The Gorman Panthers got back on the winning track here Friday night when they hosted the Santa Anna Mountaineers in a crucial District 8A contest, and came away with an 18 to 3 victory. The win puts Gorman at 4 and 1 for the season and 1 and 1 in district play.

The Big Red had a few problems with the heavy Mountaineers for the first few minutes, then settled down and played some real fine football.

Santa Anna scored first in the game on a 21 yard field goal by James Hartman with 5:33 left in the first period after intercepting a Panther pass on the Gorman 6 yard line. The Mountaineers then received a 10 yard penalty for holding, and had two running plays to net 8 yards before passing on third down. The pass try was incomplete and they decided to try the field goal.

The teams played on even terms until the clock showed 9 minutes left in the half when Joe Rodgers capped a long drive with a 3 yard run for the score. The drive covered 77 yards in 12 plays and featured a beautiful 40 yard gallop by Brandon Gilmore. The try for two points failed and Gorman was out in front 6 to 3.

The Big Red defense was doing a good job most of the way Friday night and on a pass play by the Mountaineers on second down, Hartman threw a fairly deep pass and Jay McCormick stepped in front of the Santa Anna receiver, intercepted the ball and raced untouched for 65 yards and a touchdown with 5:56 left in the half. Again the try for two points failed and Gorman led 12 to 3.

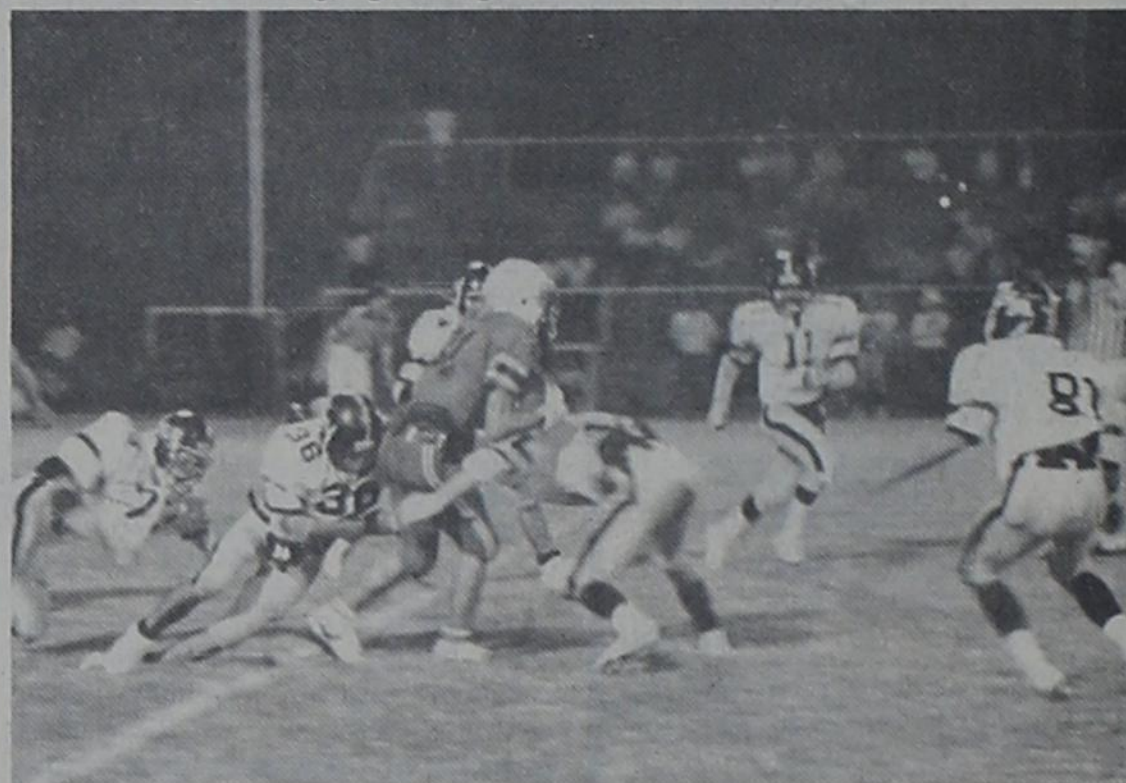
job with some very hard hittin' an' tackling.

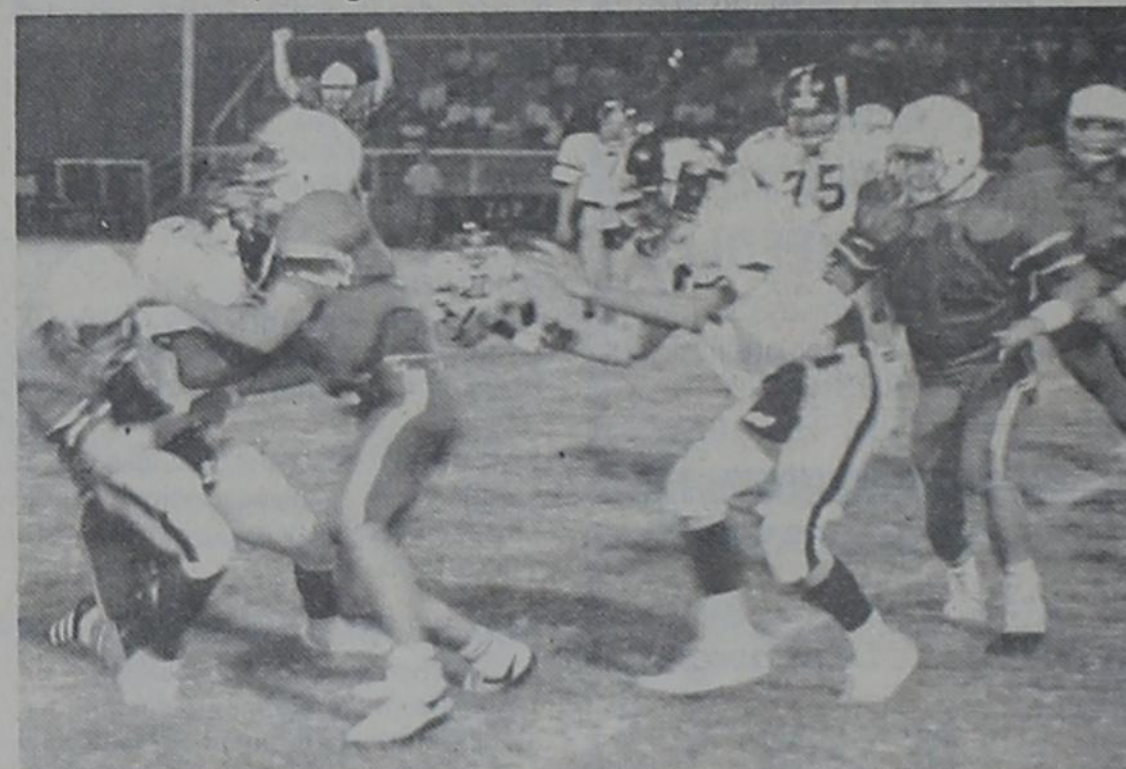

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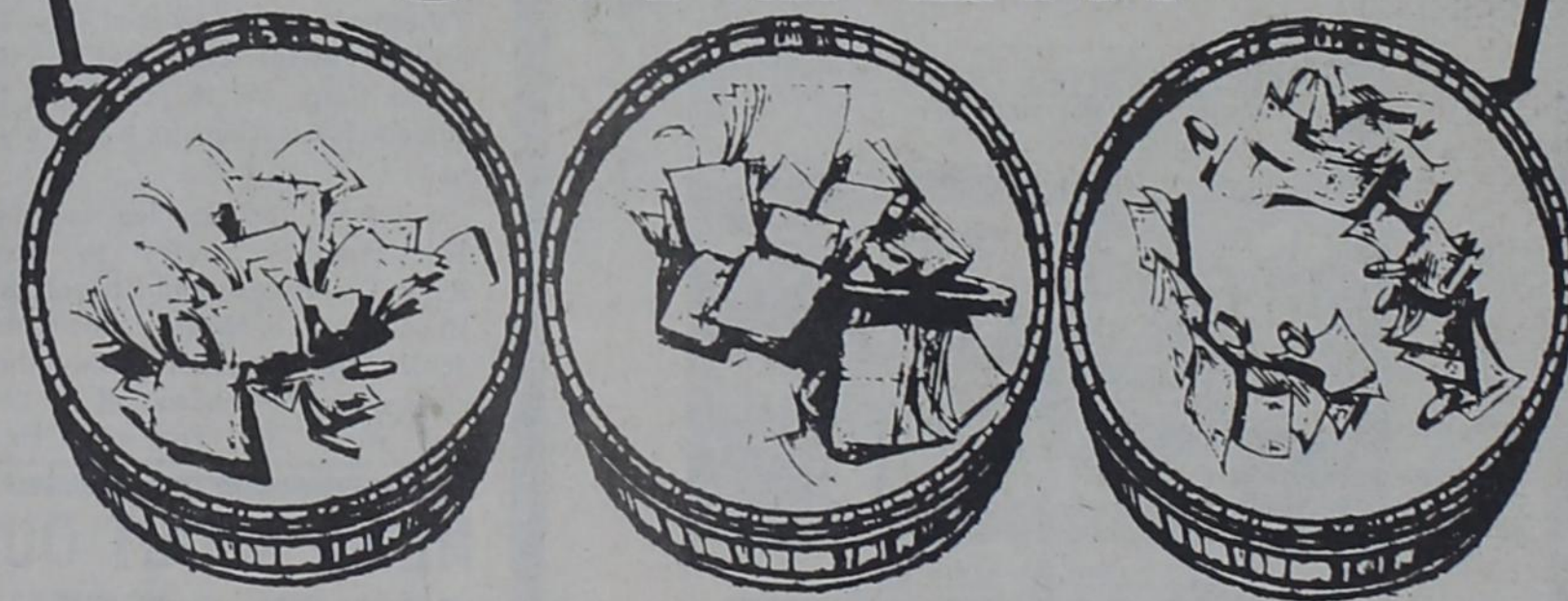

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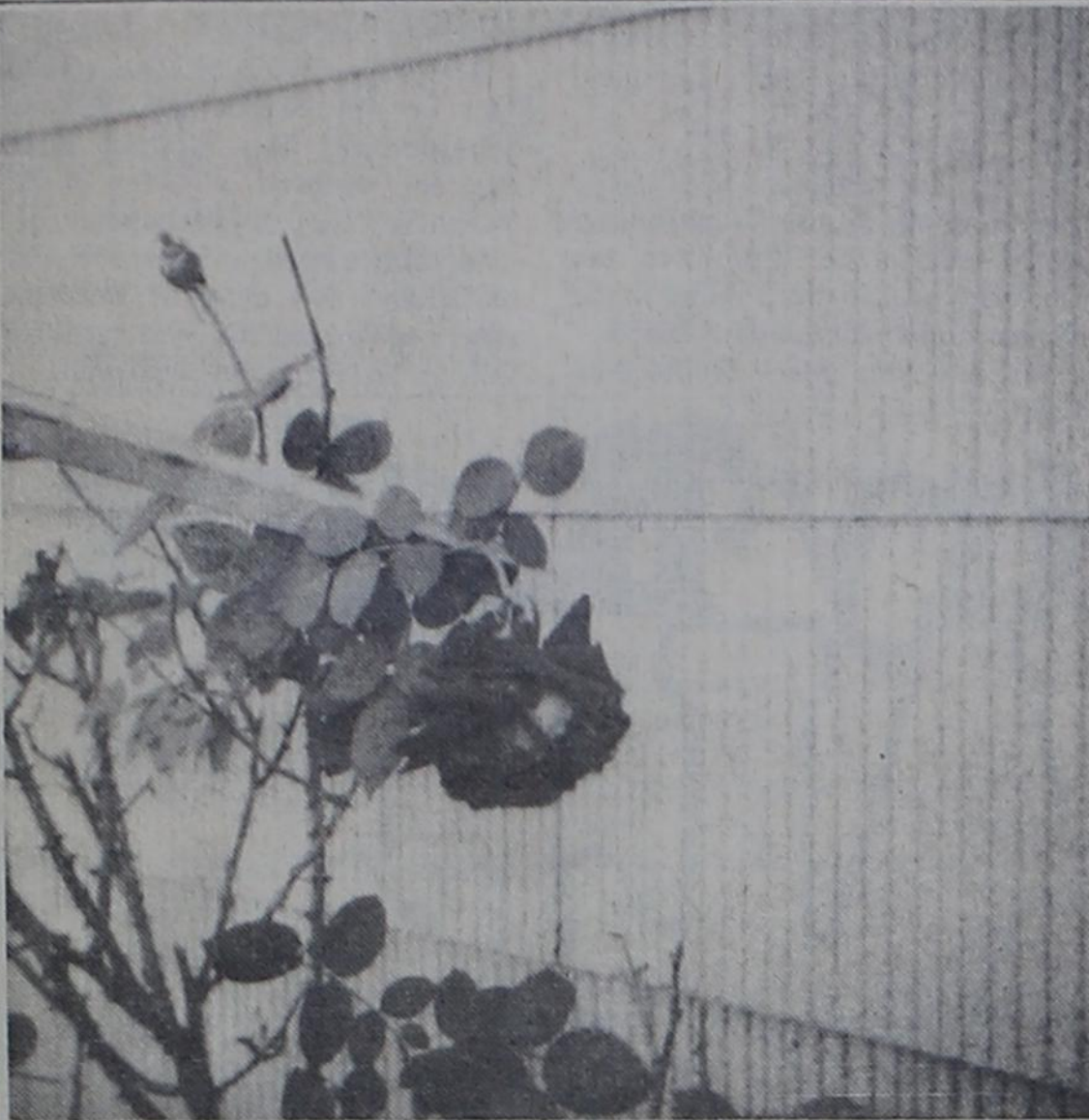
