CITY CHIT CHAT

The City Commission met in regular session at 5:30 P.M. on Thursday, August 20 with the Mayor and all Commissioners present. Others present were Mrs. Brinnegar Cheif Funderburgh, Judge Parker, Mr. Barnett, Officer Steve Estes, Officer Allan Swanner, Mrs. Estelle Craddock, and Mrs. Ann Funderburgh.

The Commission passed by a 4-0 vote to set the tax rate for 1987 at \$0.30 per \$100 valuation. This is the same as the rate for 1986. The only change that anyone will have in the amount of taxes paid will be where there has been a change of appraised value. The City has nothing to do with setting the values, we just collect the taxes. We also voted 4-0 to allow a discount of 3% in October, 2% in November, 1% in December and net in January. Taxes not paid before February 1, 1988 will be delinquent. We hope that we will be able to operate with the amount that this rate will produce.

a big water bill. Water usage has been extremely high. In July we used over 7,000,000 gallons of water and due to the big usage during the last half of the month after meters were read much of this will be reflected on this bill. We are billed by the Water District by the calendar month but your bills are figured from around the 15th to the 15th of each month. You may have had a big bill last month and decided to cut back in watering, but you must remember that you had already used water during the last half of July which is billed this month. I hope that you will understand why you may have a big bill. You also may have a leak somewhere in your system.

We got an increase this year of about 10c per 1000 gallons which we have not passed on to you at this time. We hope that we will not have to pass this increase on, but if we do, I will let you know.

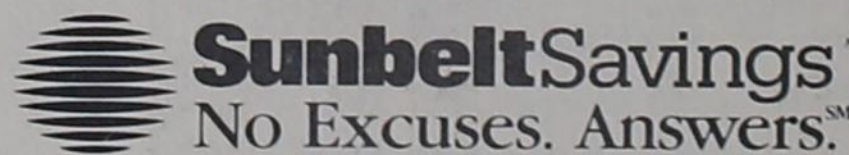

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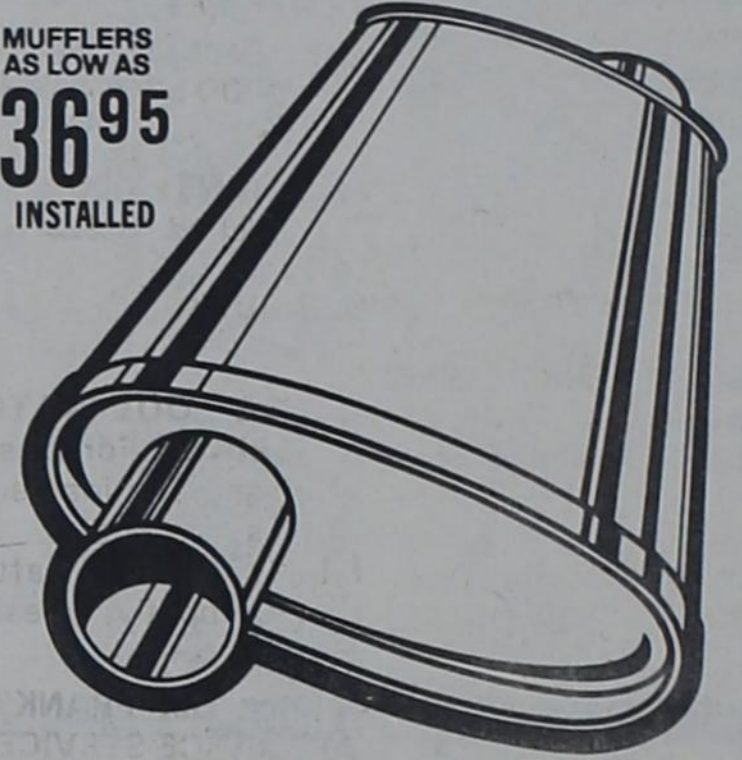

LETTER TO PARENTS

The Gorman School serves nutritious meals every school day. Students many buy lunch for .85-.90 and breakfast for .60 - .65 children from households that meet Federal Income guidelines are eligible for free meals or reduced-price meals at 40c for lunch and 30c for breakfast. To apply for free or reduced-price meals, complete the enclosed application, sign it and return it to the school.

FOOD STAMP/AFDS HOUSEHOLDS: If you currently receive Food Stamps or "Aid to Families with Dependent Children" for your child, you only have to list your child's name and food stamp or AFDC case number, print your name, and sign the application. since you have already given income information to the welfare office, the school can confirm your eligibility.

ALL OTHER HOUSEHOLDS: If your household income is at or below the level shown on the enclosed scale, your child is eligible for either free or reduced-price meals. To apply for meal benefits, you must provide the following information and sign the application: (1) list the names of everyone who lives in your household. Include parents, grandparents, all children, other relatives and unrelated people who live in your household, (2) list the social security number of each adult age 21 or older. If an adult does not have a social security number print "None" (3) list total monthly income and amount of income (BEFORE deductions for taxes, social security, etc.) each person received last month and where it is from, such as wages, retirement, or welfare. If you have a household member for whom last month's income was higher or lower than usual, list the person's expected average monthly income.

VERIFICATION: The information

(These guidelines should be used by the school to determine eligibility for free or reduced-price meals and should be provided the media for public release.)

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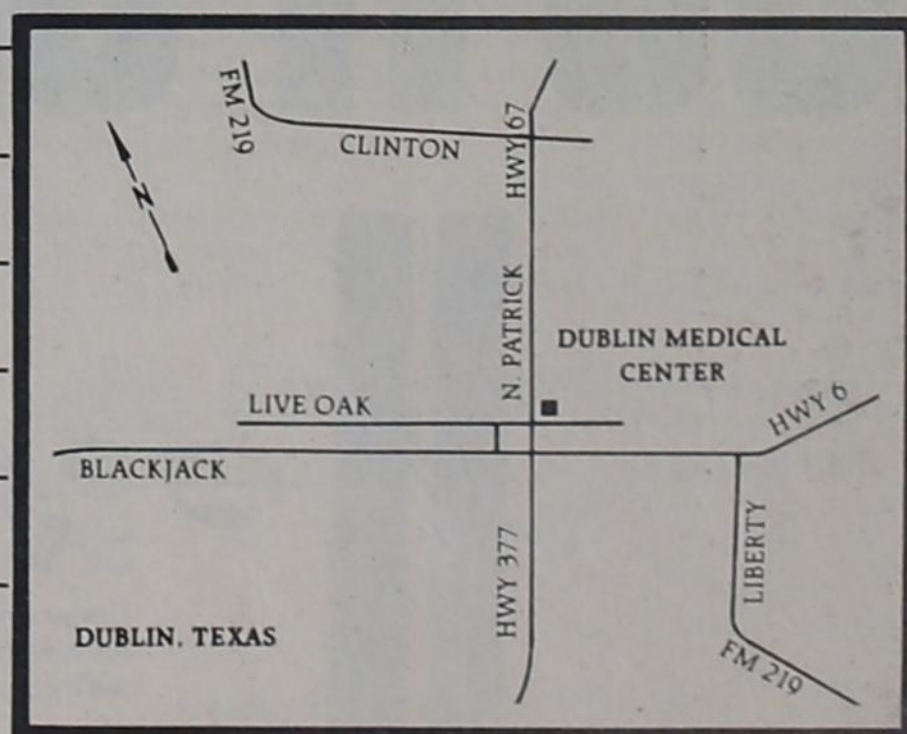
