





On this visit, he found that the city needed to get a permit for the north side plant, that a change should be made to correct the bypassing of waste water during excessive rainfall correct some errors in reported vaules, to report any bypass that does take place during heavy rains, work the plants so that we would get a better quality of water in our samples, to clean up some brush at the north plant, not to allow irrigation from the north plant, and to have a certified person in charge of

The application for a permit is in progress, his suggestion to correct the bypass has been done, more attention has been given to the plant operation so that it will function better, we will report as required, any bypass for what ever reason in the future, and as best as can be determined, there is no irrigation being done from the north plant and none has been done in recent years. We have a city employee that will take his test on August 11 for a permit to operate the plant. We hope that after that date, we will have a qualified operator.

We have not been cited for any pollution. Our drinking water is tested each month and no problem has been reported there. You can rest assured that if a problem occurs with pollution, you will be notified.
