cotton for market. He was one of the first to grow peanuts in this com munity. Goober peas as they were nown then, was a family job, with
lowing done by horse and mule eam. To get ready to plant, the sacks of peanuts were emptied on sheets. The family had to pick out
sticks before you could plant. In a ticks before you could plant. In
few days they were up a good stand So was grass. All the kids had to hoe grass out until July 4th. At digging time, peanuts were plowed up by team. The family shook them by
hand, and shocked them with nuts inside. When they were dry enough they were hauled and stacked Daddy cut and hauled wood to stalk for the old Steam thresher. After hreshing, the sacks of nuts wer In rainy weather, the nuts would sprout and grow through the sacks. During depression we sold pea uts for 25 ens a hel. All w wad died June 8, 1937, leaving mother and me (Sarah) alone. Moth er died June 3, 1949. I am the only one living of S. F. and R. A ome place, and have never lived any other place.
My husband, Lum Tuggle, and both 90 years of age and still raise
cattle on this place at Kokomo and manage the place by ourselves.

Officials Testify In Support Of Health Care Legislation
Officials from Texas testified be-
fore a U.S. House panel last Thursfore a U.S. House panel last Thursday in support of health care legisiation introduced by
man Charles W. Stenholm. The Subcommitee on Health and Environment called a hearing to discuss the Stenholm bill, which is entitled "PRO Due Process and Equity Amendments." The bill
would revise the Medicare Peer Review Organization's process of physician sanctioning. It would require that physicians and provid ers have the opportunity to appeal
ansanction before it goes into effect. ansanction before it goes into effect
except where there is imminent danger to patients. Currently, the PRO sanctions go into effect before doctors are given basic cue proces rights.
Congressman Stehnolm testified on behalf of his own bill telling the subcommittee that changes must be made to protect patients and doctors
in all rural areal of the nation. The in all rural areal of the nation. The tions negatively affect small town hospitals and could eventually lead to more town without doctors. "What we're dealing with here is we playing with the livelihoods of physicians, but we're also dealing with access to care for entire communities. With things as seriou as this, we'd better be sure we have
created the best system we can one which secures the rights of both physicians and beneficiaries."
The law should be amended to specify appropriate due process re-
quirements which all PROs must follow before recommending sanc tions," he continued. "In a country where due process is a treasured in the peer review process," he said. "Physicians do not have a right to an attorney, a right to present
witnesses, or a right to cross-examwitnesses, or a right to cross-exam
ine witnesses."

Texas Representatives Ralph Hal (D-Rockwall) and Beau Boulter (Radded their support to the legislation. Dr. Jim Bob Brame, president of the Texas Medical Association also appeared before the congres-
sional hearing. He said. "The practicing physician simply does not have confidence in the review process that the PRO uses in Texas. We
urge you to favorable urge you to favorable consider this bill."
The Stamford Democrat expressed
optimism about the legislation's optimism about the legislation's
chances for passage. "It has been chances for passage. It has been
encouraging to see greater attention given these issues in recent weeks and months. I commend Chairman
Henry Waxman for his Henry Waxman for his expeditious
response to a request for a hearing response to a request for a hearing
on this subject. This has become on of the most serious concerns in my district as well as all rural areas the area congressman said.
