held following the meal. Ray Shipp will be the auctioneer and will be selling the goodies. If you wish, you can bring a pie or cake to be auctioned off.


A large box will be available to place donations at the serving line. Folks are asked to donate what they can toward the fund.

light of earlier columns dealing with the subjects, are #1, the court decision on the "no pass, no play" rule, and #2, the Attorney General's decision to publish names of fathers delinquent in child support payments.

Item #1 is, of course, a continuation of the controversy generated by the education reform legislation know as H.B. 72. It required a public school student to pass all courses with a 70 to participate in extracurricular activities. A law suit was filed in a Houston court and this no pass, no play rule was declared unconstitutional on the grounds that it violated the equal protection and due process requirements of the Constitution.

The Texas Supreme Court, in an opinion rendered this week, has ruled that the no pass, no play rule is not unconstitutional and is in fact good law. Opponents of the rule have already stated the state court ruling will be appealed into Federal court. The only absolute conclusion that can be gleaned from all of this activity is that somewhere one or more lawyers are wearing a smile




