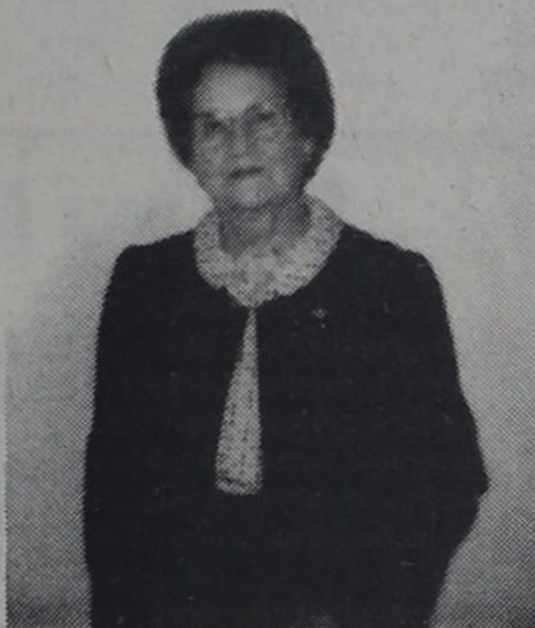

On Dec. 6th, we will be in charge of the concession at the County Pecan Show to be held at the Courthouse in Eastland.

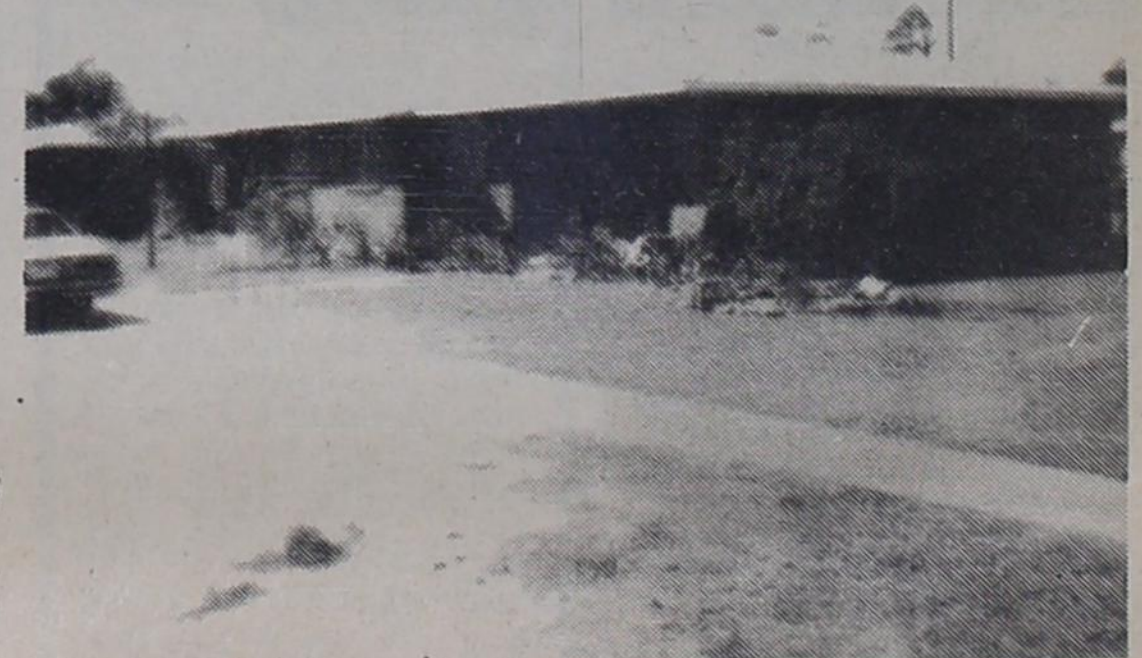

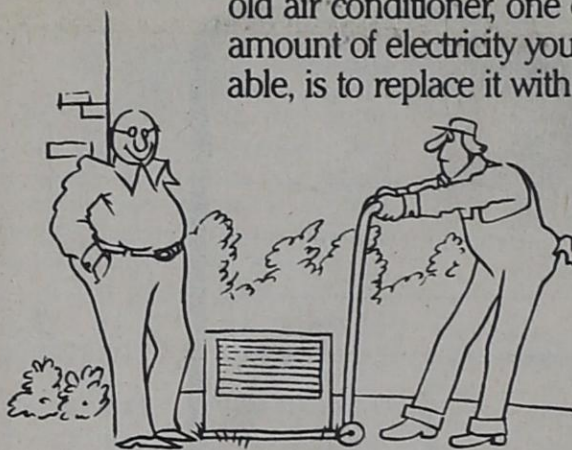

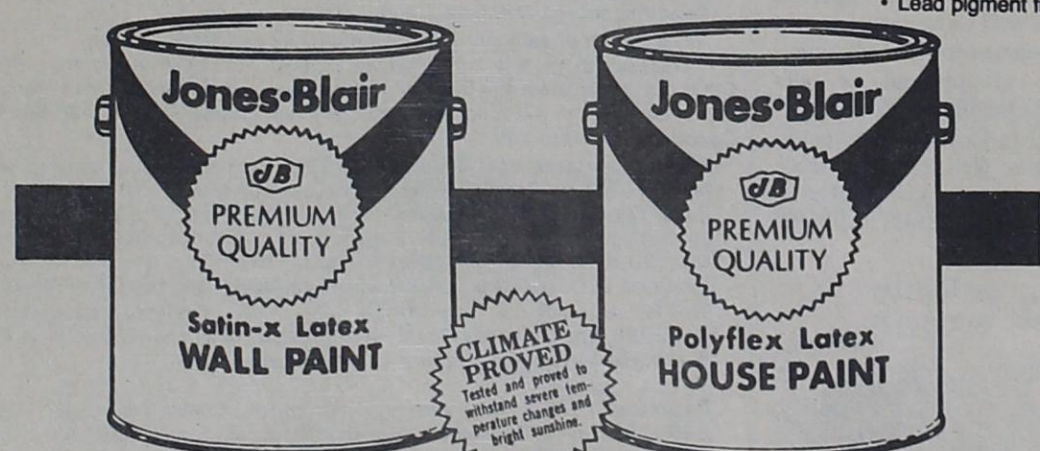
