PANTHERS OUTRUN HORNETS 45-8; RAVEL TO TIGER COUNTRY FRIDAY

The Panthers came back to life on Friday night as they traveled down to Hornet country to take on the Lometa Hornets. Following losses the past two weeks to state ranked Rising Star and Cross Plains a lot of fans had just about written the Panthers off for the rest of the season. However, I think the Panthers had something to prove . . . and they really proved it Friday night. Oh I know that the Hornets have been down also, but if you score 45 points in a football game, you must be doing something right. Anyway, the Big Red jumped on the Hornets from the word go and just never really looked back as they coasted to a 45 to 8 victory.

The Panthers took advantage of a break after kicking off to the Hornets when the Big Red defense recovered a Hornet fumble at the Lometa 22 by Ron Childers. On the first play the Panthers lost 2. Then on the next play Joe Rodgers ran for 3 yards to set up a third down and 9 at the Lometa 20. Then the Panthers got all of it in one big chunk as Kevin Hirst hit Stephen Scitern over the middle for a 20 touchdown toss with 9:26 left in the period. The try for two points failed and Gorman went up 6-0.

Then on their next possession the Hornets lost the handle on the ball again and the Panther defense recovered the ball on the Hornet 31. It took only 4 plays for the Big red to cross the goal lineagain. Following a 7 yard run by Jay McCormick, the Panthers then lost two yards. From there Brandon Gilmore broke loose for 15 and a first down at the Hornet 13. Then on another outstanding run, Brandon broke free and raced into the end zone for the score with 6:38 left in the period. The run for two points fell short and the Panthers went up 12-0.

Then, low and behold on their third possession the Hornets were knocked loose from the ball again and the Big Red recovered the ball on the 50. On the first play Kevin Hirst ran for 10 yards and a first down on a keeper play. Then following running plays of 3 and 2, Brandon again got loose and rambled for 16 yards and a first down at the Lometa 23. Following a 2 yard gainer by Jay McCormick, Kevin Hirst dropped back and tossed a strike to Chad Campbell who went high in the air to catch the pass in the end zone for the 21 yard touchdown with 2:30 left in the initial period. Then for the first time this season the Panthers lined up to kick the point after. And Shane Morrow kicked the extra point to put the Panthers on top 19 to 0.

After holding the Hornets on their next possession and forcing a punt the Panthers took the ball on their own 47 and went the distance in 9 plays with Jay McCormick getting the honors from 8 yards out on a run with 8:29 left in the half. The drive featured runs of 7, 4, 1, a 28 yarder by Joe Rodgers, a 4 yarder, another 7 yarder by Joe, and then following a 2 yarder Kevin, Jay got the score. The kick for point failed and Gorman was ahead 25-0.

The teams played on fairly even terms the rest of the first half.




Again the try for two points failed and Gorman was up 31-0.




