PANTHERS BLANK TIGERS 40-0; OPEN THIS WEEK

The Gorman Panthers pened the season on a bright note on Friday night when they hosted the Hico Tigers and came away with a lopsided 40 to 0 margin. The Big Red shocked the heavily favored Tigers by scoring three touchdowns in the first quarter while holding the Tigers offense to a total of 129 yards on the ground and in the air. The only Tiger passes completed were to Gorman defensive backs, two of which were intercepted by Scott Gressett.

The Panthers wasted little time and really showed some strength and determination as they took the kickoff on their own 36 and went the distance in ten plays with Don Rodgers getting the final 4 yards on a run with 7:56 left on the clock. The drive featured two rund by Don of 4 and 12 yards and also a pass for 12 yards from Scott Gressett to set the Big Red up at the 10. A pass to Don added the two points and the score stood at 8-0. The Panther defense held the Tigers on their first possession to only 8 yards on the first three plays and forced the punt. The Panthers took the ball on the 50 and moved the distance in just five plays with Kevin Hirst getting the touchdown from 3 yards out on a pass from Gressett with 3:43 left in the period. The drive featured a beautiful 27 yard run by Brandon Gilmore and a fine pass reception by Gilmore for 20 yards to set the Panthers up at the Tiger 9. Another pass to Gilmore added the two pointer and Gorman was ahead 16 to 0 with 3:43 left in the period. Again the Panthers did a great job on the defense as they recovered a Tiger fumble on their own 18 yard line. This time it took only three plays for the Panthers to score. Following a no-gain play on first down, Gressett faded out and tossed a beautiful pass to Don Rodgers and he raced to the one yard line before being tackled by a Tiger defender. Then on the next play Scott Gressett got the final yard on a quarterback sneak with 15 seconds left in the first period. This time Gilmore ran for the two pointer and the Big Red were out in front by 24 to 0 and seemed to have the game pretty well in control. Then two possessions later after the Big Red defense had picked up another Tiger fumble by Jerry Simmons on the Tiger 42 the Panther offense went to work again and moved the distance in 8 plays with Gilmore getting the touchdown from 4 yards out with 4:12 left in the half. The drive featured a 5 yard pass to Gilmore and also a 14 yard run by Gilmore. Rodgers ran for the two points and the Panthers had a commanding 32-0 margin. The Panthers got another drive going in the third quarter, taking the ball on their own 42 and going the distance in 9 plays with Gilmore getting the TD on a 2 yard run with 5:17 left in the period. Gilmore also added the two pointer on a run and the score rose to 40 to 0. The drive

Due to the overwhelming response our proofreaders and editors are busy. Because of this flurry of incoming stories recently, the publishers have given us an additional short period of time to gather more family stores. So, you still have time to do yours if you have been procrastinating.

In brief, follow these guidelines: 1. 500 words per story. That is, each household can be 500 words. You can use more words at 10c per word.

2. If at all possible, type your story. Double space it with one inch margins on all sides.

3. Put your name and address on each page.

4. Make an index on a separate page, list all people mentioned in your story. It does not have to be in alphabetical order.

5. Turn in 2 copies of your story and index. A xerox copy will do.

6. A photograph, one per story, will be printed free of charge. An additional picture may be used for a \$15.00 charge. Please do not send us old original photographs. For a small fee you can get a copy made at a photographer's studio. Color or black-and-white snapshots are acceptable. Please, no xerox copies or polaroids.

Pre-publication sales for the history book will begin in September. More on this subject next week.



Fred Rogers of Gorman has been appointed area chairman for the Cattlemen's Round-Up for Crippled Children, according to Jim Alexander of Abilene, CRCC general chairman.

250 chairmen statewide are assisting the Cattlemen's Round-Up for Crippled Children fundraiser which benefits the West Texas Rehabilitation Center in Abilene and San Angelo.

Aubrey Stokes, San Angelo attorney, is general co-chairman of this 18th annual event.

"The agricultural community has always believed in the philosophy of neighbor helping neighbor, and the Cattlemen's Round-Up is a prime example of that belief," says Shelley V. Smith, WTRC president/executive director.

"Livestock donated by ranchers are collected at a designated point in each community and transported to the auction site," Alexander explains. "The local chairman's job is to make a personal pledge, then ask others to join them in this drive which is anticipated to raise \$300,000 this fall.
