

by the Texas Health Department, the EPA, Texas Water Quality Board and others. There will be public hearings that will be published in the Progress at which all interested people may express their views for or against the location. I know that this is a problem that no one wants to face, but what are we to do with your solid waste?

This brings us to the next thing I want to discuss, the possibility of contracting gathering and disposal of solid waste to an independent contractor. Mr. and Mrs. Tony Waits of Lake Leon, who now operate such service and have been doing so for about five years, have met with the commission several times to discuss a contract for this service. These people offer the same service that we now offer, but their monthly charge would be higher than what we now charge. The question that we are facing is when we count the cost of a new landfill, its upkeep, equipment to work it, a new truck in the not too distant future, and labor, can we get cheaper service by contract or by operating our own landfill. We want your feedback on this. Let your commissioners and myself know your feelings. After this has been publicized well and people have had time to discuss it, the commission will hold a public hearing on the matter and let you, as a citizen, help

us decide whether we should proceed with the purchase of a site or go for a contract. Talk it up and let your ideas be known.

The commission will be meeting at 8 a.m. Thursday, June 6, with a full agenda. We will be working on the budget hearing, salary adjustment for employees, signing a contract with the County Appraisal Board, signing a new contract for collection of delinquent taxes, discuss a meeting place for the teenage people, pay the bills and take care of some other minor items.




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
