The Panthers got a brief shock on Friday night when the Rochelle Hornets took the ball on their first possession, and on the first play from scrimmage, Shawn Cain broke free off tackle, hit the open spaces, and raced for a 76 yard touchdown with only 8:37 left in the first period. on a 1 yard dive with 6:37 left in the third. A pass to Rhett Harrison added the two points and Gorman was up 30 to 7.


