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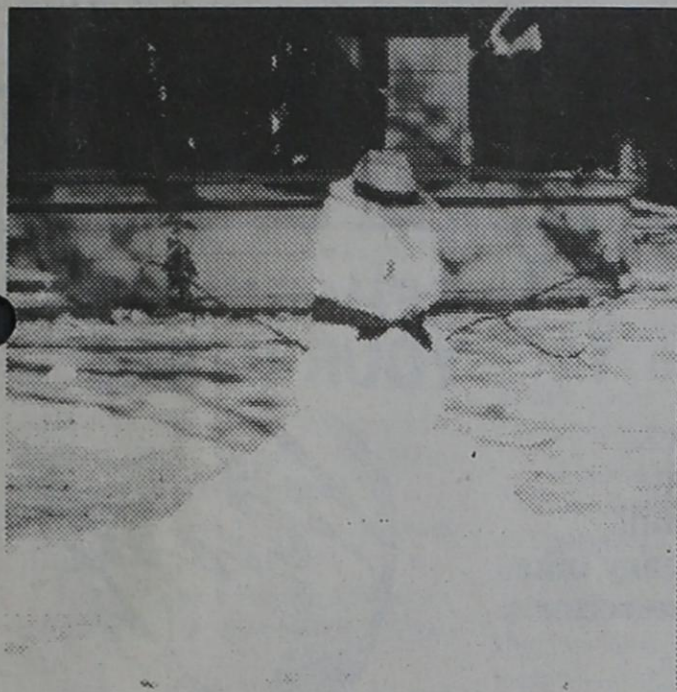

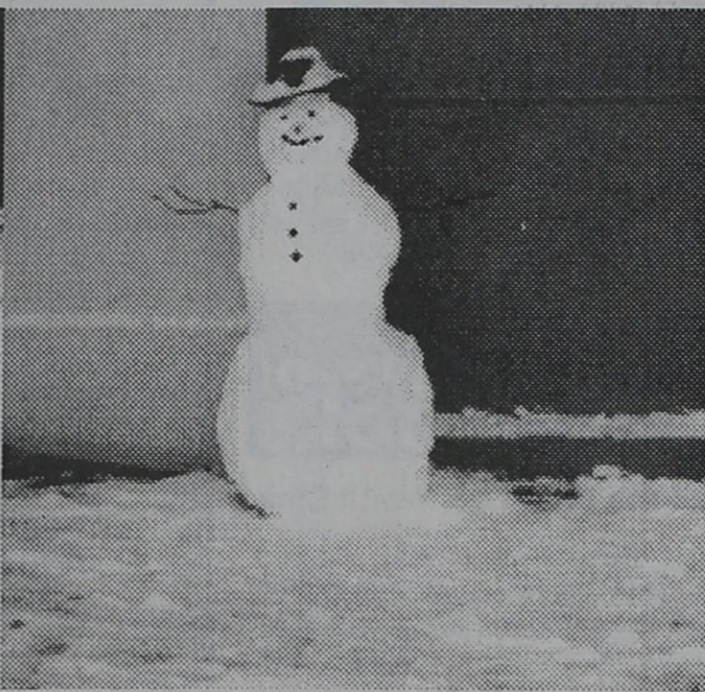

Together Against Drug Abuse Kicks Off Friday at 2:45 p.m. at GHS

Together Against Drug Abuse is a Masonic program to help young students make correct choices when confronted with the temptation to use alcohol, tobacco, prescription or hard drugs. With the help from teachers, parents, law-enforcement officers, local and state community leaders, local masons and Masonic lodges, and the local business community, we can help them fight a problem they cannot fight alone.

The program brings leaders from the business community, local law-enforcement officers, local and state leaders and masons together in their communities to help their children and grandchildren in their community to give them insight to what happens to them if they make bad choices now and in the future when confronted with the use of these drugs.

The program is designed for students in the fifth grade. Our program is designed to be presented to the students by a uniformed law-enforcement officer in their school and their room. The officer will present the program every week starting the fifth day of January 2001 until the first or second week of May. The instructor's manual has enough material to make about fifteen sessions in the classroom. The lessons are assisted by work problems in the manual and video tapes. Each student will receive his/her own T-shirt with the logo on the front to wear to class the day the officer presents the program. Upon completion, each student will receive a certification with his/her name. The certificate is nice enough to frame and keep and is signed by the officer teaching the class and the school principal.

County Commissioner L.T. Owen To Retire After January 1, 2001

Things are really going to be different around Eastland County Commissioner's Courtroom after Jan. 1, 2001.

For one thing, L.T. Owen of Rising Star, who has been Commissioner of Pct. 3 more than 28 years is retiring.

Owen was appointed by County Judge Scott Bailey in 1972, and served with Judge Bailey until the Judge's retirement Jan. 1, 1999. Since that time he has served with County Judge Brad Stephenson.

Judge Bailey says he thinks L.T. Owen has been a County Commissioner longer than anyone else in Eastland County. Bailey says the next longest term would be that of Comm. of Pct. 4 "Runt" Dill of Cisco. Dill began as Commissioner in 1963 and served until he retired in 1986.

L.T. Owen's position in Pct. 3 will be taken by Bill Underwood, who won in the General Election 2000.

"You have a good man coming in," L.T. as he is called- said recently. "Bill has worked for me, and he's always been a good employee. He'll take care of things--I feel good about that."

"Taking care of thing," to L.T. includes keeping up some of the best rural roads in the county.

"L.T. Owen was one of the more experienced County Commissioners to come board," Judge Bailey recalls. "He was the one of only three Commissioners I appointed during my 36 years as County Judge."

"Pct. 3 Commissioner L.J. "Buck" Collins died in 1972, and I appointed L.T. right after the Runoff election." The Judge continued, "Owen hasn't disappointed me. He has served during critical times."

"The First thing he faced was having to redistrict Pct. 3 to avoid a Federal Lawsuit. We had to recombine the Rising Star-Gorman area, giving Owen a larger Precinct than he ran for."

The Retired Judge also explained about some of the other crises the County Commissioners faced-and survived- during the years Owen served. Among other things, they were forced to build a new jail in 1980 and enlarge it in 1998.

"No matter what happened, Owen always stayed within his budget and had good roads," Judge Bailey commented. "His knowledge and expertise of road building and machinery has always been a big help to the county."

"He could do anything he asked his men to do. Anytime the roads weren't being graded just right he would say 'Let me tell you how to do that.' No he'd say 'Jump off there and let me show you!'"

In thinking about his years as a Commissioner, L.T. Recalls that he has seen many changes.

"We started out with lower salaries and old equipment, he comments. "I'm leaving some good equipment."

When asked if he didn't usually vote against salary raises and tax raises, he nods his head. "Never was in favor of raising things too much in too short a time," he comments.

Owen says that one of the worst things he remembers during the 28 years were the floods of 1991, and the damage they did to the roads.

"But I've enjoyed my job," he declares. "There are a lot of people I need to thank, though, beginning with special thanks to the people of Pct. 3. They have always supported me."

"Then there's my wife, Josie, who always encouraged me when things got tough. She and my three boys, Johnny, Robert and Bill, were always ready to help me what they could--even on weekends if necessary."

"I have had good workers on the road crews--I couldn't have done the job without them. They have especially pitched in and helped me during the last few years, when I have been sick some."

"I really appreciate all this help and support."

Owen adds: "I'm real strong on the idea that a County Commissioner should serve not only the people of his own Precinct, but also the people of the whole county. You have to vote on stuff that affects everyone."

"Yes, I will miss the job, but I know you have a good man to carry on for the people of Pct. 3 and Eastland County."

Its not a nuisance virus; it is a true shark and will eat your Windows operating system without a hiccup.

As stated before, even if you know and trust the sender, we suggest you delete executable attachments. That is unless you are prepared for a possible virus such as this. This particular worm checks for all messages in your Inbox and replies to those messages that have an attachment. This is generally without the sender even being aware of the problem.

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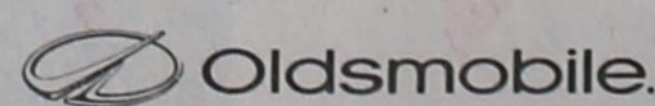
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
