Dear Joe,
 I just wanted to write and express my opinion on the article about trials without juries.

The reason for having jury trials is everyone is innocent until proven guilty. This right is given to us by the Bill of Rights. Sometimes a jury doesn't act as it has heard evidence in the jury box. The law spells out what can be done by the jury. The reason the jury system works is because there are 6 or 12 people using their minds and hopefully

voicing their opinion to the other jurors in the jury room.

A judge is one person who can rule in a one person opinion, thereby leaving more room for error when all the power is in their hands. Judges are only human and they are capable of making mistakes errors. Peoples lives and livelihoods can be ruined by over zealous power seeking judges. In some cases friendships and past business relationships are not serated from judicial duty. The jury stops judges from becoming powerful dictators. The jury acts as a check and balance on our judicial system. Every American should cherish with the highest regard to serve on a jury, with the thought in mind that every juror is helping to preserve that freedom.

The Appeals Court works as another check and balance on judges and juries. The Supreme Court also acts as a higher court reviewing the checks and balances of the laws to see that they have been properly interpreted as they were meant.

I think you will see where taxpayer money is not wasted by preserving the freedoms won with the Supreme Sacrifice given by the men and women of this great country of ours. The jury system may not be perfect, but it is the best system we have. We need people willing to serve and take a stand for freedom. If we don't take the opportunity to serve there are always people willing to serve in order that they themselves can profit for their own self gain as the dictators before World War II.

If lawyers and judges were paid the way juries are paid trials would be short and to the point.

One example where the judge has sole power is issuing summary judgements in civil lawsuits bypassing the jury system altogether in the name of speeding up the court system. Trying cases by affidavits only. There is no testimony or jury. The summary justice allows the judge too much power to the point of possibly becoming dictatorial or vindictive in some cases. This is more reason for letting the jury system still operate.

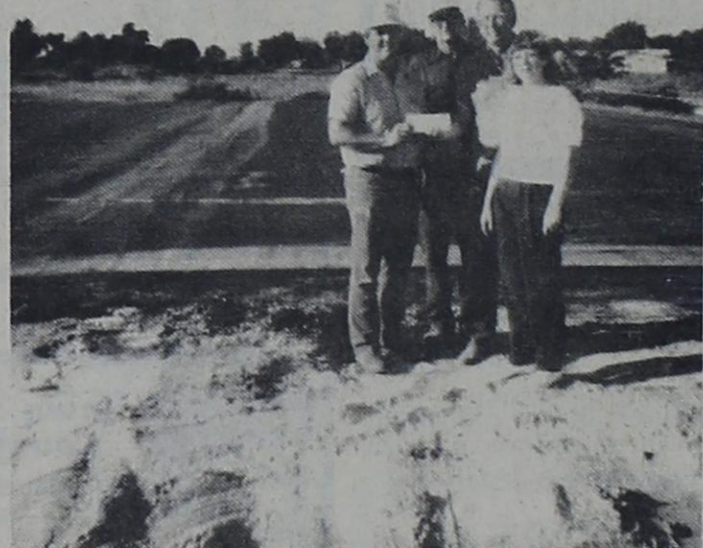

Progress is being made on Tennis Courts, now that the rains have let up. The base material has dried out and the hot mix has been laid. All of the base work is complete. The next course of action is fencing and curbing around the courts. Then the courts will be finished by Texas Courts and Windscreens of Abilene, applying an acrylic non-skid surface. We expect all of this to be completed before September.

The Committee raised in cash and pledges a total of \$13,518.58 to help the School District pay for this project. Total for project is approximately \$24,000.00. The School Board ask Gene Foster to serve as the project overseer. Gorman will have two of the best Tennis Courts anywhere. The school board is looking forward to building a tennis program. On behalf of the Tennis Court Committee and Gorman School Board, we would like to thank everyone who made a donation toward this project. Major donors were Lions Club, Chamber of Commerce, Birdsong Peanuts, Citizens State Bank, and Gorman PTO. Also thanks to all who worked on the fundraisers, like the Outsider Basketball Games and all the individual donations. 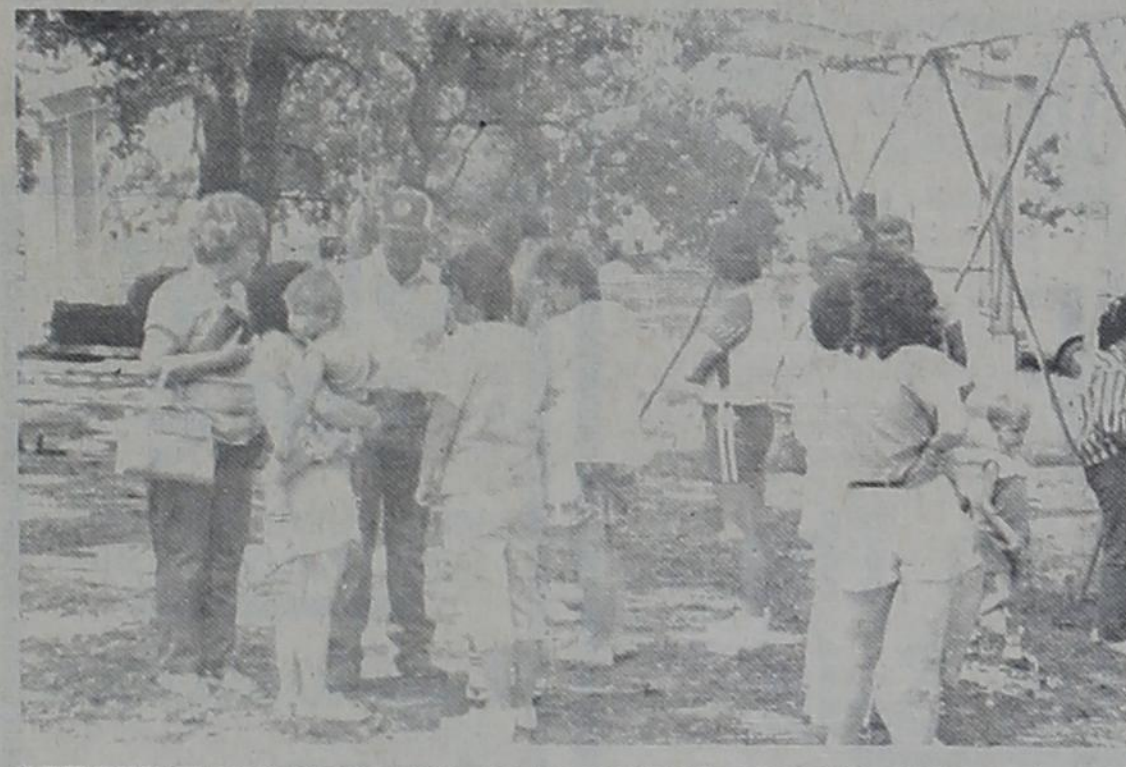
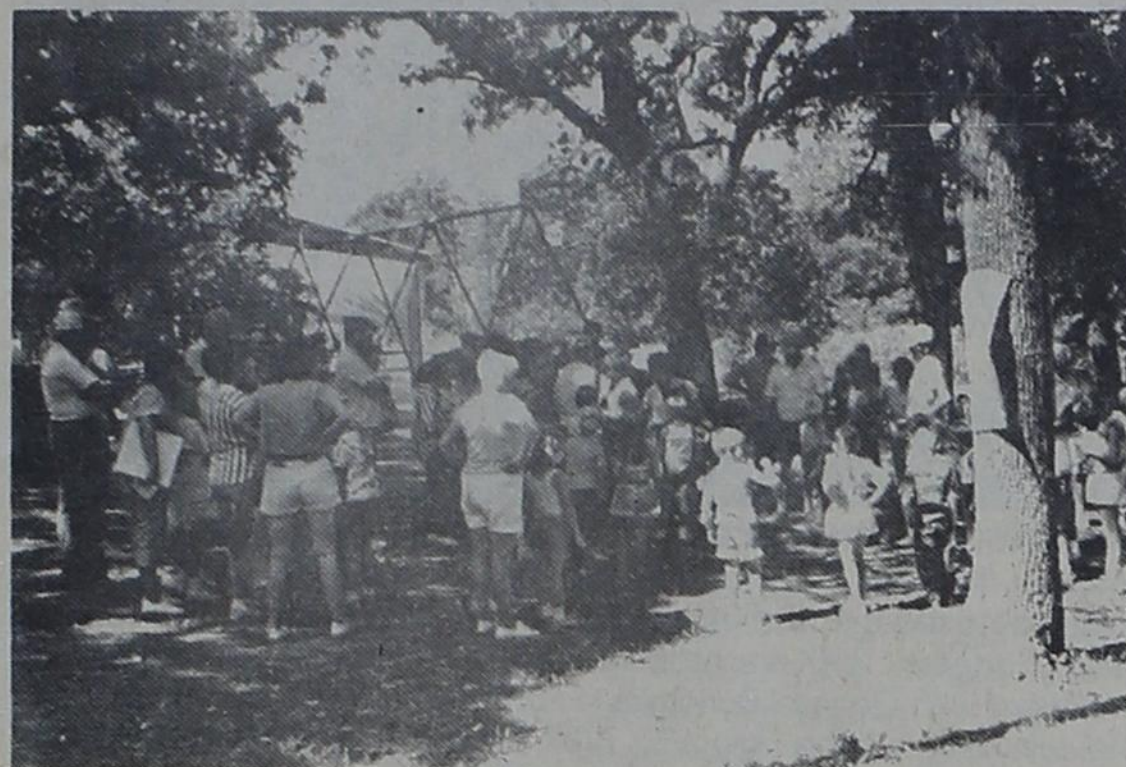

Haycee had some hard competition and she used a new pass, but she competed well. It was a good learning experience for Haycee and the other kids that plan to go next year.

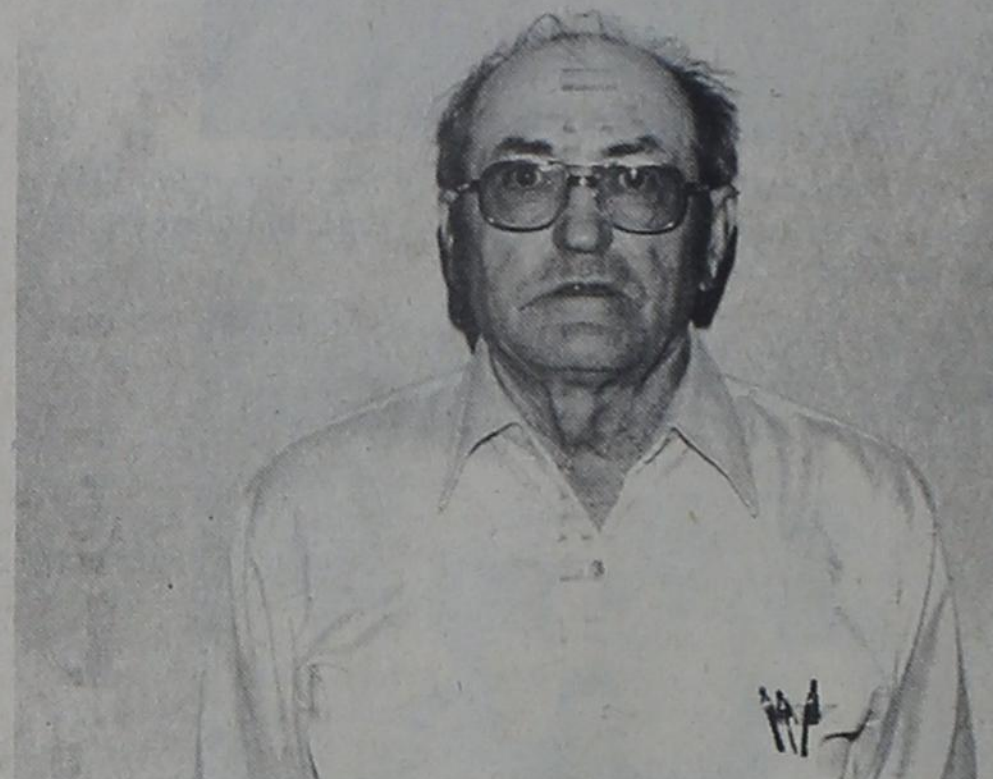
TAEX Sponsoring Parenting Letter Series For County
