The Gorman Panthers opened their season on Friday night when they hosted the Perrin Pirates at Brogdon Field and came away with a one-sided 30 to 6 decision. The Panthers jumped out to a 16-0 margin by the end of the first quarter and then added two more TD's in the last half to seal the victory.

Brandon Gilmore got the Big Red on the scoreboard first with 6:22 left in the initial period when he rambled 16 yards for the score. The drive covered 43 yards in just five plays. The drive also featured a 10 yard scamper by Kevin Hirst. Hirst also added the two pointer on a run to make the score 8-0.

Then after holding the Pirates and forcing a punt against the stiff wind, the Panthers took over on the Pirate 35. From there the Panthers gained one yard, then had an incomplete pass. After a 6 yard gain by Gilmore, the Panthers faced a fourth and 3 on the Pirate 28. On the fourth down play Joe Rodgers got the handoff and bulled his way for 19 yards and a first down at the Pirate 9. From there, Kevin Hirst raced in for the score with 2:41 left in the period. Gilmore added the two pointer on a run and the Big Red were up 16-0.

The Pirates hit the scoreboard with 2:58 left in the second period when Scott Aldredge ran in from 14 yards out after the Pirates had taken the ball on the Gorman 33. The drive featured a 15 yard pass on fourth down to set the Pirates up first and ten on the Gorman 20. Then facing a fourth down and 6, Aldredge got the TD on the 14 yard run. The run for two points failed and the score stood at 16-6. This is the way the half ended.

Late in the third quarter, Johnnie Osborne set the Panthers up at their own 40 yard line when he recovered a Pirate fumble. On third and 7, Hirst raced 25 yards for the first down. Then on third and 1 Hirst again got the first on a 5 yard run to set the Big Red up at the Pirate 15. Then on the next play Joe Rodgers got the handoff and raced for 13 yards up the middle to the 2. The Rodgers got the honors going the final 2 yards with just 39 seconds left in the third period. The run for points failed and the score was 22-6.

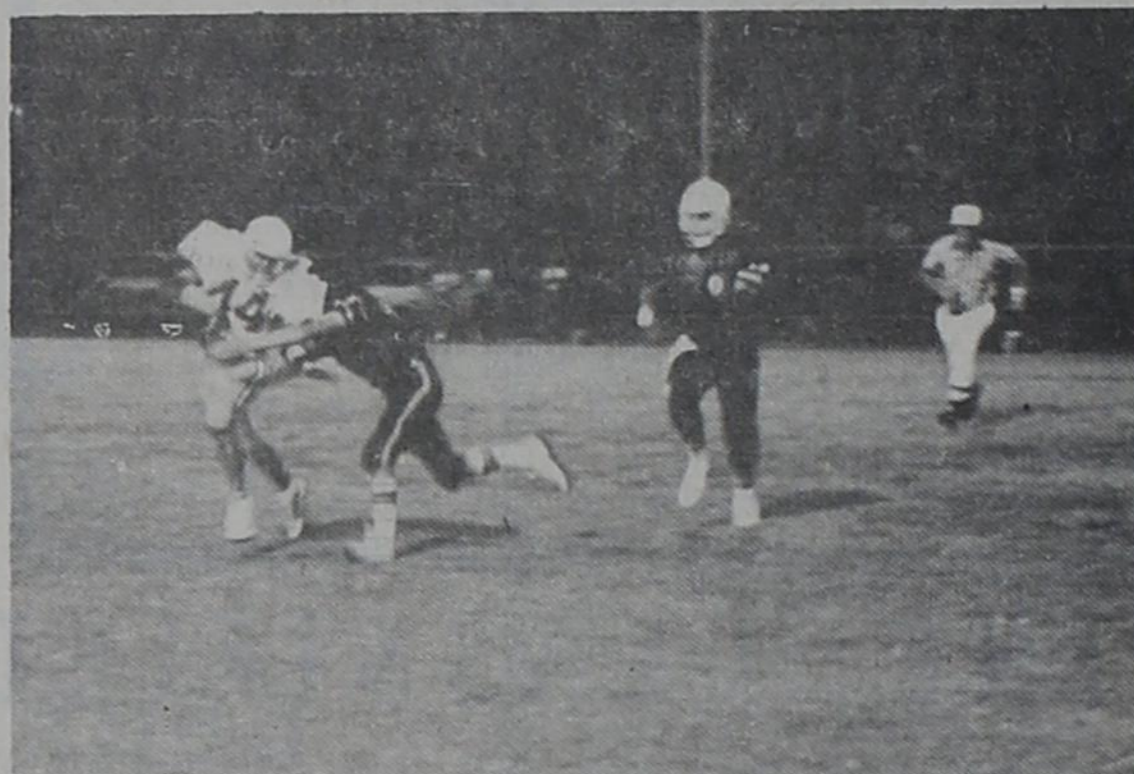
The Panthers were led on Defense

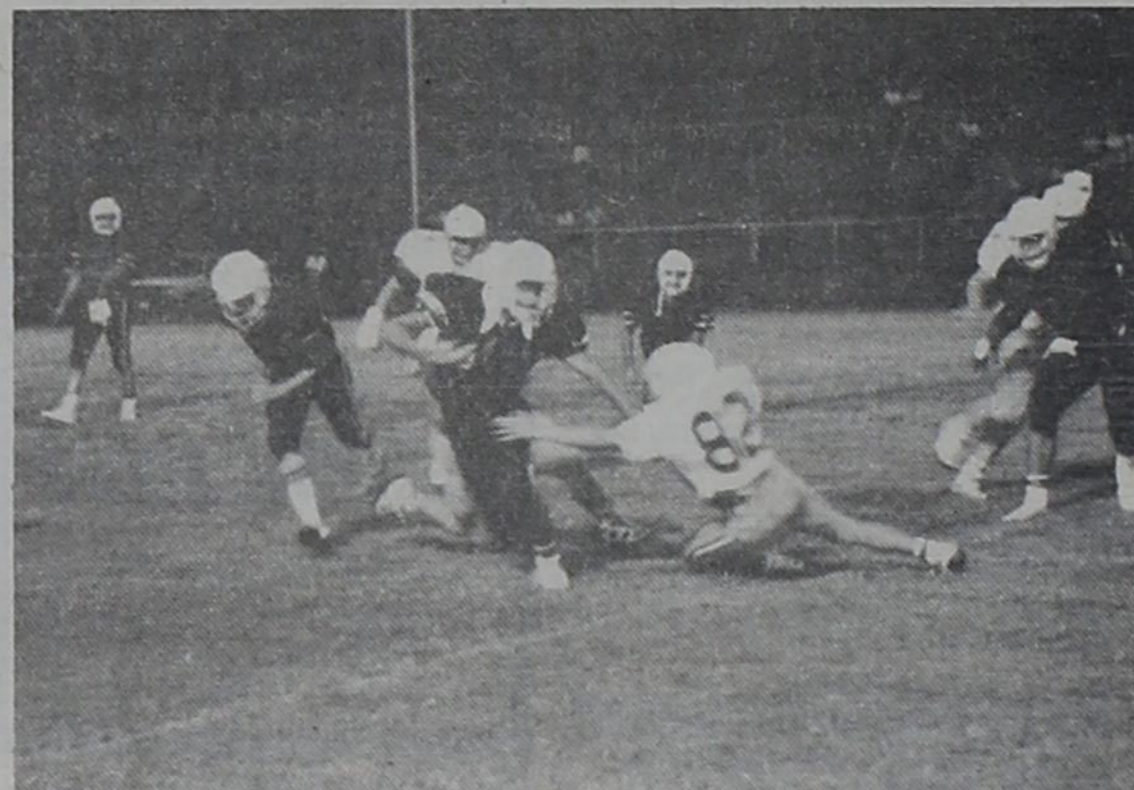

David Barton To Speak At New Hope - September 11



David Barton, founder of Specialty Research Associates, Inc. of Aledo, Texas, will be the speaker at New Hope Baptist Church on Sunday evening, September 11 at 7 p. m.

Mr. Barton, a former construction company president and Christian school principal and administrator, is a published author. His most recent book, America: To Pray or Not to Pray? statistically details the effect that prohibiting prayer in public schools has had on this nation.

The data in the book was compiled largely from federal cabinet level departments and presents a sobering account of the decline of our nation in four major areas since 1962 when

the Supreme Court first ruled against public school prayer.

Congressmen in Washington, D. C. say that this book is the first statistical proof they have seen of the positive effects of school prayer and believe it will serve as a tool in restoring prayer and the public acknowledgement of God to our schools.

The book has been reviewed on both regional and national television programs and in various national publications. Mr. Barton has presented his findings to various officials in Washington, has appeared on the programs of the national conventions of Concerned Women for America and other groups, and has appeared on numerous television talk shows.

America: To pray or Not to Pray is a valuable resource for those who desire strong evidence that God needs to be returned to the center of this nation, both in public and private life.
