 106 on 17 carries. Pacheco got 95 on 11 tries. Espinoza had 71 on 16. Burgess 13 for 52 and Don Rodgers had 37 on 8 keepers.

The Panthers had little time to rest, however as they began preparations for the game Friday night with the Evant Elks at Evant. This game is expected to be the usual tough battle as the Panthers and Elks always play each other real battles. This one, of course, is yet another crucial game in the District race, so go out and back the Panthers at Evant Friday night. 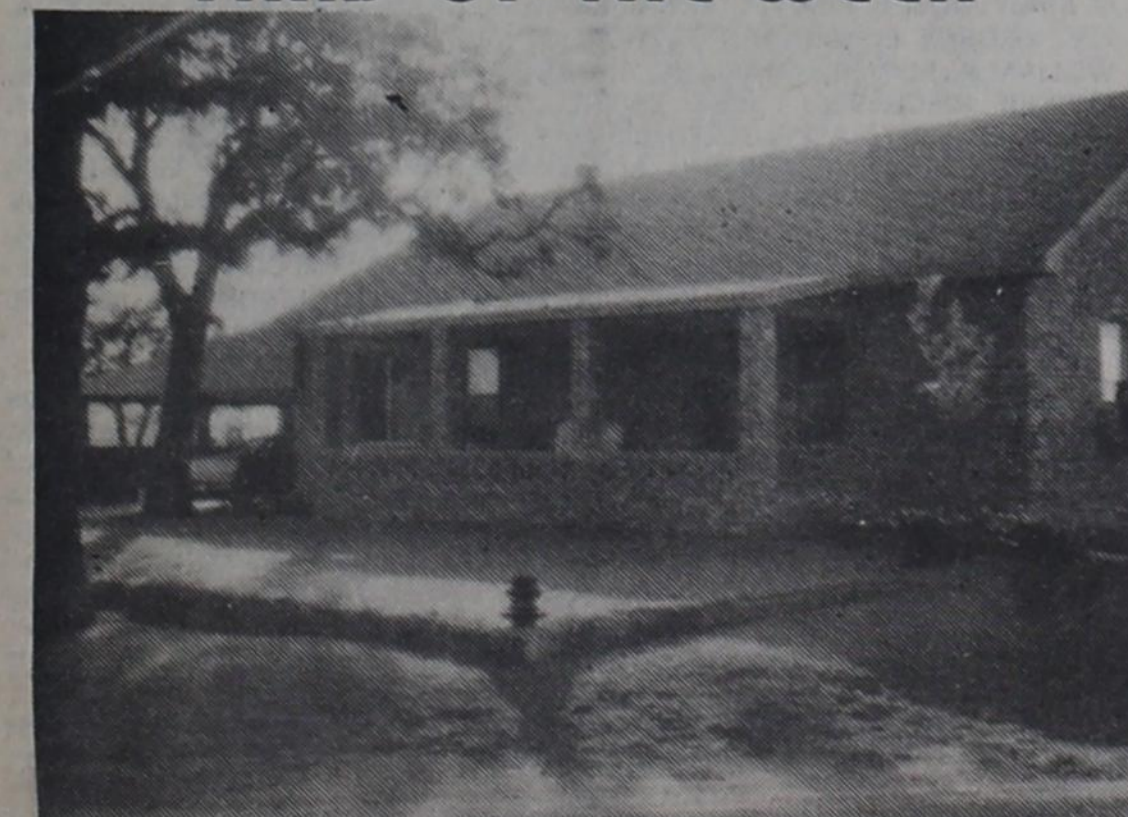
The second Friday night musical will be held this Friday night and some great music and fellowship is anticipated. The event will be at the Old Fire Hall.

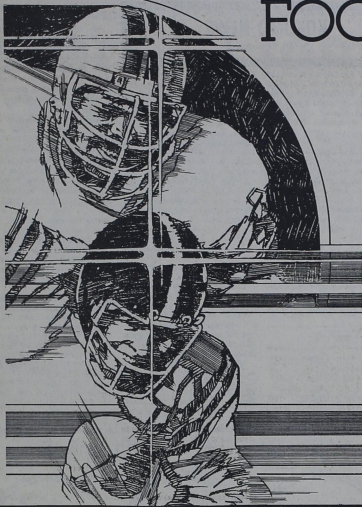

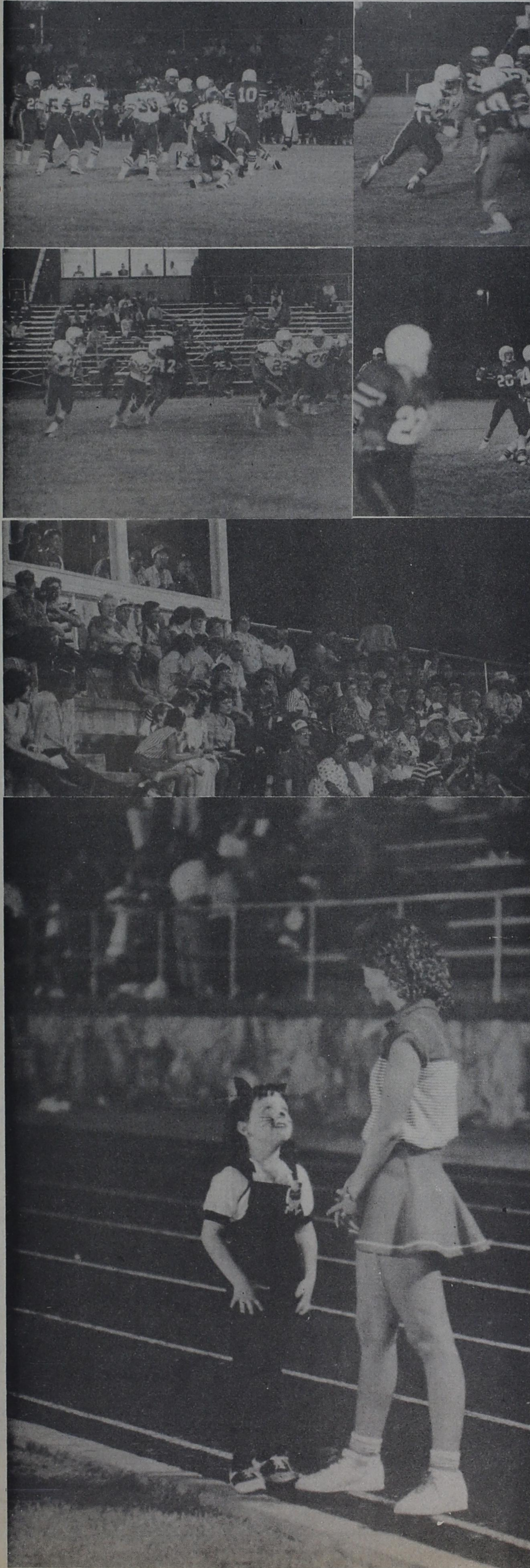

He was preceded in death by his wife Dec. 12, 1970.

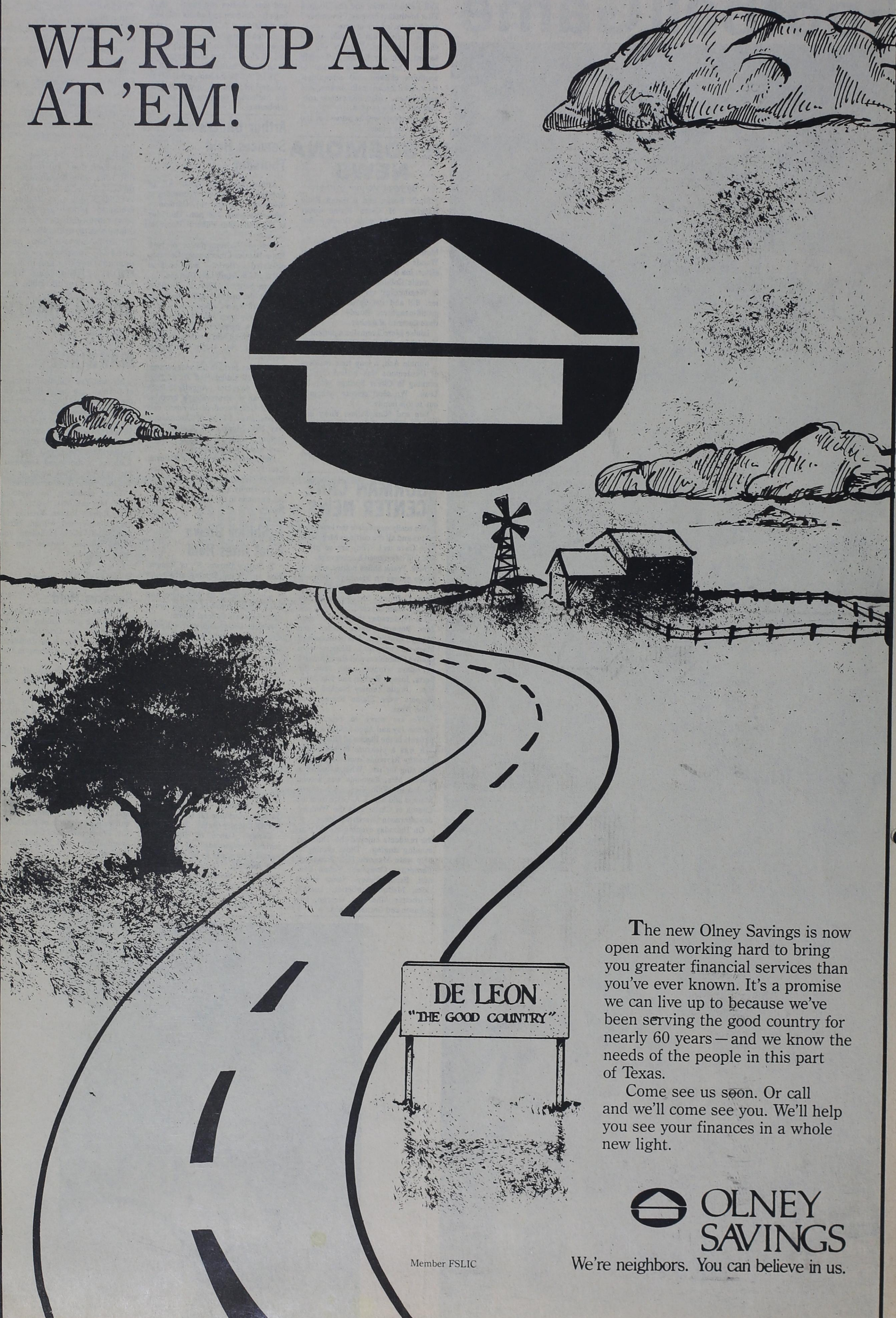
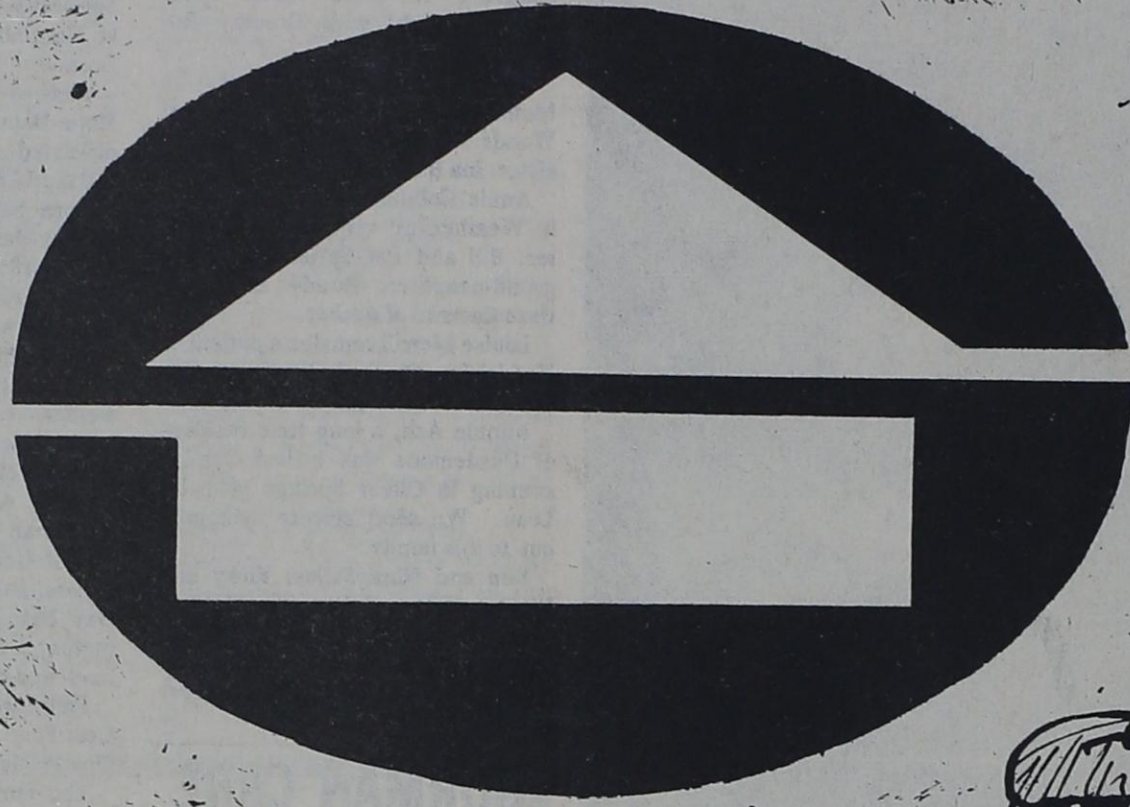
