The Gorman Panthers traveled to Evant on Friday night to take on the Elks in a district 8A contest and came home with their second district loss of the season by a margin of 7-6. This makes the Panthers record read 4-2. The Big Red just never seemed to jell just right until the final few minutes of the game and then they came up just a little short on their try for a win. After scoring their touchdown, the Panthers failed to convert the two point play for the win and thus lost their hard fought game.

The Panthers and Elks played on fairly even terms until just 2:02 remained in the first period. The Elks climaxed a drive from their own 37 yard line in 11 plays with Nicky Craft getting the final 5 yards on a run for the score. The drive featured some fine running and also a 12 yard pass completion. Sheldon Bennight kicked the point after and Evant was out in front 7-0.

This evenly matched game continued until late in the fourth period when the Panthers finally got their blocking assignments down and started a drive on their own 35 yard line after an interception by Scott Gressett. Following an incomplete pass, Gressett hit Jay McCormick on an 11 yard pass for a first down. Then following a 3 yard run, Gressett hit Don Rodgers for a pass completion of 5 yards. Then came a 4 yard run by Joe Rodgers for another first down. The following a 2 yard run, Gressett again hit Don on a 4 yard pass. Following this Gressett rolled out for 9 yards and the Panthers were rolling. Don added another 11 yards on a run. Gressett again made a first down on a 5 yard run after two running plays got 8. The following a no gainer and a 1 yard run, Gressett rammed it in from 1 yard out with just 2:02 left in the game and it looked as though the Big Red might pull out a win after all. However, this was not to be, as the Panthers called time out to check with Coach Gibbs on what play to run for the two pointer which would have put the Panthers out front by 1. But the Elks defense had other plans and set up their defense for a wide play and held the Panthers on the two point try and then proceded to run out most of the remaining time on the clock to secure the win. The Panthers did get the ball back

with a little under 1 miinute to play, but could not get anyhting going in the time left and the Elks thrilled their homecoming crowd with a 7 to 6 victory.

This was a tough loss for the Big Red, but they were hampered with some key injuries and that hurts a lot. We feel that the Big Red just waited too long before getting any momentum going and then didn't have time to get the other score to win the game.

The Panthers will be on the road again Friday night when they travel to Blanket to take on the Tigers, who have shown a lot of strength this season and always give the Panthers a stiff contest. The Tigers have laso a couple of games but have a fine ball club and will be ready to play. The Panther defense will really be tested in this battle and will have to have a good game to come out on top.

Scott Gressett led the Panthers with 42 yards on 9 keepers. Don and Joe Rodgers each had 30 yards rushing. Don ran 12 times and Joe ran 5 times. Jay McCormick got 28 on 6 tries and Brandon Gilmore had just 6 yards on 4 carries.

Let's all follow the Panthers to Blanket Friday night and back them to victory and help them get back in the win column again. Go Get 'Em Big Red!



These are the types of topics that he will address at New Hope on October 25. The public is cordially invited to attend.



COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

Eastland County Commissioners Monday approved a contract with Apollo Data Services of Odessa for computer equipment and services.

Cost for the entire system is \$40,404 per year. Each department is billed separately.

In other business:

Commissioners voted to keep Prudential Insurance Co. policies for another year.

They discussed the decision by the R.S. Postal Service to advertise for a new building to house the Olden Post Office. Commissioners were told the present building is not adequate. They placed no restrictions on a possible building site.

A letter was read from Marcia Carr, administrator of Eastland Memroial Hospital. In the letter, the hospital offered to be the provider for indigent care for eligible patients not in a hospital district.

Commissioners decided the indigent care should be handled on a patient-by-patient basis.

The present budget was amended to transfer reserve funds to the general fund. This will pay for repairs at the county jail and for out of county prisoner care.
