

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



San Angelo -- High school students from Eastland County were among some 400 junior and senior high school students attending the Texas Farm Bureau Citizenship Seminar here June 13-17.

Brian Lasater of Gorman, Sherry Nail of Ranger and Steve Couch of Cisco represented this county at the training school, which was held on the campus of Angelo State University.

The TFB has sponsored 26 such seminars since 1962. More than 9,500 students have completed the training course which is designed to give them a better understanding of their American heritage and the capitalistic free enterprise system.





The nationwide drought isgetting a lot of attention now. Apparently, much of the nation is in worse condition than we are in Eastland County. We had one of the driest winter-spring seasons than we have had in a long time. However, the good rains in late May and early June helped our situation a lot. Last week the peanut fields still had good moisture. The range and pasture grasses are still green but the grasses are wilting fast under the 90 degree plus weather. Most bermudagrass hay fields have yielded one cutting of hay, but rain will be necessary to get a second cutting in most cases.

Across the nation this spring's drought has reduced pasture and range feed conditions to the worst at this time of the year since USDA started keeping tabs on pasture conditions in 1922. The condition is

rated a little worse than in the Dust Bowl year of 1934. Even worse the atmospheric scientists are predicting the drought to continue through the summer or even longer.

Dry weather has reduced first crop hay yields up to 70 percent in some areas, which has fueled advances in hay prices and concerns about hay production later this summer.

The continuing drought has made itself felt elsewhere, particularly in Northern Mexico and Western Canada. Northwestern Mexico is weathering one of its worst droughts in 20 years. Thousands of cattle have been reported dying in the area.

Tight feed grain supplies as a result of drought conditions in Western Canada will leave no option for producers but to reduce their herds. Pastureland is virtually nonexistend in the area from Red Deer, Alberta, South to Central and Southern regions of Saskatchewan, sources said.

All this makes us even more thankful for the rains we received on May 31-June 2. Those rains put a lot of water in stock tanks and lakes. The way it looks now, that stored water will be helpful if we have a long, hot, sry summer as most

weather scientists predict.
