#### REAPPRAISAL WORK TO BEGIN FOR EASTLAND COUNTY

Employees of the Eastland County Appraisal District will start preliminary field work within the next few days on the re-appraisal of all property within the district.

The ast county-wide re-appraisal was completed in 1982 almost four years ago. The State Property Tax Code, which was passed by the State Legislature in 1979; requires a periodic review of all taxable property throughout the state at least once every four years.

In order to comply with this requirement of the Code, it is necessary to conduct a re-appraisal of Eastland County for 1986.

The re-appraisal project will take several months to complete. Re-appraisal notices, along with the necessary appraisal review hearings, will be provided at the time of completion of the project.

with no close second says County Extension Agent DeMarquis Gordon. Farmers are searching for an experimenting with alternate crops that will return a fair profit. Among the other alternate crops are potatoes, green beans, dried peas and alfalfa.

Recently, Hilmar Sibley, agronomist for Best Maid Products in Fort Worth contacted Gordon about the possibility of producing cucumbers in Eastland County for the Fort Worth plant. At the present mechanically harvested cucumbers are produced in Knox County near Munday and Knox City.

The agent says the cucumberpickle crop would be a good crop for irrigated peanut growers. Cucumbers do well on the same type soil THE GORMAN PROGRESS

where peanuts are grown. They are a short term crop. Only 50 days are required from planting to harvest in the spring and 45 days are required for a fall crop. At least two crops may be grown on the same land. However, Gordon says the spring crop would be more compatible with peanut farming.

The spring crop is planted about April 15 and harvested June 1. Three irrigations may be required. This is prior to the time irrigation is needed for peanuts according to the agent.

Cucumbers are planted with about four rows on a wide bed. The row are 8 to 10 inches apart and 30 inches between beds. Seed are planted five inches apart in the row.

In 50 days the cucumbers are harvested. The vines are dug and destroyed in the harvest process. Production should be between 5,000 and 10,000 pounds per acre or an average of about 7,500 pounds per

The buyer contracts the crop before planting. Contract price this next year will be \$6 per 100 pounds. The buyer will purchase all marketable cucumbers from 0 to 2 1/8 inches in diameter.

Cucumbers are pollinated by bees and other insects rather than by wind. It is necessary to place bee hives in the field during the last week or two before harvest to insure a heavy set of cucumbers.

Other costs are required for land preparation, seed, herbicide, fertilizer, irrigation, insecticide, repairs and maintenance, land rent and field freight. The estimated cost of production is approximately \$289.00 per acre.

The estimated price for 7500 pounds of cucumbers at \$6.00 per hundred would be \$450.00. This leaves an estimated net income of 3161.00 per acre.

Harvesting on the right day is most important. Since cucumbers mature rapidly, a delay in harvest will result in too many over sized cucumbers and premture harvest results in low yields.

A fall crop would compete with peanuts for water and labor resources says Gordon, but a spring crop should fit well with peanuts in this county. Sibley said the fall crop is more suitable for farmers in Knox

Several farmers in Eastland County have expressed an interest in growing cucumbers. Sibley and Gordon visited with three growers recently about growing cucumbers in

He was made so heartily welcome. He thought his nephew would shake his arm off. He was perfectly at home within minutes.




