## USDA PROPOSES NEW PEANUT REGULATIONS

| The U.S. Department of Agriculture today issued proposed regula- tions for determining state and farm poundage quotas for the 1986 through 1990 peanut crops, according to Milton Hertz, acting administrator of USDA's Agricultu- <br> ral Stabilization and Conservation <br> Service. <br> Many rules remain unchanged from the 1982-85 peanut program. However, certain changes are required by amendments which are made to the Agricultural Adjustment of 1985, Hertz said. <br> The amendments include provisions for allocating peanut poundage quotas in certain instances to farms on which only non-quota peanuts were produced in the past. Those "non-quota" farms eligible for such allocations are only those farms on which peanuts were produced in two out of three of the years preceding the year in which a quota determination is being made. <br> Such farms will be eligible for allocations due to increase to state quotas resulting from an increase in the national peanut poundage quota, allocations of peanut poundage quoduction, and allocations of peanut poundage quotas that have been released from other farms. <br> According to Hertz, the most significant provisions of the proposed regulations are as follows: | --ASCS will prorate any increase in a state's poundage quota equally among quota and non-quota farms based upon the number of farms in each group. For quota farms, ASCS increases for each farm based upon the larger of either the poundage quota for the farm for the preceding crop year or the average of the two highest quantities of peanuts which were produced on the farm int the three years preceding the year for which the quota allocation is being made. Quotas will be prorated among non-quota farms based upon the average for each farm of the two were produced in the three years preceding the year for which the quota allocation is being made. <br> ASCS also modified the rules which govern reductions of quotas for nonproduction. The new rules require a reduction of quota to the extent that the quota was not actually produced (or considered produced) on a farm in 2 of the 3 years preceding the year for which a Previous quota reductions were limited to the quantity necessary to achieve a specified reduction in a state's quota. Also, for the $1986-90$ crop years, a farm poundage quota will be "considered produced" only if production of the quota was not possible as a result of a natural disaster or other condition beyond | the producer's control. <br> Farm poundage quotas which are reduced for non-production or permanently released will be prorated among quota and non-quota farms within a state based upon the quantity of peanuts produced on the farms which are eligible for such allocations. However, the proposed regulations provide that at least 25 percent of the poundage quotas ment must be distributed to nonquota farms. <br> Hertz said that the proposed regulations permit owners or operators of peanut farms to temporarily release quotas to the ASCS State office for reapportionment for one year. The proposed regulations provide that the ASCS state committee would allocate the releasedd quota to farms that request reapportioned quota. <br> The provisions of the 1985 Act and the proposed regulations permit fall leases only if the quota established for the transferring farm has been planted. <br> The proposed regulations appear in the April 1 Federal Register. If insecticide applications are deermined to be necessary use products containing diazinon, dime
thoate, acephate, malathion or oxy- demton-methyl.
The manufacturer generally cludes precautions on the label when phytotoxicity is a danger. To avoid
unnecessary damage, apply the insnecessary damage, apply the in-
secticide only to plants specified on the label. Mix according to directions and apply the recommended dosage.

WASHINGTON, April 1 -- Final results of a referendum held January 27-31 show that peanut producers have approved poun
dage quotas for the 1986 through 1990 crops, according to dage quotas for the 1986 through 1990 crops, according to
Milton Hertz, acting administrator of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. Of the 21,456 votes cast, 20,904 or 97.4 percent, favored quotas and a loan program for the next five crops years, Hertz said. Two-thirds of the farmers voting must favor continuing the peanut
